Revised Bank Life Insurance Law Is Passed by Senate

Only One 'No' Heard On Voice Vote; Must Be Returned to House; Minimum Wage Bill Reported Favorably; Milk Act Is Favored.

State Capitol, Hartford, May 7.—(AP)—The Senate passed today the House-approved savings bank life insurance bill after amending it to reconcile differences between Democrats and Republicans. Only one "No" was heard when the Senate took a voice vote on the measure...

Because of the amendments agreed to at a conference of legislative leaders yesterday, the bill must now be returned to the House.

Wage Bill Favored A state wage and hour bill providing time and a half pay for overtime after 48 hours in any week and for an ultimate minimum wage of 40 cents an hour was reported favorably today in the Senate.

Reported favorably in the Senate also was a milk bill approved yesterday by the Senate Agricultural Committee and differing in some major respects from a bill approved at the same time by the House Committee.

The wage-hour bill, designed to cover employees in interstate commerce not affected by the Federal act, fixed a minimum thirty cents effective Oct. 1, 1941, with annual increases until the 40-cent level is reached Oct. 1, 1945.

Trade School Blocked The House blocked action today on a Senate-approved appropriation of \$237,000 for a new vocational trade school after a sharp debate in which Democratic Floor Leader T. Emmett Clark charged the move was a "log-rolling" one.

By a 117-88 vote which cut across party lines, the House rejected the appropriation at the foot of the calendar until Waterbury and New Haven trade school appropriations are ready for consideration.

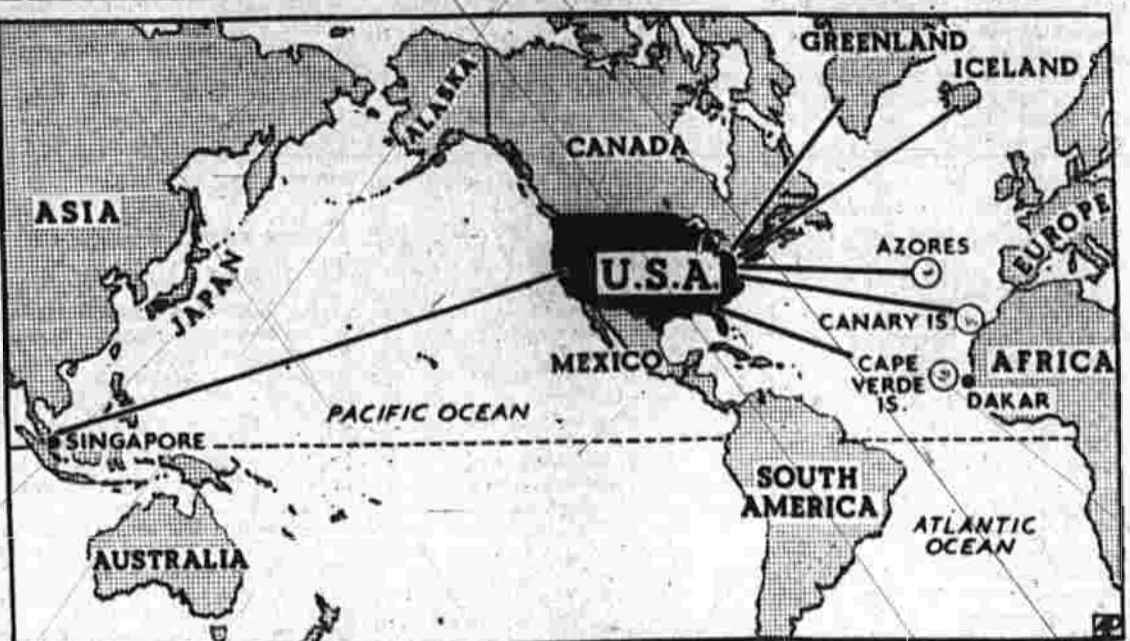

Raiders Press Drive to Shut Off Supplies

Nazi Attack Not Only Ships But Ports and Shipbuilding Yards in Night Air Operations.

Berlin, May 7.—(AP)—German air raiders pressed their drive to choke off Britain's overseas supplies with attacks not only on ships but also on ports and shipbuilding yards, the high command reported today of overnight air operations.

