

Germans Fail to Reach Main Defenses; Hundreds of British Troops Captured

Ulster Target Of Nazi Raids During Night

Prolonged Attack Apparently Equals in Intensity Simultaneous Assaults Over England.
London, April 15.—(AP)—The German Air Force carried the war to Northern Ireland again last night, raining bombs over a large part of Ulster in a prolonged attack which apparently equalled in intensity simultaneous raids on many areas of England.
At the same time, the R. A. F. swept across the channel to attack Kiel, bombing that north-western port for the 35th time since the start of the war.
The British made no immediate mention of any plane losses, but declared six German raiders had been down over England.
A communique issued in Belfast said the German assault on northern Ireland which lasted several hours was "vicious and indiscriminate" in some areas and especially heavy. Damage to industrial premises and residential property was acknowledged.
It was the second sustained air attack Britain's North Irish allies have suffered, following by exactly one week a sharp assault in which nine persons were reported killed.
Departing from their usual procedure, the RAF raiders who attacked England last night concentrated over the country, instead of concentrating on a single town.
The government said the raids were on a "fairly heavy scale" and reported some damage was done to industrial premises, as well as to private homes. Casualties, however, were said to be not large.
One of the areas hardest hit was the big northwest coast port of Liverpool, where a number of people were killed and injured and bombs destroyed many working class homes.
Authorities said casualties in the city were light considering the scope of the attack, the number of planes participating and the amount of explosives dropped.
Assaults on a northeast coast area also were reported sharp.
No bombs fell in London, which had its first night alarm since April 10 and the capital's anti-aircraft batteries roared into action.

Knox Would Keep Laws on Strikes To Parleys Plans

Navy Secretary Would Resort to Every Possible Device to Bring Men Around Conference Table; Improve in Conditions.
Washington, April 15.—(AP)—Secretary Knox suggested today that Congress restrict legislation dealing with defense strikes to attempts to "bring the men around the conference table." He made the statement to the House Naval Committee when asked to elaborate on his remarks yesterday that he favored the "spirit" of a bill by Chairman Vinson (D., Ga.), to require a 30-day "cooling off" period before a strike could begin.
Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson (D., Tex.) asked the Navy secretary to explain his recommendation that the bill be "pruned up a bit."
"I think I would confine myself to doing everything and to resort to every possible device to bring the men around a conference table rather than a resort to strike and violence," Knox replied.
"Let's confine ourselves to what has been found effective thus far."
He referred to what he said was a great improvement in labor conditions lately—a change he attributed to the new Defense Mediation Board.
"The most effective weapon we have is public opinion. I would prefer to rely on public opinion in an hour of danger," Knox said.
"I think that what we have seen in the last two weeks has sent the exact result on public opinion. Labor leaders realize that they have built up public opinion outside labor that might be injurious to them."
Knox suggested that a union should be required to give 10 days notice of a defense strike to a mediation board, and the board have 20 days to investigate, and if its report failed to settle the controversy.

Aid Is Rushed To Thousands In Quake Belt

Dead and Injured Still Uncounted in Seven Mexican States; Toll Is Uncertain For Days.
Mexico City, April 15.—(AP)—Gov. Pedro Ferrer Ortiz of Colima state telegraphed today that the city of Colima, which has a population of 16,000, was "almost totally destroyed" in yesterday's earthquake. Federal troops have removed 30 bodies and nearly 100 of the injured from the scene, the governor telegraphed.
Thousands were homeless and the dead and injured still were uncounted today as the government rushed aid to stricken cities and towns of seven states in Mexico's southern earthquake belt yesterday.
Communications were crippled and the full magnitude of the disaster was not known.

Delays Action On Convoys

Senate Committee Defers Considering Ban On Using Navy Escorts
Washington, April 15.—(AP)—Avoiding an immediate showdown on the convoy issue, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee agreed unanimously today to delay until April 20 consideration of legislation forbidding the use of American Naval vessels for convoy purposes.
Members reported that the anti-convoy resolution proposed by Senator Tobey (R-N.H.), was made the "principal order of business" for April 20. In the interim, they said, the State Department will be asked to express its views on the proposed ban.
Tobey, who reported he would keep working to line up support for his proposal, "I am very confident," he asserted, "the committee did not wish to meet it" today.
Have Warm Argument
Tobey and Senate Majority Leader Barkley engaged in warm argument on the issue yesterday, the committee's spokesman said today on the convoy question at this time assumed added significance because of President Roosevelt's statement at a press conference yesterday that American merchant ships traveling the world's sea lanes outside of prohibited combat zones would be accorded full protection.
Simultaneously, Mr. Roosevelt told reporters such protection was not a policy but a matter of fact. Some legislators speculated that his statement meant, in effect, that Naval escorts would be provided any time a vessel under the American flag faced potential danger in delivering her cargo.
Such potential danger meant war, authorities generally agreed.

The wounded striker was identified as Nicholas Pollicotti, 24, by Patrolman Earl McCullough. Pollicotti returned to the picket line after a physician had treated the wound on his left cheek.
A man who was attempting to enter the plant at the time the shooting was taken into custody.
Speakers for the BWOC said the plant, which employs approximately 700, was closed light by the walkout. Company officials did not comment.
Surround Both Plants
The strike affecting the company's plants both here and at Reading, 15 miles away, was ordered last night. Pickets surrounded both plants this morning.
BWOC Sub-Regional Director George Medrick said the strike order resulted from "continued refusal" of the Birmingham Employers Beneficial Association, an industrial association, to agree to a contract.

Belfast Main Nazi Target

Attacks on Northern Ireland Described Blow Against War Stores.
Berlin, April 15.—(AP)—The port of Belfast was described today as the main target of German air attacks on Northern Ireland last night which, it was said, were a "blow against English supply centers and war material stores."
Bombing started numerous fires in the harbor area and among provisions on the Egyptian border, two other German planes at Fort Casazza on the Egyptian frontier, where a British force "still holds the port, the situation is unchanged," a communique said.
British sources in London said yesterday that these forces were in position to harass the Axis line of communications and that if a contingency arose they could always be withdrawn by sea.
The Royal Air Force and the Royal Australian Air Force were active throughout yesterday, an official communique said, and credited the RAF with destruction of four German planes at Fort Casazza on the Egyptian frontier, two others at Monastir and another at Derna.

Italians Claim Yugoslav Naval Base Captured

Split Taken After Advance of 240 Miles From Frontier Since Starting of Fighting.
Rome, April 15.—(AP)—Italian occupation of Yugoslavia's main naval base of Split and capture of Brzko in Albania from the Greeks were reported today by the Italian high command, the agency said.
Split, on Yugoslavia's Adriatic coast southeast of Zara, was said to have been taken after an advance of about 240 miles from the Italian-Yugoslav frontier since the start of fighting April 6.
Italian forces which moved into Brzko, 20 miles south of recaptured Coriza, continued their advance beyond the town, toward the nearby Greek frontier, the high command said.
Naval, Army and Blackshirt detachments were credited with extending Italian control over Yugoslavia's Dalmatian islands, four of which already had been reported taken.
New islands were reported taken by the coastal section northwest of Zara.

Antonescu, it was disclosed, told his cabinet yesterday that the murders were planned to take place during church services in the Easter holidays of the Orthodox church this coming week-end.
The premier said that Rumanian authorities were now rounding up the plotters.
Declined to Disclose Names
Antonescu declined to disclose the names of the suspects until a court-martial convenes, but he said they were members of the "death squad" of the outlawed Iron Guard.
The killing of a Bucharest book-seller a few days ago was officially described as a preliminary to the assassination plot.


