

Release Demanded Of Vessels Seized By United States

Germany and Italy Also Ask Crew Members Be Freed; State Department and Embassies Alike Decline to Reveal Text of Notes.

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—Germany and Italy have demanded that the United States release Axis ships taken into protective custody during the week-end and also members of the crews, it was learned reliably today. The demands were made in notes of protest lodged with the State Department by the Axis embassies late yesterday.

The State Department and the embassies alike declined to make public the contents of the notes. It was learned from informed sources, however, that both notes demanded release of the ships and the crews.

Challenges Right to Act Germany and Italy were said to have challenged the right of the United States to take possession of the ships or to take members of the crews into custody.

In neither note was there any mention of sabotage—the grounds which the government gave for taking over the ships—it was understood.

The notes were said to have disputed the right of the government to take the action under either international or domestic law.

Secretary of State Hull indicated that the protests were received with scant consideration and would have no effect on the government's policy.

In Berlin today, a German government spokesman charged that "the law has been solemnly suspended" in the United States ship action. However, he said he was not yet authorized to make a strictly official declaration.

Blansfield Proposes Segregation of Part of License Receipts to Aid Crash Victims.

State Capitol, Hartford, April 1.—(AP)—Senator Michael V. Blansfield (D., Waterbury) proposed today that instead of reducing automobile drivers' license fees, a portion of the receipts be segregated as a state accident fund to aid victims of highway accidents.

A bill which would cut the driver's license fee from \$3 to 50 cents, passed last Thursday by the Republican-controlled House in re- demption of a Republican cam- paign pledge, will come before the Senate for action this week.

Blansfield's plan proposed the raising of the state accident fund either through segregating \$2.50 from each license, or increasing the license fee by \$2.50 or \$5.

Increase Only For One Year He said the increase in the license fee might be necessary for only one year "so as to make the fund approximately twice as large to start the plan" and a reduction could then be made "after the plan has proved itself and experience has shown that a leader amount would safely carry the burden."

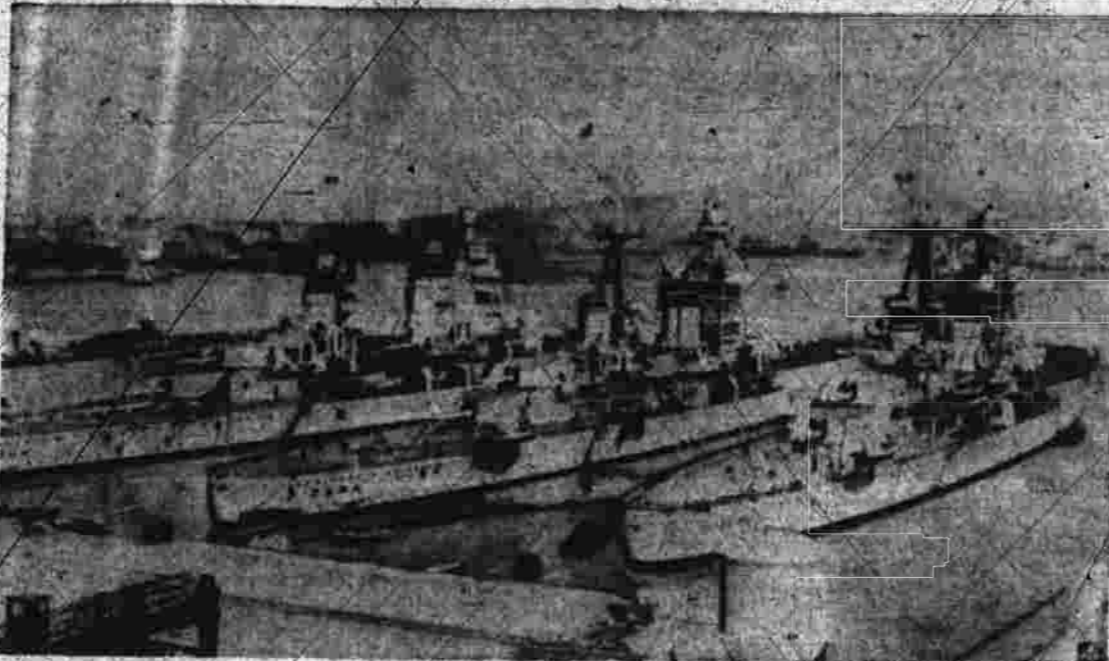

Italian Cruisers Sunk in Mediterranean Battle



The 10,000-ton Italian cruisers, Pola (left), Zara (center) and Flume (right) shown anchored in Naples harbor, were sunk by the British in the Mediterranean in what the British Admiralty described as the greatest sea battle of the war. Rome acknowledged the loss of three cruisers and two destroyers but claimed to have destroyed one British cruiser and to have damaged two other British warships. But information drawn from British officers who participated in the battle was to the effect that not a British ship was scratched and not a British seaman was hurt.

