

British Fliers Raid Nazi Oil Facilities, Other Objectives

Inland Port of Duisburg-Ruhrort Attacked; Observers on England Coast Report German Anti-Aircraft Guns' Barrage Heavy.

London, Feb. 15.—(P)—Oil installations at Gelsenkirchen and the inland port of Duisburg-Ruhrort were attacked by British bombers in a series of raids on western Germany last night, an official announcement said today. British bombers also attacked other objectives in Germany and German-occupied territory, these sources said, but did not "put on a particularly big show."

Observers on the English south coast reported that German anti-aircraft guns on the opposite side of the channel put up a heavy barrage last evening, indicating an R. A. F. attack on the West coast ports.

Lufwaffe Steps Up Attacks

The German Luftwaffe, meanwhile, stepped up its attacks on England, returning to numerous objectives last night on London, the Midlands and the eastern counties.

One Nazi bomber machine-gunned an east coast town this morning, and German aircraft also were reported over northeast Scotland, east Anglia and east England.

London had a brief alert shortly before noon.

The government acknowledged the German attack on Duisburg-Ruhrort, but said they nevertheless failed to reach large proportions.

Damage Done at Several Points, but was nowhere very heavy; a communique which said that incendiary bombs as fast as they fell in London and no serious fires were reported in the capital during the raid, which lasted from dusk to nearly 11 p. m.

The Air Ministry News Service reported, meanwhile, that British fliers have been laying mines along the German and German-occupied coasts.

"We just creep along the Dutch or German coasts, drop our mines and call it a day," an R. A. F. pilot was quoted as saying. "That's all there is to it."

Docks Bombed in Day Raids

The Air Ministry announced that docks at Calais, France, and Den Helder, The Netherlands, were bombed during daylight sorties across the English Channel yesterday.

A supply ship at anchor at Den Helder was hit, the ministry declared, and a tanker was set adrift off the coast of Norway.

Several merchant ships were killed.

British Attack Only One Town

Nazi Report Number of Civilian Casualties; No Military Damage.

Brno, Feb. 15.—(P)—An allied spokesman said today that the R. A. F. has "seen" over 22 convoys in western Germany last night, but attacked only one of them intensively.

A number of civilian dead and wounded were reported. The Germans said there was no military damage.

Greeks Crack Italian Lines

Seize 200 Prisoners and Quantities of Arms and War Materials.

Athens, Feb. 15.—(P)—The Greeks were reported today to have made new gains in their stepped-up fighting against Italian forces in the front.

Informed sources said poor visibility prevented observation of the hillside positions of the Greek army. The British reported that the Italian line was broken in several places.

British bombers in large numbers attempted to attack military objectives in western Germany during the night. The Germans said, but were frustrated by anti-aircraft defenses. Some civilians were reported killed and wounded by bombs which damaged apartment houses.

A German news agency dispatch from Opatowitz said two British bombers also dropped bombs last night on Hangowid in southern Germany. One civilian was reported killed.

Bridges Held for Trial as a Deportable

Hearing Set for March 31 in New Action Brought Under a Law Passed Last Year.

San Francisco, Feb. 15.—(P)—Harry Bridges, alien labor leader who has figured in Pacific Coast water front strife for years, has been arrested by the Department of Justice and placed under bond pending a deportation hearing.

The California CIO leader and head of the powerful west coast Longshoremen and Warehousemen was arrested late yesterday on a warrant charging him with having been a member of an organization advocating violent overthrow of the United States government.

Bridges, a native of Australia, was cited to appear at the district immigration headquarters here March 31 for a new hearing, and was released on \$3,000 bond, posted by a bail brokerage firm.

The new hearing will be on whether Bridges is described as an "alien" and "additional" evidence supplied by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Involved in 1939

Bridges was arrested in a 1939 immigration Service hearing on a charge he was a Communist party member. In the new hearing the issue will be whether he ever has had a Communist party connection.

