## Would Have State Deduct Insurance And Hospital Care

### Hurley to Seek Legislation Authorizing Action Whenever 50 Per Cent of Employes in Department or Institution Found in Favor.

State Capitol, Hartford, March 14.—(AP)—Gov. Robert A. Hurley said today that he would seek legislation authorizing the state to make payroll deductions to cover group insurance and hospital care for state employes. The comptroller, the chief executive explained at his conference, has no statutory power now to make such deductions, thus hampering state employes who desire to take out group insurance or participate in a hospital plan.

Legislative leaders were summoned by the chief executive to discuss the bill, it provides that whenever 50 per cent of the employes of a state department or institution wish to take out group insurance or participate in a non-profit hospital care plan, the state comptroller is authorized to deduct the premium or fee from an employe's salary and turn it over to the insurance company or the hospital plan.

The close of another legislative week brought reports that a subcommittee of the Judiciary Committee was in substantial agreement on the major provisions of a state labor relations act covering employes in intrastate concerns not affected by federal legislation.

It was understood that the subcommittee hoped to submit its report early next week, with prospects that the measure would be reported out before the end of another legislative week.

As is customary, the Legislature sidestepped controversial matters in the final session of the week.

The House suspended its rules to approve a Senate bill enabling citizens called from the state on military duty to vote in municipal elections by absentee ballot, a privilege hitherto limited to state and national elections.

Also adopted was a House bill authorizing two years ago to build dormitories at the University of Connecticut.

The House received from its Motor Vehicles Committee an unfavorable report on a bill which would cut the cost of drivers' licenses.

Rome, March 14.—(AP)—Five British torpedo planes of the type that attacked the Italian fleet at Taranto, attempted to launch their missiles at shipping in Valona harbor, Albania, Italian reports reported yesterday.

## Paper Claims Union Reneges

### Pittsburgh Post-Gazette Suspends Publication Second Time in Week.

Pittsburgh, March 14.—(AP)—For the second time within a week, the Post-Gazette today suspended publication until further notice, explaining in a statement that the Mailers' union failed to work in accordance with its contract and the joint agreement of the Newspaper Union Council signed (last) Tuesday.

The first suspension occurred Sunday night when members of three unions refused to cross picket lines established by 40 striking members of the A.P. Pittsburgh Newspaper Alliance, contending that the newspaper had employed a non-union man in distribution of a special aid-Britain charity collection.

The Post-Gazette, the city's only morning newspaper, distributed by union truck in violation of a contract clause that such deliveries should be settled by arbitration. The union countered with a statement that management had employed a non-union man in distribution of a special aid-Britain charity collection.

In a statement today, the newspaper said all the unions had agreed after the strike, suspensions to "carry out" their contracts but that last night—after picket lines were re-established by strikers—only four members of the Mailers' Union reported for work. Later, the Mailers Union informed the management that management had agreed to hire a non-union man. The Post-Gazette said the Alliance made no further statement.

## British Down 14 Fighters Over Albania

### Greeks Declare Five Italian Divisions Shattered in Past Seven Days.

Athens, Greece, March 14.—(AP)—R.A.F. headquarters announced today that 14 Italian fighter planes were shot down and a number badly damaged yesterday in a battle over the Klisura-Tepelet sector of Albania without the loss of a single British plane.

Greek dispatches declared five Italian divisions had been shattered in the past seven days in response to the honor of being the first local unit to leave the unit will reach Camp Island, Florida tomorrow afternoon, traveling down the South Atlantic coastline on a fast express scheduled to leave the K. A. P. Palace.

A furious Italian assault over a wide front in the central sector of Albania was completely beaten back, the Greeks said, and great losses were suffered.

Greek dispatches from the front said Mussolini would return to Rome from his visit to the front yesterday and bid adieu to the "shame" after failure of the offensive he had personally ordered.

It was said in these dispatches that the five Italian divisions were spotted by observers at the Albanian capital, since yesterday, and was expected to leave for Rome tomorrow, the date he had set to announce a "big success" in Albania.

These reports said it was not known whether he would be accompanied by Marshal Pietro Badoglio, former chief of staff, who was said in unconfirmed advice to have been sent to the area and guard the crowd packing the station from possible attack.

The R. A. P. communique on the big air battle in the Tepelet area said large formations of Italian bombers and at least 50 fighters were downed.

## Powder Blast Fatal to 50

### 480 Injured Today in Explosion in Spain; 2,500 Left Homeless.

Seville, Spain, March 14.—(AP)—Fifty persons were killed, authorities estimated, when the Santa Barbara powder depot near Seville blew up today.

The number of injured was placed at 480.

