Grand List Is Up Million and Half; Now \$37,431,424

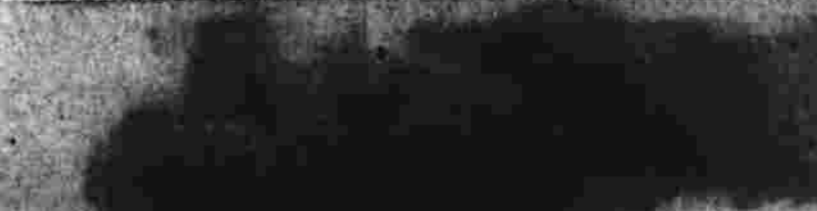
Manchester Figures Released, Show an Increase of 4 Per Cent; Cheney Brothers Have Gain for First Time Since Depression Years

Morgenthau Bluntly Declares Britain Will Not Be Able to Keep Up Fighting Unless Congress Enacts British Aid Bill; Says Dollar Exchange Of British Exhausted

Washington, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Senator Charles McNary, Republican of Oregon, bluntly told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today that "Great Britain... Greece and China 'can't continue to fight' unless Congress enacts the administration's British-aid bill. Testifying that the British had exhausted their dollar exchange for buying war supplies, the Treasury secretary said that British orders for 2,000 fighting planes now were being held up for lack of cash.

Axis Prepares For Onslaught To Oust Foes

Joint Spring Offensive Intended to Drive British from Mediterranean and North Africa. Rome, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Italian circles indicated today that military, economic and diplomatic cooperation between Germany and Italy was reaching a more intense phase in preparation for a joint offensive against the British in Africa and the Greeks in Albania. As a preliminary to a sudden surprise attempt to invade the British Isles themselves and thereby end the war this year as the Nazis are planning to do, these informants said.

British Drive Beyond Keru Toward Agordat

Italian General Surrenders Personally to Cavalry Officer; 100 Additional Prisoners Taken. Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 28.—(AP)—An Italian general was reported today to have surrendered personally to a British cavalry officer when British forces, charging with fixed bayonets down a hillside, pushed beyond Keru toward Agordat in Italian Eritrea. On this front, the Middle East command reported today that French Indo-China had violated the truce arranged through Japanese mediation and that heavy fighting had broken out again on almost all fronts.

Willkie Goes To Commons; Hears Attack

Sits in Visitors' Gallery During Criticism on Suppression of Organism Party Organ. London, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Wendell L. Willkie visited the House of Commons today and sat in the distinguished visitors' gallery during an opposition attack on the government's suppression of the Daily Worker, Communist party organ. Caught earlier in the first air raid of the London week without his hat, Willkie was brought into the House without a gas mask, but without major damage.

Four Italian Tanks Destroyed and Others Driven Back in Attack. Athens, Jan. 28.—(AP)—A smashing raid on Italy's Albanian base at Elbasan was announced by the British air command today while the Greeks reported their hand forces had hurried back to Elbasan. R. A. F. pilots returning from the raid yesterday on Elbasan, 50 miles southwest of Tirana, the Albanian capital, reported thick black smoke was billowing up from the target area when they headed back to their base.

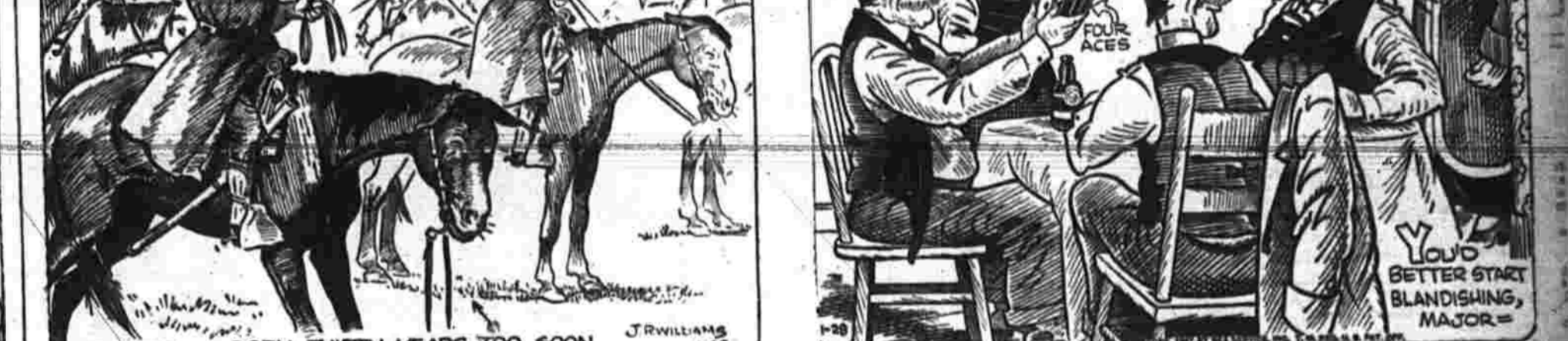

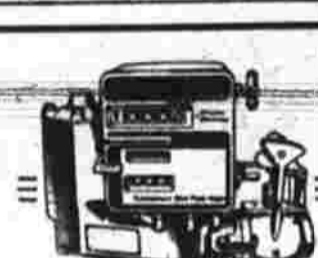
