

Yugoslavia Becomes Axis Junior Partner; Citizens Given News

Headlines in Red Ink, Blaring Radios Tell of Signing as Germany, Britain, Greece, Turkey Clear Decks for Possible Large Scale Warfare in Balkans; Pamphlets Rap Hitler.

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, March 25.—(AP)—Anti-German elements in Yugoslavia, protesting this nation's alignment with the Axis, tonight were looking to Moscow for aid against Nazi penetration in the Balkans. Pamphlets scattered in Belgrade streets proclaimed that "Russia definitely is against the Germans" expansion in the Balkans.

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, March 25.—(AP)—Headlines in red ink and blaring radios told Yugoslavians today that their country had signed the three-power pact in Vienna as Germany, Britain, Greece and Turkey cleared the decks for possible large scale warfare on a new Balkan front. But even as the pact was signed, pamphlets were being distributed in the streets of Belgrade declaring that Adolf Hitler would "burn his tongue by nibbling on Yugoslavia."

Extra Editions Feature Notes delivered to Premier Dragisa Cvetkovic by the German and Italian foreign ministers promising to "respect the independence and territorial integrity of Yugoslavia" and that "the Axis powers will not ask Yugoslavia to pose as a puppet state through Yugoslav territory."

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Not a Matter of Figures

Some very responsible commentators have been drawing extensive grave pictures of the present blockade of Great Britain lately. They point out the great number of Western European ports from which German surface raiders as well as submarines can operate; that the number and capacity for damage to these surface raiders is much greater than in generally recognized; the several points of advantage in their favor as compared with combined speed and gun power of British ships which might seek to engage them, and so on. And when they have summed up the total of the menace to the Americas-to-Britain supply routes they make it appear quite dubious as to whether the British will be able to survive and receive the aid which is flowing out to this country in increasing volume.

It is probable that these estimates of the situation are not exaggerated—not intentionally at least. It is also probable that some very skillful highlighting is being done, so that the peril to British merchant shipping will be seen in all its stark reality, while the other side of the coin is kept pretty well in shadow. And this, it is to be suspected, is for the quite obvious purpose of showing the American people that the time may soon come when, if we are really going to help Britain, we must not only send her the tools of war but, by conveying the carrier ships ourselves, see that she carries them, so that the job may be quickly finished.

This is pretty certain to become before very long the gravest question that has yet been presented to the American people, and the commentators in question apparently believe that they cannot too soon begin to prepare the public mind for its serious consideration.

Take for instance the frequent mention lately of the fact that two powerful states, the United States and the Soviet Union, are almost certainly operating in the American sea lanes. It is pointed out that these states are practically battlemented, being heavily armored and carrying 11-inch guns, having a tonnage of 26,000 and a speed of 29 knots. This makes them fast enough to out-foot anything in the British navy, with the possible exception of three ships, which carries guns heavy enough to match against these German raiders.

It is not an attractive outlook when three British cruisers, the most heavily gunned of them carrying eight-inch pieces, tackled the pocket battleship, the Spanish ship, the German ship, took the blasting of her eleven-inch guns and sent her first scuttling to the bottom, and then, to add to the gloom, sent her to scuttle through pack-ice.

There is something besides a rule of arithmetic about sea warfare. And through the entire history of the German nation there has never been one single minute when Germans were masters of the sea. Figures can't prove that, and we don't believe it either.

us, head of the American Federation of Labor, had only to pledge the unlimited loyalty of the unions to the national cause in order to obtain it. But already we have grown callous. Our hearts are tight shut against compassion when those who are torn to bits are killed or horribly maimed are the German soldiers. Our hearts are our friends when we feel is almost entirely angry and a deep yearning for vengeance—not deep sympathy for human suffering.

The war is making us tough and bitter and ruthless. If it lasts long enough it is going to be more than one generation before we get away from the plane of the wild beast and back to the level of normal manhood and womanhood.

we must survive. We of the democracy heralded that the best of the world revert to a wilderness away only by the rule of the savage tiger. We must be hard and tough that the germs of all tenderness and love and decency shall not perish.

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Appropriations Are Pushed Rapidly Toward New Peak

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—The tremendous expense of an all-out defense program pushed congressional appropriations today rapidly toward an all-time record total of more than \$20,000,000,000 for one year's governmental activities.

The prospective total would be almost double the \$12,542,000,000 spent last year. The House bill would spend \$18,514,880,000 in 1941, and the Senate bill would spend \$19,400,000,000. The House bill has approved outlays of \$17,810,994,842, including the \$1,000,000,000 British aid appropriation, and it has still to add some \$2,353,813,159 in other appropriations.

Expert Supplemental Requests That may not be the end, fiscal experts anticipate that still more millions of dollars will be sent to the Capitol as new defense needs develop.

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To 'Revitalize' Party Actions

Washington, March 25.—(AP)—Given a unanimous vote of confidence, Chairman Joseph W. Martin of the Republican National Committee set today to "revitalize" the minority party by intensive organization in every precinct.

The House Republican leader, whose resignation as national chairman was rejected 94 to 0 by the committee yesterday, said the party was "atruel weak in some places" and must become a "vital, rugged organization in every precinct of the country" if it is to show any gains over recent elections.