All Seville felt the blast violently, and a workers' suburb of 300 houses was wrecked, scarcely one of the houses remaining intact.

In all, 2,500 persons were left homeless.

Only a few persons escaped from the powder depot, and a textile factory, under construction nearby, was also destroyed.

Five soldiers guarding the powder depot were killed in the blast. There were many women and children injured in the blaze.

London, March 14.—(AP)—Britain frequently-bombed Hamburg overnight in the greatest air attack yet, set oil facilities at Rotterdam ablaze, delivered "minor" attacks against Bremen, Emden and Torpedo and sank a Nazi supply ship off the Frisian Islands, the Air Ministry announced today.

This second straight night of trip-hammer blows against German and Nazi-held territory was delivered while the great Glasgow shipbuilding center, the port of Liverpool and an unidentified northwestern corner of Germany, where German Naval bases, shipyards, docks and marine and other industries are concentrated, were the main targets of the R. A. F. in the all-out offensive which followed upon the enactment by the United States of the British aid bill.

## Edison Strike Threat Halted By Agreement

### Union Accepts New Contract for Seven Plants; Attempt to Find Way to Settle Coal Dispute.

The threat of a strike at seven New Jersey and Pennsylvania plants of Thomas A. Edison, Inc., was cleared away today by union acceptance of a new contract.

### New Pregnant Test Is Found

Colostrum Injected into Skin of Forearm Of Patient.

Chicago, March 14.—An inexpensive, easily administered skin test that quickly indicates whether a woman is pregnant has been developed at the University of Illinois College of Medicine.

The method is 98 per cent reliable, detects pregnancy as early as two weeks, and gives results within an hour, the university reported yesterday.

Colostrum is injected into the skin of the patient's forearm. There is no reaction if the woman is not pregnant. If she is, a slight reddish swelling occurs at the injection point within an hour and lasts for four or five hours.

Developed by Dr. Frederick H. Falls, head of the Department of Gynecology at Chicago, Dr. V. C. Fryck, of the same department, and Dr. H. H. Cohen, of the physiological chemistry department, Dr. Williams' department, acted as consultant.

Files Second Lien On Kelly Property

Waterbury, March 14.—The Federal government, alleging non-payment of income tax, has filed a second lien against property of former Alderman Thomas P. Kelly, one of those convicted in the Waterbury conspiracy case.

The lien, signed by Frank W. Kessler, assistant collector in writing, the Supreme court's opinion, states that the company's land "actually benefited" to the extent of \$250 from the improvement.

**ASCAP Accused of Having 'Its Own Gestapo' in Connecticut at Public Hearing**

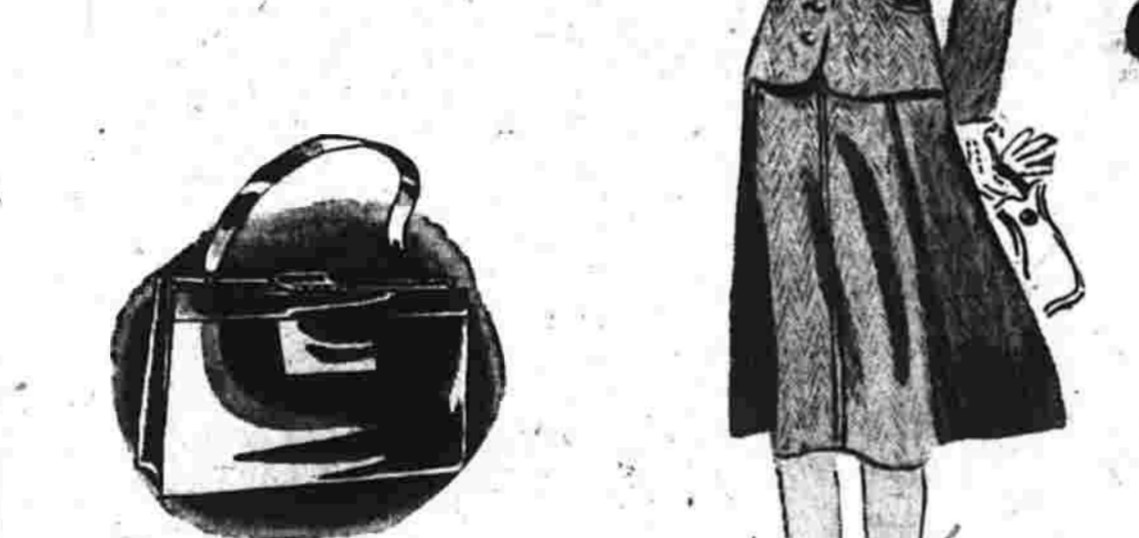