Very strong Air Force combat formations last night again made fierce attacks on wharves, armament plants and supply facilities in Clyde harbor, the communistic said.

A large number of explosives and incendiaries were dropped, having primarily on shipbuilding centers around Glasgow. Further successful air raids were directed against the port and wharf facilities in Liverpool, Newcastle, Plymouth and other harbors of the British south and southeast coast.

Large Merchant Ship Sunk The sinking of a 10,000-ton merchant ship, the English coast was "apparent," the war bulletin said, and a second large ship was heavily damaged.

It called British night raids on northern Germany "effective harassment attacks" which caused neither military nor "war-economic" damage.

London, May 7.—(AP)—The British House of Commons gave Winston Churchill an overwhelming vote of confidence today after he had disclosed that nearly 500,000 Imperial soldiers stand guard against the Axis in the Middle East and that Britain expects enough new American merchant ships to see her through 1942 in the Battle of the Atlantic.

The prime minister, who had declared that "We intend to defend to the death and without thought of retirement Crete and Tobruk."

He is on Crete, his island to the south of the Greek mainland, that the British and Greeks are making their first stand as allies. It is in Tobruk, Libya, 80 miles from the Egyptian border, that a British garrison is holding out behind the Axis advance lines.

House Nearing Vote on Ships

Reconditioning of 28 Sabotaged Vessels Proceeding; Passage Seen.

Washington, May 7.—(AP)—While reconditioning of 28 sabotaged Axis ships proceeded apace today, the House neared a final vote on legislation to authorize President Roosevelt to requisition idle foreign vessels in United States ports for the nation's defense.

A Maritime Commission official left small doubt that the 28 Italian and two German vessels were made seaworthy in anticipation of passage of the legislation. He said when questioned, that the Treasury and Maritime Commission "thought it would be a good idea to have the ships in good condition."

The vessels—and two other Italian ships in which no evidence of sabotage was found—were taken into protective custody by the Coast Guard several weeks ago.

Predict House Passage Administration leaders predicted that the ship bill would be dispatched to the president's desk after disposing of final efforts to amend it.

Representative Van Zandt (R., Pa.) said an amendment had been prepared to eliminate a section which would authorize Secretary of Commerce Jones to waive compliance with any laws relating to masters, officers, members of the crew or crew accommodations on any vessel which might come under jurisdiction of the Maritime Commission.

That would waive all laws regarding working conditions, health and everything else," Van Zandt objected.

Representative Bland (D., Va.) in charge of the measure on the floor, said that certain laws necessarily must be waived because of differences between crew accommodations on American and foreign ships.

Bowron Re-Elected Los Angeles Mayor

Los Angeles, May 7.—Mayor Fletcher Bowron, former Superior judge swept into office nearly three years ago as a reform candidate, was re-elected yesterday by a two-term margin.

He defeated Stephen W. Cunningham, city councilman pledged to a business administration, with only about half the city's registered voters casting their ballots.

French to Be Hungry During Months Ahead

Will Lay Blame in Order on Germany, Herself, England and United States.

(Editor's Note: Preston Grever, veteran newsman who has been stationed in Paris for the last four months, paints a broad picture of the social and economic problems of the French under German rule. The French daily stories for The Associated Press and The Herald, of which this is the first, tomorrow: French Industry Woes; French Industry Woes; French Industry Woes.)

Paris.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press, Via Radio.)

France is poised to be a hungry nation in the months ahead.

For this situation she will lay the blame in almost this order: 1. Germany; second, France herself; third, England, and fourth, the United States.

To Italy the average Frenchman will ascribe no blame in accounting for France's present condition.

Reasons Offered for Grouping

The reasons offered for this grouping are relatively simple:

1. Germany conquered France and the French naturally place the weight of blame on the German for the present shortage of food, industrial inactivity and general distress.

2. The French have seen the German occupy and unoccupied France is badly organized—in part, of course, because the country has by the almost impassible line of demarcation between the German-occupied and unoccupied zones.

3. In turn, the French blame the British, because they have not privately, for enforcing the blockade against their beaten ally.

Finally, there is some relatively limited amount of criticism of the United States for trying to French funds and preventing large shipments of food.

New Process of Living

Since the defeat, a whole new process of living has been imposed upon the French. Previously the limitations on food and clothing purchases were relatively light. The average Frenchman bought about what he needed.