The warrant was served in the office of Richard Gladstein, one of the attorneys who defended Bridges successfully in a Labor Department special three-month hearing in 1939. Bridges himself showed no particular emotion when Immigration Inspector Earl Cushing handed him the warrant. Gladstein told newsmen tersely: "We expect to be ready."

Bridges, the warrant charged, was found in the United States in violation of the Immigration laws and is subject to be taken into custody and deported pursuant to the law.

The warrant said the labor leader had violated the alien registration act of 1940 in that "he has been a member of or affiliated with a group that believes in, advocates or teaches the overthrow by force or violence of the government of the United States."

Bridges' previous hearing was before Dean James M. Landis of the Harvard Law school, who found the labor leader "energetic by nature" but clear of charges that he was a member of or affiliated with an adverse organization.

Yugoslavians Return; Give Report to Prince

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Feb. 15.—(P)—Yugoslavia's premier and foreign minister arrived at noon today from Geneva where they held a three-hour conference with Adolf Hitler yesterday, and will immediately report to Prince Paul, the regent.

Both Premier Dragisa Cvetkovic and Foreign Minister Aleksandar Cincar-Markovic refused a statement, but sources close to the premier earlier had indicated that Yugoslavia probably would adopt a course more in accord with German wishes.

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Opponents of Aid Bill Drafting Amendment Asking 'Peace Terms'

Group Led by Wheeler in General Agreement On Idea Britain Should Reveal What Sort of Peace She Would Make If With American Help, She Defeats the Axis; Run into Difficulties.

Washington, Feb. 15.—(P)—Senate opponents of the administration's British aid bill were reported today to be drafting an amendment which would require Britain to state her "peace terms" before receiving any assistance from the United States under the proposed lend-lease program. The opposition group, led by Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.), was said to be in general agreement on the idea that Britain should state what sort of peace she would make if, with American help, she defeated the Axis powers.

Numerous technical difficulties were involved in writing the provision, and even some oppositionists said that it might prove unworkable. An tentative draft, however, was said to be in the hands of the State Department to ascertain Britain's peace terms before any American-made equipment would be released to her.

Hold Strategy Meeting

The amendment was one of about half a dozen being prepared by an opposition group of nearly a score of senators, who held a strategy meeting late yesterday in the office of Senator Johnson (R., Calif.). Apparently certain they could not defeat the British bill, they devoted their efforts to proposals for restrictions.

Administration leaders were working with equal persistence to unify their ranks against changes which they would consider undesirable in the legislation.

Dutch debate on the measure started Monday—the Senate was in recess today—Chairman George (D., Ga.) of the Foreign Relations Committee would not offer any amendments.

P. I. War Scare Dwindles for Lack of News

Manila Back to Normal As Dutch Ships Go To Sea and Tokyo Sends Calming Advice.

Manila, Feb. 15.—(P)—The Philippines got back to normal today after a labor-war scare. Business went on as usual, and street crowds that yesterday and the day before were burning with talk of possible military adventures in the South Pacific, were calm again.

The main reason for the flurry of news was the return of the Dutch warships of Manila and cancelled the return of Army officers to the United States.

News from the rest of the Orient and the capitals over the world, however, to give cause for alarm.

Further reason for not worrying any more was seen in reports that the Dutch merchantmen Tjiljalaga, to depart today and the sailing of three other Dutch ships from Manila last night and the morning of the 14th.

The Tjiljalaga returned to Manila Tuesday a few hours after announced occupation of the harbor by the Japanese. The Tjiljalaga was a Dutch merchantman which was taken to the port, which is apparently safe since the Japanese have not yet entered the United States.

So dense was the smoke that about 15 firemen were overcome although none suffered any serious ill effects.

The firemen kept the flames confined to the basement, but the beauty parlor above and the Benedict Coal Company and the Abraham's Dress Company also suffered heavy damage.

Other cabinet changes were expected to affect the posts now held by Minister of Agriculture Pierre Croizat and Labor Minister Rene Babin, so as to extend the power of Darlan still further.

Informed sources said Peyrouton probably would be named ambassador to Buenos Aires. Mr. Angele, prefect of the Rhone department, was expected to be named secretary general of the interior ministry.
