

Censor Plan Seen Behind Federal Unit

Indirect Censorship and Propaganda Allegations Heard on Government Reports Office.

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—Allegations of "indirect censorship" and "propaganda" arose in the Senate today over an administration proposal to place the Office of Government Reports on a permanent basis, with a \$1,500,000 annual appropriation.

The office at present is functioning under an executive order by the president, who told Congress the office was needed to "assist in dealing with special problems, serve as a central clearing house for information concerning Federal activities and report to the president, needs and desires of the citizens."

Collects Newspaper Reports. The agency collects newspaper reports on government activities, replies to questions about the work of the government, and supplies information to the president and functioning of various Federal agencies in the states.

Senator Taft (R., O.), told reporters that the office was "nothing more than a New Deal propaganda agency."

Senator Davis (R., Pa.), who submitted a minority report from the committee which approved the legislation, declared:

"The best way to censor is not to forbid but to flood the country with material one wishes the public to accept."

Birth Control Bill Will Face Floor Debate

Portable Type Church Urged

Shop Building Points Out Use as Center Before Land Bought.

Hartford, May 20.—(AP)—A prefabricated portable church building, designed by the Rt. Rev. Frederick G. Budlong, D. D., in his annual address before the Synod of the Connecticut Conference in Hartford today, urged that such a building be erected in every town.

Such a building, the bishop pointed out, could be used as a center for war before the purchase of land for a permanent church.

The bishop cited as examples of need for such housing, Prospect Beach where services are now being held in a fire-house; East Hartford and adjoining districts where there has been a sudden influx of new residents; Southbury where a shift in population makes the relocation of the local church desirable. Other districts that have grown beyond the facilities of the churches now serving them are Hamden and Cornwall.

Air Minister Will Organize Syria Forces

Vichy, France, May 20.—(AP)—French Air Minister Gen. Jean Marie Bergeter landed at Beirut last night to organize the defense of French-mandated Syria against British aerial bombardments, it was announced here today.

The announcement said the purpose of General Bergeter's trip was to coordinate the defense of the Levant in accordance with the government's orders and in conjunction with High Commissioner Henry Datta.

He was met by General Datta and Levant Air Commander General Lametony at Beirut airport. The air minister flew directly from North Africa after completing inspection tours there and at Dakar.

Result of Bombardments. The trip was considered to have been successful as evidence of British air raids on the Syrian airfield of Rayak and other Syrian airfields following the Syrian Secretary Anthony Eden's charges that Syrian airfields were being used by German planes on the way to Iraq to join the Iraqis in the war against the British.

Volunteers Aid Iraq in Fight

Come from Soviet Russia, Afghanistan and Iran to Battle British.

Ankara, Turkey, May 20.—(AP)—Authoritative Iraq sources said today that the ranks of Axis-aided forces were being swelled rapidly for the fight against British volunteers from Soviet Russia, Afghanistan and Iran (Persia).

These informants said that among the Soviet volunteers were pilots, aviation technicians, tank drivers and mechanics.

Germans in Istanbul said Sunday that Russian volunteers were in Iraq, although a previous statement by Tass, Soviet official news agency, described as "fabrications."

Iraq newspaper reports that Russian pilots were joining the Iraqi Air Force.

"Help Coming Rapidly." "We are unprepared for the struggle alone, but help is coming rapidly," Iraqis were said.

They declined to discuss the extent of German aviation help. German-made planes being flown to Iraq, they contended, were being sent in a large number.

The possibility of Russian aid for Iraq was discussed at an hour's conference yesterday between Soviet Ambassador Vinogradov and Iraqi Minister Kamul Djilani at the Iraq legation. Results of the meeting were not disclosed immediately.

Iraqis here asserted that the population of Soviet Asiatic districts include 25,000,000 persons of Moslem origin who are sympathetic with the Iraqis.

They declared further that Russian broadsword in the Soviet Asiatic region, especially Iraq, Premier Rashid Ali Al-Ghalib.

Italy Claims Gondar Gains

Avers Troops Dialogue British from North-West Ethiopia Lines.

Rome, May 20.—(AP)—Italian troops have dislodged the British from positions in the Gondar sector of northwestern Ethiopia with considerable losses on both sides, the Italian high command announced today.

