Special Prices Settle Prolonged \$59.50 With Pump

Okiahoma City, Feb. 22 (F)—
Federal and state officials today settled a prolonged dispute over road replacements necessitated by construction of the \$22,750,000 Grand River dam and opened the way for restoration of highway connections to two isolated communities.

The towns, Groye and Wyandotte, must send their traffic through either Arkansas or Missouri to reach other Oklahoma points now that water impounded by the dam has covered their direct routes. As the water rose, Federal and state officials argued over which was responsible for relocation of roads.
