Tide Gauges Offer New Long-Range Forecasts

Woods Hole, Mass., April 14—

(P)—Discovery that the ocean tide gauges at Miami furnish longrange weather forecasts for such places as Chicago and New York has been made at the Oceanographic Institution here.

The gauges show that mean sea level off Florida is changing by half a foot, over long periods, due to fluctuations in the Gulf Stream.
