Yugoslavia Refuses to Ratify Pact; Receives American Promise of Aid

Johnstown Workers Strike While Strife At Bethlehem Ends

Union Gives Unanimous Assent to Terms on Which Negotiators Previously Agree; Ratified by Roar of 'Ayes' at Mass Meeting; Management Satisfied, with Terms.

Bethlehem, Pa., March 28.—(P)—A four-day strike at the huge parent plant of Bethlehem Steel ended today and the union, giving unanimous assent to terms on which negotiators previously had agreed, announced workers would return to their jobs "as fast as they can." Settlement was announced by company and CIO Steel Workers Organizing Committee representatives at 5:30 a. m. (est.). The terms were ratified with a roar of "Ayes" at a union mass meeting a minute before noon. A management spokesman already had termed the agreement satisfactory.

The SWOC called the strike at 9:30 p. m. Monday following a threat of a walkout should the Employers' Representative Plan proceed with a scheduled election of officers and bargaining agents. The SWOC charged the E. R. P. is company-dominated and illegal and objected to any E. R. P. voting on company property.

May Seek Impediment

At Philadelphia, Carl Bering, an official of the Philadelphia Industrial Union Council, CIO, announced the CIO may ask the Pennsylvania Legislature to initiate impeachment proceedings against Gov. Arthur H. James because of his alleged participation in the company plan.

Allis-Chalmers Plant Opened; Third Return

Strikers Make No Effort To Stop Those Entering Plant; Pictures Taken by Union Men.

Milwaukee, March 28.—(P)—The Allis-Chalmers Mfg. Co. closed by a CIO strike since Jan. 22 re-opened today in compliance with the government's demand and announced approximately one-third of the normal day shift of production men reported for work.

The company said 1,962 production men had entered the plant by 7 a. m. Harold Christoff, union president, said union picketers at the eastern gates said there were only 46.

The union returned its warning that those who returned before the union voted its sanction would lose their jobs when the strike ends.

Big Farm Bill Gains Favor

Wins Speedy Approval From Senate Appropriations Committee.

Washington, March 28.—(P)—A record-breaking farm bill, carrying more than \$1,000,000,000, won speedy approval today from the Senate Appropriations Committee.

The committee, which had previously approved by a subcommittee, including \$450,000,000 for parity payments to farmers complying with administration program. The full committee recommended passage as a part of the effort by a powerful group of senators demanding that farmers share more largely in the prosperity promised by the defense program.

Will Act Monday

Majority Leader Barkley (D., Ky.) said the Senate would act on the bill Monday. It then must go back to the House which voted \$200,000,000 for agriculture activities.

The record-breaking farm fund was approved unanimously yesterday by a Senate Appropriations subcommittee and Senator Russell (D., Ga.) predicted that the full appropriations committee would give speedy approval to a bill, sending it on to the Senate.

Seek Slayer Of Physician

Police Believe Narcotic Addict Killed Woman Doctor in Maine.

Richmond, Me., March 28.—(P)—A man who ran from behind a freight train early today was sought by police in connection with the slaying last night of a 28-year-old woman physician, Dr. Thelma Harris Jones.

A shabby, bearded man, whom the police said they believed was narcotic addict, was suspected of slaying Dr. Jones while she was alone in her brick, colonial office-home.

Sheriff Charles Messinger said George Sherburne, who lives near the railroad tracks, told him he had seen a man run from behind a stone crusher just below the Richmond station about 3:15 a. m., and jump aboard the northbound Maine Central train as it picked up speed after a stop.

Unwary Doctor Slain

The elderly Sherburne told the sheriff he was unwary at the time that Dr. Jones had been slain and did not pay much attention to the trespasser. He said the man was wearing a dark coat.

Dr. Jones, a physician, told police that last evening he had declined from his home a stranger who asked for narcotics.

Investigators worked on a theory that while the husband was temporarily absent, the stranger returned, furnished narcotics to the wife, struck her over the head with a blunt instrument and then dragged her to the foot of the railroad stairs.

Plaid Gown Best of Medicine

In the husband's office, where police said Mrs. Jones apparently was slugged, the investigators found an open box of narcotics, a hypodermic needle was lying in a metal basin beside her body in a room.

Hurley Raps Increase Planned in Milk Price

Asks Consumers to Remember His Milk Control Act Still In Under Consideration.