Peace in Soft Coal Industry Broken Today

Management and Union Negotiators Still Seek To Agree on Contract And Avert Shutdown.

New York, April 1.—(AP)—A two-year peace in the soft coal industry was broken today, but management and union negotiators, urged on by President Roosevelt, still sought to agree on a new contract and thus avert a general shutdown following the annual April 1 mine holiday.

As the negotiators met for the 15th day, deadlocked over the union demands for a \$1 a day wage boost for the several hundred thousand miners in the eight-state Appalachian area, they received reports of violence in the southeastern Kentucky coal fields.

Picketing started there early this morning, a few hours after the two-year contract expired, and almost immediately there were bursts of gunfire. A mine guard was wounded first and later a man identified as a picket was shot.

Most Mines Closed Because today was a holiday celebrated by the miners to commemorate the gaining of an eight-hour day, most mines were closed and the conferees thus had until midnight tonight to prevent an actual stoppage. Their immediate subject was Mr. Roosevelt's plea for "uninterrupted operation" of the mines.

At the end of the two-hour morning session, Dr. John P. Steelman, director of the U. S. Conciliation Service, spoke for both sides.

Two Wounded In Mine Row

Guard and Picket Victims in Clash Today In Harlan County.

Harlan, Ky., April 1.—(AP)—Two men were shot and wounded today as picket lines formed in the Harlan county coal fields after the United Mine Workers of America (U. M. W.) ordered miners to quit work last midnight until a new working contract is negotiated for the Appalachian area.

Earl Jones, about 52, a mine guard, was wounded at the Mary Helen Coal Corporation at Coal- good, about six miles from here.

At the Harlan-Central Coal Corporation at Tole, Frank Joyner, 34, identified by Capt. Green Lee of the Lynch, Ky., police department as a U. M. W. picket, was shot in the leg. Green said it was not immediately determined how Joyner was wounded. He was taken to the Lynch hospital.

First Reported Violence Between 40 and 50 automobiles loaded with pickets were on the property of the Mary Helen Corporation where Jones was shot. This was the first reported violence in the southeastern Kentucky coal fields after the union's order.

Sheriff Herbert Caywood arrested and charged with the shooting a man he identified as Bill Gibbs, about 50, a miner from the Black Mountain mine.

British Drop Better Bomb During Raids

New High Explosive Produces Devastating Results in Night Attack On Port of Emden.

London, April 1.—(AP)—A new type of explosive bomb produced results which "appeared to be devastating" in a British overnight raid on the German port and industrial city of Emden, the Air Ministry said today.

Bremen also was reported heavily hit, with ship-building yards the principal targets, but the ministry mentioned the new bombs—their nature not announced—only in the raid on Emden.

"Masses of debris flying through the air were outlined against the glow of the fire," a communique said in describing the effects, "and the results appeared to be devastating."

The Ministry of Information quoted a pilot as saying he saw "hoses take to the air" when the bombs burst.

Smaller-scale raids also were made on Bremerhaven and Oldenburg and the North-held Netherlands harbor of Rotterdam.

London Quiet 11th Night Although London was bomb-free for the eleventh successive night, German bombers caused "considerable damage" in sharp attacks at a northeast town.

British air units scored two bomb hits on a Nazi destroyer yesterday off the Frisian islands, causing her to halt with a heavy list, the Air Ministry said, and raided German supply ships.

They struck, too, at gun emplacements and troops in a series of offensive actions described as "busy and successful."

Shipping Losses Lower Losses of British, Allied and neutral merchant shipping for the week ended March 23 were lower than for the previous three weeks, the Admiralty said, listing 17 ships totalling 59,141 tons.

The German destroyer reported damaged was said by the Air Ministry to have been escorted by a small convoy. When last seen it was listing heavily and "black smoke was pouring from the stern," the N. W. S. Service said.

Aver British Hit Hospital At Bielefeld

German Declare 11 Patients Killed and Five Injured in Night Attack; Three Downed.

Berlin, April 1.—(AP)—Three tankers, aggregating about 24,000 tons, were bombed and destroyed by German planes in St. George's channel, west of Embroke this morning, according to German sources reported tonight. They said two other tankers, totaling 15,000 tons, were "so heavily damaged their loss must be assumed."

Berlin, April 1.—(AP)—British air raiders who flew over western Germany during the night damaged the famous Bethel charity hospital in the suburbs of Bielefeld, killing 11 patients and injuring five, the Germans declared today.

It was the second bombing of that group of hospital buildings near Bielefeld within a few weeks, the high command said.

Three of the attacking planes were downed, it stated, two by fire from patrol boats and one by an anti-aircraft battery. Two other British planes were said to have been shot down in air fights over the channel.

