

Dozen Bills Sent Solons by Hurley For His Program

Wages and Hours Law And Legislation Regulating Public Utilities Included; New Business Reaches Peak in Both Assembly Houses

State Capitol, Hartford, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Gov. Robert A. Hurley sent to the Legislature today a dozen bills covering some of his major inaugural proposals, among them enactment of a wages and hours law and legislation regulating public utilities. The gubernatorial measures were among scores received by the General Assembly as the introduction of new business reached a peak that all but floored harassed clerks in both houses.

A minimum wage of 20 cents an hour for the first four years beginning Oct. 26, 1941 was proposed in the government's wage bill. The pay would be increased to 40 cents an hour after four years. The bill provided for a five-day, 40-hour week with time and a half for overtime.

A memorandum issued by the executive office said the measure would supplement the "existing minimum wage law, and does not disturb the existing minimum established or which may be established by the commissioner of labor."

Requires "Periodic" Audits

Among the public utilities measures was one requiring "periodic comprehensive audits" of the values of each public utility company.

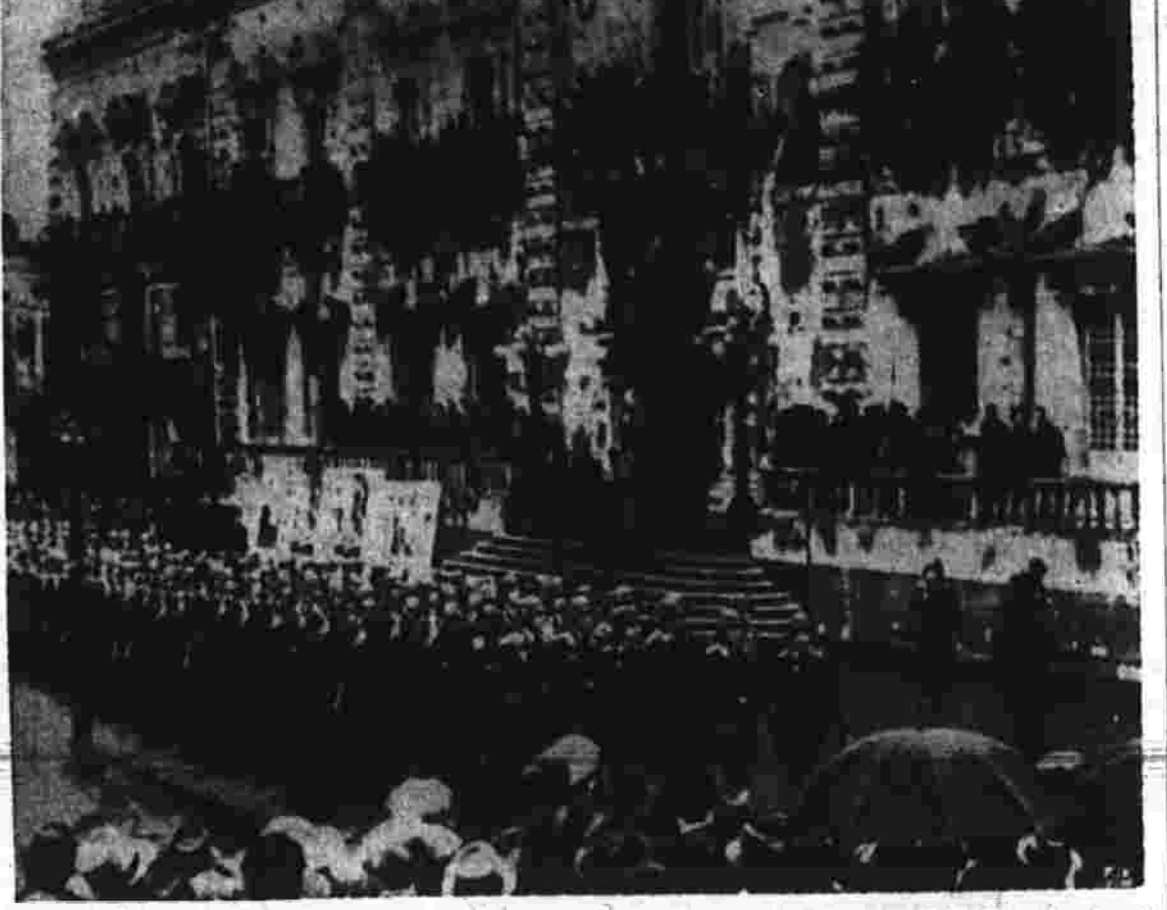

Could Boost Steel Output

Murray Urges Establishment of Committee to Stimulate Production.

Washington, Jan. 29.—Assembling that coordination of production facilities could increase steel production by 5,500,000 tons a year, CIO President Philip Murray today urged establishment of an employer-employee committee to stimulate the output.

The plan, presented yesterday to President Roosevelt, was the second suggestion by the CIO in recent weeks for stepping up production in defense industries.

Doctors know now that by keeping arms and legs muscles "in neutral," so they are completely free of strain during the attack of infantile paralysis, the crippling after-effects may be avoided or greatly minimized.

Weapons Are Ready. So last fall the National Foundation started an arsenal. The weapons: Trunk Splints for arms and legs; Bradford Frames to lie on. Stored in the basement of a Manhattan courthouse, already packed, stamped in ominous red block letters "epidemic-emergency-use," these weapons are ready to go to any point in the country at a moment's notice.

The National Foundation completed a directory of the location of the 654 respirators ("iron lungs") now in America so that they might be rushed to epidemic areas.

The right progress in other, unwarmed ways. The major epidemic in Tacoma, Wash., last spring provided a much-needed laboratory for research. The National Foundation sent in corps of doctors, nurses and researchers. They took blood and mucus and spinal fluid from patients, traced their prevalence and histories. Aggressive Drive Started To Oust Friends of Axis

Washington, Jan. 29.—The United States government, it was learned today, has instituted an aggressive drive to have American firms "house clean" their Latin-American branches of all anti-American or pro-Axis firms.

Convinced by confidential reports of widespread pro-Axis activities in most of the twenty American republics, the State Department and other vital interest government agencies are applying "diplomatic pressure" to elicit the help of export industries in combating the situation.

The objects of the "house cleaning" fall into two general classes—employers of general classes and State oil, steel, automobile, electrical supply and other firms.

Latin-American firms who are considered potential "Fifth Columnists" or who have engaged in activities in the United States in support of Axis activities, are being investigated by the State Department.

Many commercial representatives use their offices as "centers" for the distribution of anti-American literature and propaganda.

13 Men Stay On Transport

To Salvage Army Supplies Aboard.

Ketchikan, Alaska, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Undaunted by a tempest and lowering waves, 13 men remained today aboard the U. S. Army transport Ketchikan, wrecked on rocks off the British Columbia coast, awaiting the arrival of tug boats to salvage what they might of the Army supplies aboard.

The transport, bound from Seattle for Alaska, ran aground in heavy seas late Monday night. At least one seaman—one report said four—drowned as life boats were launched which carried passengers and others of the crew to safety.

The U. S. S. gunboat Charleston, flagship of the Navy's Alaska contingent, went to the scene of the wreck and was due in Ketchikan today with the 23 passengers and crewmen rescued.

Benally Voluntarily. The U. S. Coast Guard, whose cutter Nemah was standing by the Ketchikan, reported that the cutter from getting in close to the ground transport, aboard which Capt. W. W. Williamson and a dozen of his men remained voluntarily.

Waves flooded over the Ketchikan deck at high tide, but the cutter reported the ship was "not breaking up." Two advance tugs and a barge from Prince Rupert, B. C., were expected at the scene this morning.
