

Extension of Time For Appointments Wanted by Hurley

Governor Recommends Setting May 13 Instead Of May 1 as Final Date For Making gubernatorial Nominations to Prevent Program Jam.

Bulletin: State Capitol, Hartford, April 29.—(P)—At the request of Gov. Robert A. Hurley, the General Assembly extended today the deadline for making gubernatorial nominations from May 1 to May 13.

State Capitol, Hartford, April 29.—(P)—Gov. Robert A. Hurley, saying that he wished to give the General Assembly "every opportunity" to consider proposed legislation before it, recommended today in a special message that the time for making gubernatorial nominations be extended from May 1 to May 13.

"While confirmation of appointments is a necessary legislative function, you will agree with me that the enactment of legislation is of first importance," said the Democratic chief executive.

Early in the session, the governor asserted that he intended to subordinate patronage to legislation, and only last week reiterated that he would not make any major appointments until the Legislature acted on the more important administration proposals.

Expected Action Today Governor Hurley said he understood his request for the extension of the appointments deadline would be acted upon by the General Assembly today.

It was understood a copy of the proposed change in the law had been given Republican Floor Leader William L. Hadden for discussion in the House Republican caucus held at the start of each legislative week.

Before the Legislature and its committee, the governor said in his message, are now "important proposals embodying legislation which affects the public welfare."

"It is because of this fact that I wish to make available to the members of these committees and the members of the General Assembly every opportunity for their continued consideration of this legislation."

Senate Approves Delay Bill Within a few minutes after receiving the governor's message, the Senate approved a bill embodying his recommendation. The proposal was unanimously approved and sped to the House.

The Senate also approved a bill extending from May 1 to May 13 the life of a special commission.

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Will Observe African War James Roosevelt and Major Thomas Arrive At Chungking Today.

Chungking, China, April 29.—(P)—Capt. James Roosevelt of the United States Marines arrived by plane today accompanied by Maj. Gerald C. Thomas for conferences with government leaders and advisers they would go from here to observe the British-African campaign.

African campaign president's eldest son received an enthusiastic welcome at the airport.

Replying to greetings from government representatives, he said: "I bring the president's greetings to all in Chungking. Personally I consider being here a great privilege."

Roosevelt later told newsmen he hoped to observe the African campaign as far as Ethiopia.

Adviser Warns False He said rumors that he came to Chungking as an adviser were "entirely false," he came here to learn.

The captain added that he and Major Thomas were particularly interested in observing military conditions and transportation in the United States attitude toward China, he asserted, could be described best by the phrase: "We won't let our friends down." He had an engagement with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek to present a written message from President Roosevelt this afternoon.

Meet Finance Minister. The American visitors met Chinese Finance Minister H. H. Kung this morning and lunched with United States Ambassador Nelson I. Johnson.

Tomorrow they will fly to Chungking to meet General Chang Chun, governor of Szechwan province.

Jones Avers Debt May Go To 90 Billions

Commerce Secretary Asserts There Are Plenty Of Sacrifices in Store For Americans Now.

Washington, April 29.—(P)—The War Department announced today that Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's resignation as a Reserve Air Corps officer had been accepted.

The famous flier had written President Roosevelt he was tendering his resignation because the president's comments on him at a press conference last Friday left "no honorable alternative."

While it has been the War Department's policy not to accept resignations from Reserve officers during the emergency period, Secretary Stimson possessed discretionary power to act favorably or unfavorably.

In the conference the president compared the flier and other persons who predicted defeat of Britain by Germany to the copperheads of the Civil war. The term was applied to northerners who were wavering about whether we could afford to increase government borrowing authority above \$45,000,000,000.

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Urges Clarification On Exempt Expense Coal Miners To Go Back On Thursday

Investment Adviser Asserts Individual Handicapped by Technical Wording of Statute.

Washington, April 29.—(P)—A spokesman for Lewis announced today that the United Mine Workers union announced today that soft coal production would be resumed Thursday morning in the nation's bituminous fields shut down since April 1 in a dispute over a new wage contract.

The announcement was made by a spokesman for Union President John L. Lewis after he had discussed with his district presidents the decision of southern producers last night to accept President Roosevelt's proposal to reopen the mines.

The union said it had received the notice from L. Eberhart Gaines, chairman of the southern producers' group, that the latter was willing to negotiate a new agreement with the miners' union to be made retroactive to the date of resumption of coal production.

The end of the month-old controversy which has kept the mines shut since April 1 came late last night when Presidential Secretary Stephen Early announced that the southern operators had accepted a proposal by the president to reopen the southern mines and negotiate a wage agreement with the UMW on a retroactive basis to the date of resumption.

Decision Provides Surprise The decision of the southern operators to put a \$1 a day wage boost into effect at once—raising the southern rate from \$5.50 to \$6.50—was a surprise.

Capture 2,000 Italians The British Commission was reported today to have captured 2,000 Italian and 400 colonial soldiers in the event of a formal agreement to take them.

At least two-thirds of the German and Italian vessels were escorted by their crews before being taken to protective custody a month ago. Since that time maritime engineers have surveyed the vessels and outlined just what needs to be done to restore them to operating condition.

