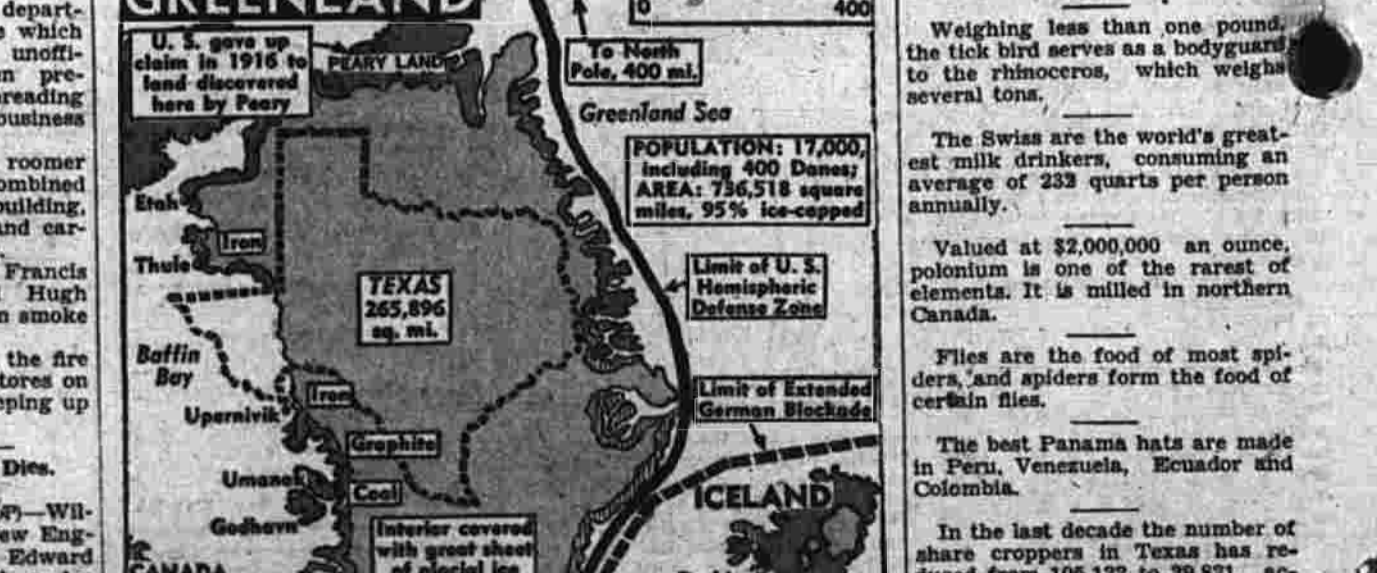

During New York's first future season more than \$100,000,000 was wagered. Morty Mahony, head of the mutuals department at many racetracks, has said right along that this season would bring even bigger business. His main reason is that the two-dollar tickets would become "educated" and their ranks would grow as a result.

Last year, state and tracks split well over \$100,000,000 in their per cent of the betting, in addition to "breakage" amounting to approximately \$20,000,000. Assuming the 1941 figures take the jump in betting, the total amount of bets placed by the first week, the melon cutting after this season will be \$14,000,000.

New York Bets Up 40 Per Cent

New York, April 19.—If the volume of betting for New York's five race tracks continues to top 1940 figures as it did during the first six days at Jamaica, the total for the current season may hit the amazing mark of \$140,000,000, a jump of about 40 per cent over last year.

New York's first full betting season was recorded last year, with an attendance of 61,850. After the initial six days of this season, \$4,449,115 had passed through the tracks and the turnstile clicked for 102,085. If corresponding increases are recorded for the full 29 weeks of racing, the 1941 increase would total \$40,400,438 in wagering and \$4,009 in attendance.

In 1940, the Jamaica meeting opened on a Monday, so that the track had a big week-day opening well as Saturday in its first week. This season the inaugural race is a Saturday so that the figures for the first six days take in only one "big day" advantage this season over the better weather and a larger, more up-to-date plant to handle the crowd.

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Army Convoys Right of Way

Hartford, April 19.—Motor Vehicles Commissioner Michael A. Connor today asked the cooperators to help him in his drive in the area where motorized military units are manuevering, or army convoys are using public highways.

Commissioner Connor said that he has had numerous letters from drivers who have observed men in army uniform standing in the highways thumbing rides.

The army has asked motorists, the commissioner said, "not to pick up men in uniform who are signaling for a ride. A soldier is not allowed to leave camp unaccompanied and he has sufficient funds to get him home."

It is against the law in this state for anyone to stand in the road to throw up a handkerchief or to encourage a practice that is dangerous for both the pedestrian and the motorist.

The commissioner urged motorists to avoid areas where military traffic is likely to be encountered. If areas are found to be temporarily closed by military units, the commissioner said, "it is not the law to encourage a practice that is dangerous for both the pedestrian and the motorist."

Haiti's Famed Citadel Built by Slave-King

The Citadel of Haiti's Emperor Henri Christophe, pictured on the Pan American poster stamp above, is one of the wonders of the western hemisphere.

The Citadel is a mountain stronghold, located on a 3000-foot peak, now accessible to tourists. It has walls 16 feet thick, 200 feet high, barriers for 10,000 troops, storehouses, cannon emplacements, arsenals. The massive fort was built by Henri Christophe, ruler of Haiti, as a refuge for his people in case France should try to regain possession of the island of St. Kitts. He ran away, became a leader in Haiti's slave uprising against the French in 1804. He became president of Northern Haiti in 1807, was crowned five years later.

Haiti prospered under Christophe's rule. He built schools, churches, roads, hospitals, the magnificent palace of Sans Souci and the Citadel. Legend relates that he killed himself with a silver bullet when the people revolted.

Lights blazed for five minutes starting at 10:10 p. m. (e. a. l.). Electricity was left on in homes, but many householders cooperated by putting out their lights. The city's fire department and trolley cars stopped as streets were dark.

Trucks crowded surrounding hills or milled about downtown to get a best view of a blackout.

The "bombers" took off from Allegheny County Airport, and at 10:10 p. m. were circling at 2000 feet over the business section. Ground searchlights tried to pick them out.

They twinkled for miles in suburbs below, and steel mills, bridges, and armaments plants, flames and smoke skyward.

The objective was to show that the city's famous river-bordered "Golden Triangle" of office buildings, houses, and stores was fairly dim.

"Drop all bombs, incendiary and explosive" was the crisp order. Lieutenant Merritt reduced the population of metropolitan Pittsburgh to a few low-powered flares were hurled from the planes.
