House Committee Will Make Study Of Insurance Bill

To Withhold Action on Hotly Debated Measure; May Not Vote For About 2 Weeks; May Call Witnesses In Executive Session.

State Capitol, Hartford, March 6.—(AP)—Rep. Walter Howe (D) said today that the House Banking Committee, which he heads, would withhold action on the hotly debated savings bank insurance bill for some time pending a "careful study" of the administration proposal. While the Democratic-controlled General Committee voted 2 to 1 to report the measure favorably, Howe indicated that his committee probably would not vote on the measure for about two weeks.

"It is an extremely important thing, and will require careful study," said Howe.

May Hear More Witnesses

It was probable, some sources said, that the House group would hear more witnesses during its insurance committee session before voting on it.

The Senate committee approved the measure last night immediately after a four-hour stormy public hearing.

While legislators settled down for another strenuous day of hearings, among them one before the Judiciary Committee on a group of anti-sabotage bills, Gov. Robert Hurley sent to the Senate the nomination of George L. Burke as state public works commissioner for an unexpired term ending July 1.

Burke was designated as acting commissioner when Hurley relinquished the post to become governor.

To Avoid Questions

The chief executive said that he had decided to send the nomination to the Senate to avoid any technical questions that might arise as Burke's legal right to act as state public works commissioner is under review.

The bill authorizing the land reclamation project was passed by the House last night.

Eleven Ships Sunk During Island Raid

British and Allied Norwegian Forces Capture 225 Prisoners and Destroy Oil Plant.

London, March 6.—(AP)—British and allied Norwegian forces sank eleven ships under German command and captured 225 prisoners in a surprise raid Tuesday on the Lofoten islands off the coast of Norway, an official announcement said today.

A joint communique of the British Admiralty and the Norwegian government said the raid had three objects—destruction of a fish oil plant, sinking of German shipping and the taking of prisoners.

"All objects of the raid were carried out with considerable success," the communique reported.

Nine German merchant vessels and one Norwegian ship under German control were sunk and also a German armaments vessel. Losses inflicted upon enemy shipping totaled approximately 18,000 tons.

The largest unit sunk was a German ship of about 10,000 tons which was the *U-100*.

The Lofoten islands stretch for about 150 miles along the Norwegian coast and guard the military approaches to Narvik fjord.

First announcement here yesterday in a brief bulletin of the raid gave no details.

Latest news of the raid was issued by the official German news agency, DNB, which reported that German and Norwegian fishermen had been taken prisoner.

The German merchant vessel *U-100* was the only one of the land and Naval forces of the United States, except insofar as such uses relate to the manufacture, procurement and repair of defense articles, the communication of information and the other non-combatant purposes enumerated in the act.

Nazi General Staff Calls on King Boris

German Forces Continue Sweep Southeast in Bulgaria; Motorized Equipment Arriving.

Sofia, Bulgaria, March 6.—(AP)—The general staff of the German Expeditionary Force, headed by Field Marshal Gen. Sigismund List, called on King Boris III, the War Ministry and the Foreign Affairs Ministry today while Nazi forces continued their sweep southward.

Motorized equipment, field kitchens, supply trucks and oil tank cars now also are following the troops, tanks and artillery which are pouring through Balkan passes.

Military Control Telephones

All telephone lines both within the country and those connecting with the outside world now are in the hands of the military.

Many telegrams and cable messages are being held up to avoid the possibility of transmitting military information (here the Sofia dispatch was being relayed, was cut, presumably by the military censor).

Steadily increasing German military preparations in Bulgaria today fanned belief that a Nazi invasion of Greece may come at any hour.

Photographing Defenses

Planes from the German Fourth Air Fleet totaling 1,700 bombers and fighters, already based in Bulgaria, were reported photographing both Greek and Turkish defenses.

To meet the threat of 150,000 Nazi troops "massed along her borders, Greece was said to have concentrated six divisions—totaling about 100,000 men—in the mountain passes north of Salonika.

Some of these were believed to be veterans of fighting against the Italians in Albania.

To Put Ban On Consuls From Italy

Movements to Be Restricted; Requests for Consulates in Two Cities Be Closed.

Washington, March 6.—(AP)—The State Department made public today a note to the Italian government requesting that its consular officials throughout the country be to be restricted and asked that Italian consulates in Detroit and Newark, N. J., be closed.

The Italian diplomatic staff in Washington was excluded from the exercise of the recognized duties of their respective offices.

Greeks Given Pledge of Aid From Britain

Leaders and Press Reaffirm Determination to Fight on Against Any and All Comers.

Athens, March 6.—(AP)—Greek leaders and the press reaffirmed today in far-reaching messages to the British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, the nation's determination to fight on against any and all comers.

With German forces massing on the Bulgarian frontier facing Greece, Eden matched the Greek declarations with a promise that Britain would stand by her, although "the future may be arduous."

"Indomitable and proud," asserted the newspaper *Asymptota*, "we shall march to victory. The heroic example we set on Oct. 28, 1940, (when the Italians invaded Greece) will guide us in any which dispatch was being relayed, was cut, presumably by the military censor."

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French Envoy Confers With Matsukata on Details; Full Agreement in Few Days

Tokyo, March 6.—(AP)—agreement on the "principal points" of the French Indo-China and Thailand territorial quarrel between French Indo-China and Thailand was announced officially today.

The French ambassador, Charles Aron, and Foreign Minister Yonake Matsukata conferred for an hour in late afternoon today, discussing remaining points of detail, excluding the principal points, which already are agreed to by the French and Thai governments.

Matsukata left the French embassy at 9 p.m. (4 a.m. S.A.T.). It was said complete agreement is likely "within a few days."

Will Extend Armistice

The present armistice in the French colony and Thailand is scheduled to expire tomorrow, but it probably will be extended.

Japan's attitude plan, which had been presented as her last offer and the minimum acceptable to Thailand, is supposed to have been accepted.

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No. End Needs Fire Stations

Volunteers Confused as To Where to Go in Case Of Alarm Called In.

The alarm for the fire on Summit street near Henry street yesterday morning calling for Strickland and Henry street corners at Main street, was such a long distance from the fire that several questioned the proper number being sounded.

The number sounded was correct as the last map of the district showing the locations of fire alarms does not show any stations along Summit street at all. There have been an alarm sounded from Station 29, which is the number assigned to the Hollister street station.

Summit street ended at Henry street just before the last map was made, which was during the term of Chief Edward Coleman, and there were but few houses on Summit street at that time. New buildings in the district covered by the Manchester fire department are between sections to North Elm street and from North Elm street to Woodbridge street.

It will not require stringing of wires or the erection of poles and change stations or add to them as the district does not have such a system.

Suggested New Stations Today a man in charge of the territory suggests that the following stations be added: Turnpike, Summit and Hollister; Summit and Henry; Summit and Highland; Henry and White; Henry and Princeton; Manchester Green road at Bowers and Princeton; Manchester Green road and Phipps road. These are a few that district officers can consider.

The call No. 1, which is the number that is assigned in case of fire at the Bon Ami factory is another number that should be changed. This whistle is sounded three times each day, announcing the starting and ending of work. To have it blown for a fire might be misunderstood during the day and a serious fire may result.

Should Post Numbers It was further suggested that changes were made, or new stations added, that it might be well to post the numbers on some pole nearby so people would know what number to give when calling in by telephone. This would save time as many of the residents of the district in the section now without stations, are newcomers. The revenue received in the way of taxes from the new homes would more than cover the small expense incurred. It would also help the department, a volunteer organization, in knowing where to go when an alarm is sounded.

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
