Virtually Unlimited Aid Seen Promised In Roosevelt Talk

View Taken by Members of Party Accompanying President; Nye Comments If Speech Feeler for War Declaration Surprise Seen.

Washington, May 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's declaration that the American people are ever ready to fight again for democracy was interpreted in high administration quarters today as carrying a new promise of virtually unlimited assistance to nations resisting aggression.

This view was taken by some members of the party which accompanied the president to Staunton, Va., where he made a speech yesterday in dedicating the birthplace of Woodrow Wilson as a national shrine.

In Washington, Senator Nye (R., N. D.) commented that the president is making a feeler for a declaration of war he will be quickly surprised to see that the people of America do not want to be involved.

Official in the presidential party noted, on the other hand, that he did not say Americans were ready to go to war and draw a distinction between that and his actual words. In the present situation, they said, it was a broad term covering strong material support of democratic nations rather than military involvement in the war.

While the president spoke only of principle, developments in Washington indicated a growing pressure for further specific action on the problem of delivering war supplies to Britain, and the whole subject apparently was due for an early and thorough airing in the Senate.

A crowd of notables and plain people heard the chief executive's address from a small platform on the walk in front of the old house in which the World War president was born.

To Dedicate New Shrine "We are meeting here today to dedicate a new shrine of freedom to Mr. Roosevelt said. "But this shrine is not a shrine of freedom to the faith that is in us—a simple faith in the freedom of democracy in the world."

"It is the kind of faith for which we have fought before, for the existence of which we are ever ready to fight again."

Woodrow Wilson's career, the president said, "was a triumph of the spirit over the world of brute strength and he declared that 'physical strength can never permanently withstand the impact of spiritual force.'"

Furthermore, he said, Wilson "taught that democracy could not survive in isolation. We applaud his judgment and his faith."

To Reconsider Murder Case

Supreme Court Agrees Life Should Not Depend on Split Decision.

Washington, May 5.—(AP)—The Supreme Court agreed today to reconsider its recent four-to-four decision upholding the wife murder conviction of Robert S. James, an Angeles barber, at whose trial two live ratbats were displayed to the jury.

In his petition for rehearing, James contended that "no death penalty should be imposed through what is really a lack of decision by the highest court of the nation."

He asserted that "where constitutional questions are involved, the conviction and death sentence of a man is a matter of life and death and that the case may be decided by a majority of the court."

Result of Rehearing The four-to-four decision was made possible by the retirement last Feb. 7 of Justice James C. McHugh. The tribunal has granted rehearing in several other cases decided by an evenly divided vote.

The state alleged that James continued his wife in a bath as part of a plan to collect insurance, after falling to produce death by trusting her foot into a box containing two ratbats.

Pickets Foil Try to Open Electric Plant

General Motors Tells Workers Gates Will Be Open But Does Not Ask Them to Return.

Warren, O., May 5.—(AP)—General Motors Corp. responded tonight to workers today, but 500 pickets surrounded the plant gates, and observers reported no employees entered on the 7 a. m. shift.

The company had advised workers that the "plant gates will be open," but did not ask them to return to work. A dispute over wage rates and the dismissal of certain employees closed the factory last Thursday, making 1,600 employees idle.

It manufactures electrical wiring for airplanes, tanks and tractors.

About half the pickets were women. Two maintenance workers were among those turned back at the gates. Sixteen policemen stood by.

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Nazi Air Force Active After Belfast Attack

Follows Up Founding of Northern Ireland Capital, Liverpool, Other Targets by Scouting.

London, May 5.—(AP)—Re-surgency in widespread daylight activity, the German Air Force today followed up last night's pounding of Belfast, capital of Northern Ireland, Liverpool and other targets in England and Scotland.

British fighters were said authoritatively to have downed a German fighter over the channel this afternoon.

The daylight activity appeared to be mostly reconnaissance, but four Messerschmitts made a hit on a village in southern England this afternoon, dropping a few bombs and firing a few machinegun and cannon rounds.

Business Premises in Rutland Many business premises in Rutland were reported to be damaged by the raid. The damage there acknowledged "much damage to commercial, industrial and residential property."

Amphibious from Dublin were on duty throughout the raid and Ireland (Eire) also sent fire-fighting equipment as had done before.

Nazi bombers pounded also at Liverpool—for the fourth successive night—in apparent continuation of the German effort to wreck British ports at which the United States aid might be received.

Attack Heavy and Sustained The air attack on Belfast last night was heavy and sustained, it was reported from the Northern Ireland Ministry of National Security and Northern Ireland R. A. F. headquarters.

Large numbers of incendiaries were reported to have been dropped on the city.

Nazi Warships Hit by Bombs During Attack

British Report Heavy Action Over France, Holland and Norway, Against Nazi Shipping.

