

"Do you know of any modern counterparts of the Barbary pirates?" a reporter asked. The President chuckled and suggested the newspaper men use their heads.

Zamzam Drama
While the President thus skirted the convoy question, a London announcement struck dread to the hearts of the relatives of 138 Americans. The Zamzam, an Egyptian liner, was long overdue from Recife, Brazil, to Capetown, South Africa, and was "presumed lost."
The Americans included 24 ambulance drivers on their way to join General De Gaulle's Free French forces in Africa and some 100 mis-

proces in Africa and some 100 mis-Two days later came an nouncement from Berlin that all aboard the Zamzam were safe at St. Jean De Luz, France, but the ship had been sunk. The Germans said the Americans would be released but that they would make sure "no military information is divulged."

The U. S. Maritime Commission, The U. S. Maritime Commission, meanwhile, was making brisk progress on President Roosevelt's request for a 2,000,000-ton shipping pool to help the British. Informed sources sant that 1,500,000 tons had already been pretty well lined up, about a third representing foreign ships tied up in American ports.




Experts Count Birds:

S. 1940 duck stamp above, are included in the annual flights of wildfowl that swell the U. S. total. Bird populations vary in density just as human population. The farmlands of the midwest have a relatively low bird-count; bird "cities" are found near water, in woodlands and marshes.

Wildlife conservationists are urging farmers to leave fencerow underbrush untouched, and to check drainage of shallow lakes, in an effort to increase the number of birds. Federal supervision of wildlife refuges also is increasing the winged population.