Decision Expected Soon The administration has yet to make an official disclosure of its plans for the ultimate disposition of the seized merchantmen, but there were some grounds for the belief that a decision would be forthcoming soon. At the time of the seizure, one high official said, the government probably would hold the ships for 30 days to determine what can be done with them.

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Nazi Units Approach South Greek Ports; Attack Battleships

Scharnhorst and Gneisenau at Brest Targets For 12th Time During Month; Still in Port Because They Are So Badly Damaged Nazis Unable to Move Them; Only One Hit Claimed.

London, April 29.—(P)—The R.A.F. raided the Nazi battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau at Brest last night for the 12th time in a month and a well-informed source said the vessels still were in the French port because they were so badly damaged the Germans couldn't move them.

The British officially have claimed only one hit on one of the 26,000-ton men-o-war, but this source said their continued presence in such an accessible port to the R.A.F. was proof enough that there had been more.

The likely thing for the Germans to do, he asserted, would be to move the two powerful surface raiders the minute the British showed they knew where the ships were. He recalled that the German cruiser Hipper "disappeared" from Brest after she was bombed a second time by the R.A.F. on March 2.

Bombs Straddle Warships Several Air Ministry communiques have claimed that British bombs straddled the warships, one of which is in drydock and the other tied up beside a wharf.

Military quarters reckoned that a nearby hit on a dock would be almost as effective as a direct hit. Or a hit on a barracks, it was argued, might wipe out essential crewmen.

The German Air Force, in turn, concentrated the weight of its night raiding upon Plymouth on a two-hour attack in which the government said "some fires were started, but casualties are not believed to have been heavy."

The German night activities extended as far north as south Wales and along the east coast of England.

One invading bomber was reported destroyed. Thousands of fire and oil bombs were showered by the Germans on Plymouth.

Fourth in Seven Nights The raid was the fourth on that southwestern naval base in the last seven nights, but it was described as less severe than the previous ones.

This latest assault came about a few hours after the victims of the raid were being evacuated.

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Axis Advance Held in Check

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German Guns Pound Dover

Heaviest Cross-Channel Action of War So Far Expected With Invasion Move.

Dover, England, April 29.—(P)—For nearly six hours today German guns on the French coast shelled Dover strait, the heaviest such cross-channel action of the war and the start is expected with any invasion attempt.

Berlin reported a spotbomb attack on that section of the English coast, apparently timed to coincide with the shelling.

A British gun replied, making it a mammoth duel across 20 miles of water, and the R. A. F. dropped out to blast at the Nazi emplacement.

Damage Negligible The British Press Association reported at 8.30 p. m. (8:30 a. m. E. S. T.) that the shelling stopped and added that damage to the southeastern corner of England—long known as "hell corner"—was negligible, confined to cottages.

After the Germans had fired single shells for three hours they stepped up the barrage, using four-gun and six-gun salvos at intervals of about three minutes.

Harbors Described as Only Ones Available For Removing Remainder of British and Greek Soldiers Still Fighting; Germans Reaching into Southern Peloponnese.

Berlin, April 29.—(P)—Informal sources said tonight that German troops were "approaching the last harbors in extreme southern and southwestern Greece." These harbors were described as the only ones available for removing the remainder of the British and Greek forces still fighting in Greece.

The high command had said only that the Germans were reaching into the southern half of the Peloponnese in their pursuit of the Allies.

These informed quarters said that the British had been cutting back on sailing ships and other small vessels—even fishing boats—in their flight to Crete, about 75 miles away.

Shipping Ships Attacked "Numerous sailing ships on the strand and during passage were bombed and machine-gunned," they said.

"Many were sunk and others were damaged and rendered unusable. The Dunkerque episode was repeated."

In the retreat from Flanders at the end of last May and the beginning of June, British and French forces were ferried across the Dover strait to England in all manner of boats, including the smallest capable of making the crossing.

By all indications, Crete, Greece's largest island and now seat of her government and base for the British, is next in line for attack after the mainland strip.

The "mopping up" today's communiques said, had progressed to the point where the island was being evacuated.

Rejects Cabinet Change London, April 29.—(P)—With a snappy "No sir," Prime Minister Churchill flatly rejected today a suggestion that he form a stream-lined cabinet and called for a vote of confidence next week on his conduct of the war.

Churchill put the question of his conduct of the war in general and the ill-starred Italian campaign in particular before the House in announcing that debate would be held next week on the entire issue.

Daniel Gilbert announced, then beat her mother and himself with his revolver. Gilbert said he believed the slayer, Doree Moriarty, 40, was temporarily unbalanced mentally. The victim was Miss Ada Jeanie Martin, 24, whose mother, Ada Gilbert said, is under indictment for conspiracy to commit an abortion. The captain said he believed Moriarty had been advised by Mrs. Martin's plea that he use his influence at the state's attorney's office in her behalf and lost control of himself.

Kills Wife and Children Mobile, Ala., April 29.—(P)—State Solicitor Bart B. Chamberlain's helper, had admitted killing his wife and fatally burning his five young children in their two-room farmhouse. Gibson's statement, Chamberlain said, was a gruesome, weird story of jealousy and hatred.
