

Riots in Belgrade Protest Yugoslav Alliance with Axis

Police and Soldiers Rushed to Scene to Quell Outbreaks; Occurs Short Time After Premier Returns From Vienna Journey.

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, March 26. — (AP) — Rioting broke out in the center of Belgrade at noon today in protest against Yugoslavia's alliance with the Axis powers.

Many persons were arrested before police halted the fighting, which occurred in a short time after Premier Dragisa Cvetkovic returned from Vienna, where he signed the Axis pact yesterday.

Paradeers already had marched through the business district, singing patriotic songs. The students were mostly from secondary schools and formed the procession on their way home from school.

Authorities apparently were prepared to meet any situation. Police and soldiers jammed courtyards throughout the city, ready to cope with any demonstration who threatened to get out of hand.

Cvetkovic no sooner had reached the capital than he went into conference seeking to end the disorders which had been agitating the country for 24 hours.

While Cvetkovic consulted with Chief Regent Prince Paul, unconformable reports circulated that authorities had ordered a search of the homes of opposition leaders who refused from the government before the Axis alignment.

Several arrests followed. It was rumored that several arrests had been made. Yugoslav public schools were ordered closed until Monday.

Accompanied by Foreign Minister Aleksandar Cincar-Markovic, who also participated in the pact signing yesterday, the premier hurried from the station to his offices to confer at once with government leaders.

Violence continued in Belgrade today, with rioters attacking the homes of government officials and burning public buildings.

Emphasis Put On Canal Zone Defense Jobs

Third Set of Locks Expected to Be Completed Before the Scheduled Date in 1946.

Washington, March 26. — (AP) — With emphasis on defense works such as the Panama Canal, the House Appropriations Committee approved today a \$202,272,228 bill for the civil functions of the War Department—rivers and harbors, flood control and the like.

For the canal, the committee recommended \$2,135,228 cash and contractual authority of \$78,000,000 after Brig. Gen. E. E. Edgerton, Canal governor, reported that the third set of locks there probably would be completed in advance of the scheduled date, June 30, 1946.

The new locks are expected to facilitate quick movement of the Navy from ocean-to-ocean, including accommodation of larger battleship in the canal.

Cash money in the bill totaled \$21,327,228. This figure and the \$78,000,000 contract authority for the canal were identical with proposals of the Budget Bureau.

The Bureau suggested a \$50,742,433 increase in the current year and the committee approved the reduction, the committee said that its investigation "net no doubt of an current purpose to lighten demands in the interest of the defense-preparation effort."

"The money is for use in the fiscal year beginning July 1," Edgerton said. "The largest reduction is in rivers and harbors maintenance."

Under the bill, Sullivan explained, a municipality may acquire a public utility by two-thirds vote of the City Council and approval of the mayor, within 90 to 180 days after such acquisition.

The proposal must be submitted to a referendum. At present the proposal must be approved by the City Council and the mayor by a two-thirds vote in two successive years and then be submitted to a referendum.

In communities without a City Council, the proposal would require approval at a town meeting.

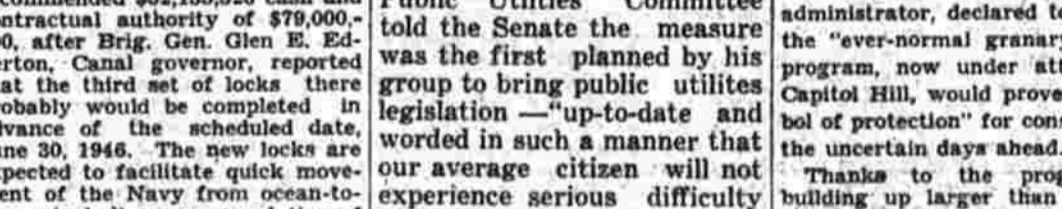

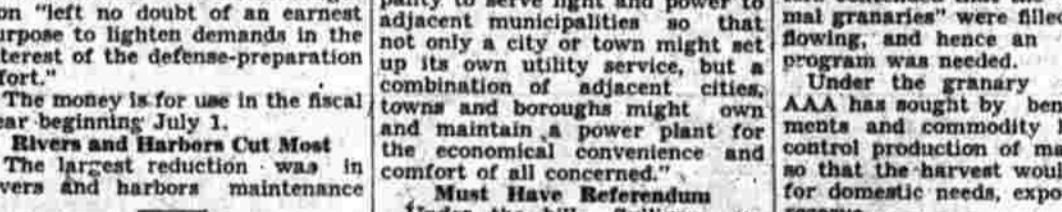