France is a naturally rich country, her people generally frugal and her stores of food and raw materials in preparation for war was considered good. All these things, it could, however, have been even better.

Then came the May offensive of the German Army, the quick capitulation of Paris last June, and the armistice terms—and France began to see how times had changed.

Until that time, it is stated by observers who were on the ground, France had not really taken the war seriously.

Seriously Short of Food

As things stand now, France is seriously short of food. The German Army in France is eating quite a lot and admits it.

Except for a considerable withdrawal to Germany of cattle and pigs, the German drain on the French food supply is limited largely to what soldiers' France eat. The German themselves supply a portion of the food their soldiers eat.

One well-informed source estimated that the occupied section of France—the rich northern provinces taken over by Germany—has enough wheat in store to last until the harvest—roughly a five month supply.

But the southern portion of France, operating under the Vichy government—poor in grain land—has perhaps a two-month supply.

At present, negotiators for the two areas—with German representation included—are arranging a transfer of wheat from occupied to unoccupied France. In return, the unoccupied zone is being asked to give up considerable quantities of wine, oil, pigs and cattle.

The present exchange schedule calls for the occupied zone to ship 800,000 tons of wheat, 210,000 tons of sugar, 100,000 tons of stock feed and 80,000 tons of potatoes.

In return, unoccupied France would ship to the German-occupied section 180,000 large cattle, 566,000 head of smaller stock, 600,000 pigs and calves, 36,000 tons of edibles, 150,000 tons of malt, 60,000 tons of green vegetables, 60,000 tons of fruit and 8,000 tons of cheese.

Not Very Even Exchange

It doesn't work out as a very even exchange on a cash basis, but negotiators for the occupied zone declare that it is in part a matter of supply and demand. That southern France is in desperate need of grain and must be expected to shell out liberally of her own resources in return.

It is likely that northern French negotiators expect a considerable portion of the goods supplied from southern France to come from the French African colonies.

How much grain Germany has taken from northern France has not been disclosed, but well-informed sources are convinced that the average Frenchman has an unappreciated idea of the amount of grain taken—and would be about double the amount necessary to feed the more than 16,000,000 French prisoners now held in Germany.

Ample Supply of Food

Then there is the potato question. In Europe, the potato has become almost a symbol of food or famine. That is especially true of France and Germany, where among other things the potato moves in to take the place of bread when that runs short, as it often does.

War Worries Bring Lunacy

Paralysis of Mind and Soul Explains Conditions in Europe.

Richmond, Va., May 7.—A paralysis of mind and soul which has been caused by war, was described by The American Psychiatric Association here today.

Worry is a recognized consequence of all insanity. But great numbers of these mental cases have not really a thing to worry about.

In looking for an explanation of this worry with no cause, Dr. J. Kasanin, of Mt. Zion hospital, San Francisco, found a condition which he said explains what has happened to masses of people in Europe, and may yet happen to many Americans.

First Cause in Straggle Case

The first clue was in the strange case of a young woman, of 31, known for her beauty, charm and social appeal to both men and women. She rather suddenly began to be greatly embarrassed when she was with a man.

For no apparent reason her breathing would speed up until her chest heaved. She would give the appearance of tremendous excitement.

Yet, inwardly, she felt little excitement. She had no control over the strange actions. Worry was about the only cause she could account for.

Examination revealed a tumor in an adrenal gland. Removal of this tumor stopped the worry and the false excitement in male society.

Mind Seemingly Paralyzed

A boy with a brain tumor developed worries less dramatic but more dangerous because his mind seemed paralyzed, he could move freely, yet was unable to eat, and finally sobbing "seemed" real, he sank into almost complete apathy.

The difference, Dr. Kasanin explained, between this kind of worry and the ordinary mentally-caused variety is usually in volume. The physically-induced worry is almost overwhelming. The victim puts up a terrific battle with his feelings, until virtual mental paralysis results.

War worry, Dr. Kasanin said, has not, at first, anything to do with diseased internal organs. But when this worry becomes all-pervasive, it gets just as continuous as the organic worries of these two persons.

Candid X-Ray Aiding Science

Fast-Acting Little Camera Lowers Cost of Diagnosis Much.