London, May 5.—(AP)—British bombers scored hits on the German battleships Gneisenau and Scharnhorst last night in an attack on the Naval base at Brest, the Air Ministry reported today.

Many heavy bombs were dropped and hits were observed on and very near the battle cruisers.

Widepread bombing action over France, the Netherlands and Norway and against shipping at sea last night and in daylight yesterday was reported.

Doors and Shipping at Rotterdam, Antwerp and Le Havre were said to have been attacked and a direct hit was reported on a supply ship of 1,500 tons.

A patrol vessel was said to have been bombed and left sinking in a daylight foray.

The course which said were started in a raid last night on the ports of St. Nazaire and Cherbourg, and an airdrome at Quereville was attacked.

Claim of Hit It was pointed out that this was the first air communiqué officially claiming hits on the ships, although a hit was mentioned recently in the citation of an R. A. C. pilot.

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Most of Iraq Planes Destroyed by British; Vital Flow of Oil Cut

British Predict That If Axis Influences Win In Middle East Kingdom Next Thrust Will Be at Neighboring Iran Fourth Greatest Oil Producer in World; British Hold Air Base.

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Reports from Cairo indicated British troops still were holding out last night at their besieged air base at Lake Habbaniyah, 80 miles west of Baghdad, and that A. F. bombers had taken the offensive striking to cripple Iraq's small Air Force.

What the British call the pro-German government which Premier Rasheed Ali Al Gailani set up in a coup April 4 was attacked verbally, meanwhile, by the Emir Abdul Ilah, deposed regent. He declared in Palestine that he would return to restore "lawfully constituted government."

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Steel Firm Better All Nazi Output

United States Steel Corporation Tells Speed on Finished, Rolled Products

Hoboken, N. J., May 5.—(AP)—One American company, United States Steel Corp., is turning out steel faster than all the mills in Germany, the company's board chairman, Irving S. Olof, disclosed to stockholders today.

This rate of steel making, he said, equaled the combined production of Great Britain, France and Belgium in 1939.

In the first three months of this year, said Olof, rolled and finished products were turned out by U. S. Steel at 100.9 per cent of the "total capacity" previously believed possible.

Olof showed the small group of assembled stockholders 60 stereoscopic slides of the company's steel-making process, including the blast furnaces, the open-hearth furnaces, the rolling mills and the finishing mills.

Heavy casualties were inflicted on the Axis forces, which still are holding a small sector in Tobruk's outer defenses, the war bulletin said.

East Africa, the high command announced a further advance against Amhara, Abba, some 250 miles northeast of Addis Ababa.

British planes have shot down four Nazi raiders over the Greek island of Crete, the British Royal Air Force reported today, indicating the Germans were beginning a long-expected intensive attack on Greece's new headquarters.

Destroy Other Nazi Planes The war bulletin said anti-aircraft guns destroyed other Nazi planes over the island to which King George II of Greece and his ministers fled before the fall of Athens.

In Libya, it reported, R. A. F. bombers raided the Axis air bases at Derna and Benina, near Benghazi. At least 100 Axis motor transport vehicles were listed as severely damaged by air attacks in North and East Africa.

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German Might Said Stronger Than Coalition

Hitler Declares What Has Been Won Cannot Be Wrested From Her 'By Any World Power'

Berlin, May 5.—(AP)—Germany and her allies form a mightier combination than any other possible coalition in the world today, Adolf Hitler declared Sunday, and "neither force nor time will make us yield, let alone break us."

Wast Germany has won, he cried, cannot be wrested from her. "By any world power."

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4 Ships Set Afire in Raid

Nazi Attacks on Belfast Aircraft Factories.

Berlin, May 5.—(AP)—Luftwaffe raiders pounded Belfast, Northern Ireland, last night, set afire four ships in the harbor and started tremendous fires and explosions in aircraft industrial plants, the German high command announced today.

The daily war bulletin spoke of Belfast as "an important inland harbor," referring, apparently, to its possible use as a receiving point for war supplies from the United States.

Aircraft Plant in Flames The Vickers-Armstrong aircraft plant at Belfast was said to have been hit in a raid.

Other Nazi units blasted, for the fourth night in a row, at the Merseyside area around Liverpool, also considered an important port of entry for American supplies.

Damage to port and military works of the British Mediterranean Fleet also announced today.

Two British planes were declared downed in air battle over the island.

The war bulletin said that on the North African front operations are continuing around British-held Tobruk, Libya, port 80 miles from the Egyptian frontier.

It failed to mention operations in the Salum sector, on the Egyptian-Egyptian frontier.

British Attacks Reported The high command declared that British attacks in the Abba sector of Ethiopia, about 250 miles northeast of Addis Ababa, had been repulsed with heavy British losses.

Among the dead there, the war bulletin added, were several officers and men.