Hull and Great Yarmouth bore the brunt of Nazi night raids on Britain, the war bulletin said, and a ship was set afire in Great Yarmouth harbor.

In air operations over Britain a 1,000-ton merchant ship was hit and sunk in an attack on a convoy and another "large freighter damaged." The communique said four hangars also were "badly bombed" and set afire in a low-altitude raid on an air base in southern England.

Declaration Said to Have Been Proposed by Soviet But Ignored by Regent Prince Paul; Gaborovic Sent to Ankara as Special Envoy to Discuss Question; May Go to Moscow Also.

Belgrade, April 1.—(AP)—Government circles said today Yugoslavia's new government was seriously considering joining Soviet Russia and Turkey in a neutrality declaration. Such a declaration was said to have been proposed by the Soviet Union but ignored by Regent Prince Paul, who was ousted last week with the Cvetkovic government that signed the Axis three-power treaty.

(Russia and Turkey issued identical statements March 25 pledging each other "full and comprehensive neutrality" in the event that either was obliged to fight to defend her territory.)

See Psychological Effect Belief was expressed in informed quarters here that such a declaration could have an important psychological effect on the critical relations between Germany and Yugoslavia.

Milan Gaborovic, former Yugoslav minister to Moscow, and new minister without portfolio in the Yugoslav cabinet, was said to have been sent to Ankara as a special envoy to discuss the question, and then headed to Moscow.

Premier Gen. Dusan Simovic, gradually reorganizing the country, appointed four men friendly to his regime as district governors.

The government also delivered its offer to the demands of the Croat minority. Terms were not disclosed. Croat leaders, with Dr. Vidimir Macek presiding, studied the plan at Zagreb.

Beef Buying Still Fought

Amendment Offered to Compromise Controversy Among Senators.

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—Senator Adams (D-Colo.) sought today to compromise a Senate controversy over Army and Navy purchases of Argentine canned beef and other foreign products by offering an amendment to a \$4,539,000 defense appropriations bill permitting such purchases under restricted conditions.

With the administration planning to seek reconsideration of yesterday's 31 to 29 vote for prohibition of such purchases, Adams proposed that the Army and Navy be permitted to buy foreign food and clothing when similar articles could not be procured of satisfactory quality and in sufficient quantities and "at reasonable prices" in the United States.

Adams, who voted with the majority yesterday to insert the restriction in the bill, said he did not know whether his suggested substitute would permit the purchase of canned beef and wool in Latin-American countries under present conditions.

Substitute Not Satisfactory Senator Byrnes (D-SC), an opponent of the restriction, said he did not consider Adams' substitute satisfactory and indicated that the administration would pursue its plans to seek a reversal of yesterday's vote.

Police Rolling Fortress Disperses Picket Lines

Disorders Develop as Day Shift at Allis-Chalmers Factory Reports; No Tear Gas Used.

Milwaukee, April 1.—(AP)—The Milwaukee Police Department's rolling fortress—22 feet of armor plate manned by sharpshooters and tear gas bombers—again today broke up disturbances on strikers' picket lines at the Allis-Chalmers Mfg. Co. Lumbering along South 70th street, which bounds the west side of the huge factory in suburban West Allis, the awesome car commanded the respect of pickets at all times.

Disorders developed as the day shift of production workers reported for duty in the fourth day of a back-to-work movement requested by national defense officials. But the sight of the approaching fortress prompted picketers to fall back when it came within 100 feet of them.

Year Gas Not Used In contrast with last evening, when a sharp outbreak brought the monster's initial use, the police did not resort to tear gas. It was necessary only for the chauffeur to head his machine at the marching column to effect dispersal.

The car was loaned to the sheriff's department for use in the strike.

Foot policemen and deputy sheriffs battled with the crowd as the fortress moved from one trouble spot to another. One officer was smeared with yellow paint from a bottle thrown from the line.

Several fist fights between returning workers and members of the crowd broke out shortly before the first shift started to work at 8 a. m.

Italians Report Bitter Battle Between Cheren, Asmara in Eritrea.

Rome, April 1.—(AP)—The Italian high command reported today the British were hurling additional troops and mechanized troops into a bitter battle between Cheren and Asmara in Eritrea, but said the Fascist forces were "heroically resisting."

Elsewhere on the African war front, the daily communique reported only aerial operations.

Italian planes were reported to have bombed British troops at Jijiga, Ethiopia, and to have attacked British bases in North Africa with the cooperation of German fighters. Two British fighter planes were said to have been shot down in these actions.

"Night Damage" in Raid The Italians acknowledged a British air raid on Misrata, Fascist North Africa base 125 miles east of Tripoli, "causing slight damage" and some casualties.