The Gondar battle area, just north of Lake Tana, has been the scene of months-long fighting since the British invaded that part of Ethiopia from the British Egyptian Sudan.

British Forces Captured. On the North African front, the high command said small British forces had been broken up around Tobruk, 80 miles from the Egyptian border, and that British prisoners were captured.

Italian aviators were declared to have bombed Tobruk and Matruh, Italian railroads about 150 miles east of the Bahig battle-front on the Libya-Egyptian border. Big areas were said to have been mined.

The Italians acknowledged another R. A. F. air raid on Bengasi, a major Libyan port of supply for Axis forces in North Africa, but denied the loss of a C-47 cargo ship.

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—The United States asked for full details from the German government today about the 138 Americans reported at Beirut to have been saved from the Egyptian liner Zamzam.

The State Department, lacking information about the sinking of the ship and the German announcement that all passengers and crewmen were saved, called the American embassy in Berlin to obtain the information.

The American government's chief interest in the case now was to determine the return of the American national.

Nazi Air-Borne Army Now Invading Crete

Troops Disguised in Anzac Battle Dress; British and Greek Troops Engage Them in Battle

London, May 20.—(AP)—A German air-borne army which includes 1,500 troops disguised in Anzac battle-dress has invaded Crete by troop-planes, glider and parachute, Prime Minister Churchill announced today, and British Imperial and Greek troops are engaging them in a stern battle. So far the defense force has the situation "in hand," the prime minister told the House of Commons; the Germans have failed in an attempt to capture a British airbase and the British and Greeks have recaptured a military hospital which for a time had been in the hands of the "chutias."

A fairly strong attacking group of German troops, including a "Camo" unit, was reported to have been landed on the island. The Germans proceeded the invasion with intense aerial bombardment of Suda Bay, the Crete naval base, and various airfields on the island.

They started early this morning, the 1,500 German troops in New Zealand battle dress landed by glider, parachute and troop plane on the Cape-Malemi area at the western end of the island.

Thousands of Veterans Released in Africa

London, May 20.—(AP)—The steady pinching out of the last remnants of Italy's East African empire is releasing thousands of veteran British fighting men from the reluctant battlefront of Ethiopia for desert fronts in North Africa, Palestine and Iraq.

American-Made Bombers Strike First Blow in War in North Africa During Heavy Attack.

Berlin, May 20.—(AP)—The 3,229-ton Egyptian passenger liner Zamzam has been sunk, presumably by a surface raider—and the 322 passengers and crewmen, including 138 Americans, are safe in German-occupied territory, authorized Germans reported today.

(The sinking, seemingly, occurred many days ago—the Germans did not say when—for the trip from the South Atlantic lane to the Mediterranean for the landing of passengers and crew. Presumably they were taken there by the victorious raider or an auxiliary.)

Authorized sources said simply that those from the Egyptian territory were "safe and well cared for in German-occupied territory."

The Germans would not say definitely where the Americans and others taken from the Zamzam were held. Nor would they comment on American suggestions that they might have been taken to Dakar, in French West Africa, or Casablanca, French Morocco.

"They are safe and well cared for in German-occupied territory and that's all that may be said at this time," a spokesman said.

Vessel Destroyed. "The vessel was destroyed with all the most exacting regard for all international agreements," a spokesman said.

New Defense Group Headed By LaGuardia

Roosevelt Establishes by Executive Order Office of Civilian Defense in Two Parts.

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—President Roosevelt established by executive order today an Office of Civilian Defense to be headed by Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia of New York.

The president separated the new civilian defense agency into two general divisions. One will be a Board of Civilian Protection with LaGuardia as chairman and on it also will be representatives of the War, Navy and Justice Departments. The Federal Security Administration, the Council of State Government, American Municipal Association, and the United States Council of Mayors.

It will advise and assist in formulating civilian defense measures in the event of emergency. The second division will be made up of a "Volunteer Participation Committee" which the president said would have not more than 20 members representative of various groups and interests of the nation.

LaGuardia, Mr. Roosevelt said, would retain his position as mayor of New York city.

He will arrive in Washington tomorrow, however, to take charge of setting up the agency designed to give every American citizen an opportunity to help on the defense.