State Capitol, Hartford, March 28.—(P)—Gov. Robert A. Hurley criticized today the one cent increase in the price of milk, and asked consumers to "bear in mind that this price increase is taking place while my milk control act is still under consideration by the General Assembly."

The Democratic chief executive, who made milk one of his principal campaign issues last fall, asserted that the increase authorized by Milk Administrator S. McLean Buckingham yesterday came as a move "in which the public had no voice," and that "such a situation could not arise" if his milk bill was "now a law."

"Indeed," said the chief executive in a formal statement, "such price increases might have been avoided if producers were now being paid all of the money that they are entitled to under consumer's prices of today."

Defense Industries Cause Serious Problem in Health

Portland, Ore., March 28.—(P)—Manufacturing defense industries are threatening America with an acute health problem, Dr. Kendall Emerson of New York, told the Oregon Tuberculosis Association today.

The managing director of the National Tuberculosis Association said these regions lacked facilities to deal with overnight industrialization and its concentration of population.

He said that at the edge of Portland, Ore., he had seen a "thing that will be repeated in many parts of the country."

2 Industrial Centers Hit During Raid

London, March 28.—(P)—The R. A. F. pounded the German industrial centers of Cologne and Dusseldorf with "many heavy bombs" in overnight raids extending from the Rhineland to the "invasion ports" of Dunkerque, Brest and Calais on the North-French Coast, the Air Ministry announced today.

In the war at sea, the Admiralty announced that the submarine Partisan had torpedoed a 6,000-ton supply or troop ship and a 10,000-ton tanker in an Italian-escorted convoy south of Italy.

German daylight raiders touched off an alarm in London this morning, the first since the night of March 20, but three planes headed for the capital turned back apparently without dropping any bombs. There were no reports of software activity over England during the night.

The R. A. F. night air assaults, a communiqué said, followed up daylight raids on German naval and air bases in the Channel and the North Sea, and the production of "good results."

A thick ground haze, pilots of the bomber command were declared to have found their targets at Cologne and Dusseldorf, setting off fires and explosions among factories and residential areas.

Reich Waits For Answer From Peter

Berlin Apparently Pressing for Clean-Cut Decision on Yugoslavian Foreign Policy.

Berlin, March 28.—(P)—Germany waited impatiently today for a definite answer from King Peter II of Yugoslavia, a defiant Yugoslavian, led by 17-year-old King Peter II, refused today to ratify the three-day-old Axis pact and received the United States' promise of full aid if she is forced to resist German and Italian armies. United States Minister Arthur Bliss Lane delivered a note to the government which said that under the terms of the military aid bill every possible assistance would be given to Yugoslavia "as to all other nations seeking to maintain their independence and integrity to repel aggression."

Other rapid-fire developments today include:

1. The Turkish minister conferred with Premier on proposed mutual assistance pact; Germans begin exodus from country; Peter formally takes over power in Cathedral Rites.

British Chase Italian Army In Retreat

'Large Number' of 35,000 Fascist Defenders Of Cheren Captured as Well as War Materials.

Cairo, Egypt, March 28.—(P)—Italian troops are in hot pursuit of Italian forces retreating toward Asmara, capital of Eritrea, following occupation of the key mountain town of Cheren by British imperial forces. The Middle East command announced today.

"A large number" of the 35,000 Fascist defenders of the African "Verdun" were reported captured by the British troops who battered their way into Cheren late Wednesday night after a seven-week siege.

A three-member panel headed by Chairman C. A. Dystra will consider the Harvester case.

Noted Author Arrested

Washington, March 28.—(P)—The Justice Department said today Richard Fulton Harar, a noted author, was arrested in New York City on charges of espionage.

Harar, who wrote the best seller "Out of the Night" under the name Alan Vallin, had been arrested in New York to face deportation proceedings. Harar was arrested in the immigration office in New York and is being held at Ellis Island under \$5,000 bail. He furnished bond and was released. New York immigration authorities said with the understanding he would return to Ellis Island for a hearing at a later date.

"Our troops have evacuated Harar to avert its bombardment. Our bombing formations machine gunned and mortar-bombed various parts of Harar, including the railway station and the main square, and the city is in flames."

Enemy Warship Sunk in Sudan Bay