Pittsburgh, May 7.—Give cheer, you shutterbugs. The candid camera with which you risk life and limb for "that picture" has graduated from the fad class into a new role—an ally of medical science.

Technicians displayed examples today of how they have enlisted the fast-acting little camera to lower the cost of X-ray diagnosis and expressions in schools and industrial plants financially feasible.

In the new methods photographs are snapped with assembly line speed and precision at a cost of from two to three cents a print.

The candid camera with the medical degree is similar to the one carried by the average shutterbug. It has an F. 1.8 high speed lens and uses movie size, 35 mm. film. The X-ray pictures are examined in a specially constructed apparatus which enlarges the picture four times.

Experts of The Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company's X-ray Division today demonstrated the "candid X-ray" to the joint meeting of The American Association of Industrial Physicians and Surgeons and The American Industrial Hygiene Association, now in session here.

The Pittsburgh School Board, a pioneer in American educational methods, already has adopted the "candid X-ray" plan to examine all children among its 140,000 students showing a positive reaction to a tuberculin skin test.

30 Times as Cheap

Dr. L. M. Smith, director of health service in Pittsburgh, describes the technique as "at least 10 times as fast and 30 times as cheap as the old method."

He said costs for 4,000 candid X-ray examinations—the yearly average in the schools—would be only \$120 and comparable with the \$2,500 cost for film alone when standard X-ray is used.

Virginia, Louisiana, Wisconsin and Iowa have ordered trailers equipped with the new type X-ray for war among rural school children.

Technicians point out that the candid camera X-ray is not intended for critical work in known pathological conditions where the standard X-ray is necessary. It can help discover fractures and occupational ailments, however, the technicians said.

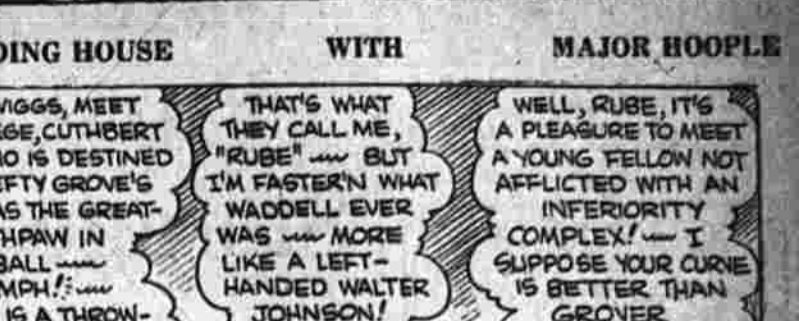
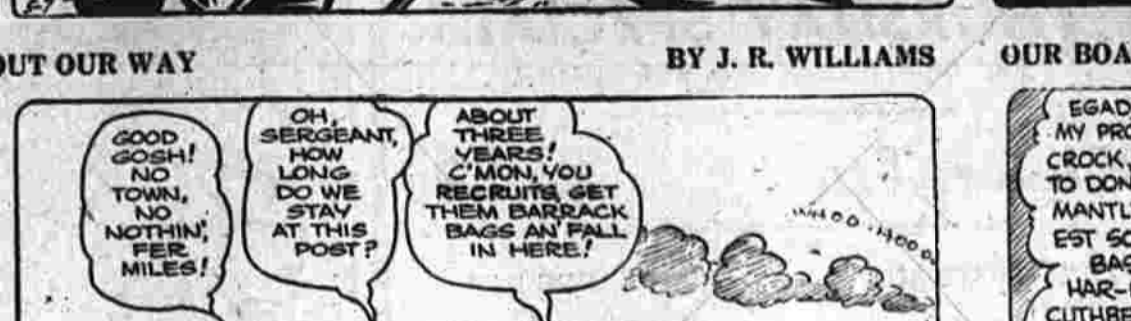

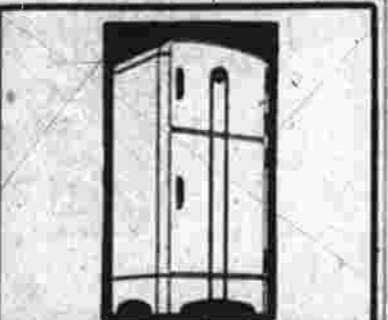
