

Fight on Control Of Milk Industry One of Bitterest

Assembly Recedes Until Monday; Chances of Winding Up Session on Harmonious Chord Appear Much Brighter After Bill Is Adopted.

Hartford, May 24.—(P)—With the bill providing state control of Connecticut's vast milk industry adopted after one of the bitterest fights during the current legislative session, members of the General Assembly recessed for a brief week-end today. The Assembly will convene for its 21st week Monday, leaders having agreed earlier in the week to hold a Monday session the first time this year because of the press of business. Only a week and a half remain to clear the legislative docket before the constitutional adjournment date, June 4.

Leaders of both parties said last night that chances of winding up the session on a harmonious chord appeared much brighter after Senate and House ended their disagreement over the milk issue and adopted a bill suitable to Governor Hurley.

See Agreeable State The ups and downs of a series of negotiations for a minor judicial bill appeared ended, and leaders predicted that a bill agreeable to Republicans and Democrats alike would be ready for action next week. They kept their fingers crossed, however, realizing that some other piece of legislation might bring fresh discord during the next few days and void the latest armistice.

Under the old provision on the milk bill—one of the governor's most cherished measures—the house relinquished its right of permitting new evidence to be introduced in the courts in appeals from the milk administrator and providing that the filing of an appeal would constitute a stay of execution of the ruling.

The new proposal section written into the bill by terms of the inter-party agreement would bar new evidence before the courts, except in cases involving the revocation of licenses but would permit a court in effect, to order a retrial before the administrator if important new evidence had been uncovered since he made his decision. The only cases in which stays automatically would be granted pending appeal would be license revocations.

Also under the compromise, the Senate agreed to eliminate of a provision for a market pool or equalization plan.

Not Satisfactory The House Speaker Hugh M. Alcorn said the bill was not satisfactory to his constituents.

Fresh Strike Threat Looms At G M Plant

Pontiac Local Alleges Anti-Union Acts; Navy May Move Ships to Mare Island Yard.

By The Associated Press General Motors Corporation faced a new strike threat today at Pontiac, Mich.

Just a week after the big motor firm averted a threatened walkout in 90 of its plants by granting wage increases of 10 cents an hour, the Pontiac local of the CIO Automobile Workers filed notice with the Michigan Labor Mediation Board of intent to strike. The union charged the plant management with anti-union activity.

The CIO-UAW announced yesterday that three GM locals had accepted the new wage-raising contract. They were the Oldsmobile plant at Lansing, Mich.; the Fisher Stamping plant at Grand Rapids, Mich.; and the Chevrolet plant at Janesville, Wis.

Navy Won't Use Force At San Francisco, where a strike of 700 CIO and AFL machinists has tied up work by ten billion dollars worth of shipbuilding in 11 yards, it was reported that the Navy might come to its own yards work on some of the tied up ships, but would not try to force reopening of the struck yards.

Naval sources said some of the vessels might be towed to the Mare Island Yard for completion. It was said only three days of machine work there would be required to get one ship from a freighter into an airplane tender.

Harry Hock, business agent of the AFL union, said "we'd be happy" if the government would take over the shipyard "under the same conditions as Mare Island."

The Wage Issue The machinists want to keep double pay for overtime and ask \$1.10 an hour regular pay. Under the government negotiators' latest agreement employers want to cut the overtime scale to time and a half and jump the former straight scale of \$1 an hour to \$1.15.

In Washington Admiral Horthy said a Senate investigating committee yesterday that he believed the government would justify in using "United States Forces" to open up shipyard picket lines.

Ralph Bard, assistant secretary of the Navy, said a possible alternative to government operation of the yards was prosecution of the leaders of "outrage" strikes, for conspiracy to hinder the national defense effort. Some AFL officials have termed the shipyard workers' picket lines "outrage" strikes.

In the capital also, the Defense Mediation Board called for closer door discussions today designed to call a halt to the contract dispute between the CIO United Mine Workers and the soft coal operators. Coal mining operations were closed.

Charges War Aid Given Axis Gillette Names Oil Concerns as Sellers Of Much Material.

Washington, May 24.—(P)—Declaring he had received reports that American companies had supplied war materials to the Axis powers "in scores and billions," the Senate Committee on Investigation and Control today charged that the Gillette Oil Company (D-T) was one of the suppliers.

It is a strange thing, Gillette said, that we are spending such vast sums to aid one side in the war and that we still allow vital war materials to go to the Axis countries. The people are entitled to know the facts about the situation.

United States, Canada Plan Economic Boards To Speed Mobilizing of American Resources to Britain and Defense of Western Hemisphere.

Washington, May 24.—(P)—The United States and Canada, it was learned authoritatively today, will establish early next week two closely collaborating economic planning boards to speed the mobilization of American resources for aid to Britain and defense of the western hemisphere.

The new boards in general are expected to complement in the economic and industrial fields the work of the Joint United States-Canadian Defense Board established to coordinate the military and naval defense of North America.

All But One Selected All but one of the members of the new boards have been selected. It was learned, and President Roosevelt is expected to announce on the third man on the American board within the next few days. All names have been closely guarded by the White House.

The boards, it was learned, will immediately undertake a systematic inventory of the United States and Canada's present and potential resources, production, supplies, priorities and other vital elements involved in providing the quickest and greatest possible assistance to Great Britain and other nations fighting against aggression and strengthening the defenses of the American republic.

Acting as a joint board, it was learned, they will:

Collaborate in solving economic, industrial and financial problems essential to all-out aid to Britain.

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Fierce Battle Rages At Crete Airdrome; Subs Attack Convoy

German high command broke its silence on the invasion of Crete today, announcing that German paratroopers have been on the island since May 20 and have the western end under control. The paratroopers, assisted by other troops, fiercely attacked and took possession of many strategically important points, the announcement said.

British Air Force Blasted The Royal Air Force blasted the industrial city of Cologne last night in its first attack on western Germany since Sunday and also pounded the Nazi-occupied French coast around Boulogne, the British reported today.

Overnight attacks also were delivered by the coastal command from docks at St. Nazaire and air-dromes and ports of occupied northwestern France.

Merchant Ship Hit Airmen said a large merchant ship was set afire by bombs from the west coast of France in daylight operations yesterday.

Two cruisers, possibly a third, were reported during another action east of Crete. Another cruiser was said to have been damaged by a torpedo fired by an Italian plane.

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Nazi Diplomat Here to Buy Up Oil Properties

Dr. Rieth Said Seeking To Acquire U. S. Titles to Companies in Eastern Europe.

New York, May 24.—(P)—The Herald Tribune said today that Dr. Kurt Rieth, German diplomat, has been in New York almost two months "charged with the job of buying up rich American-owned oil properties in eastern Europe, now almost vacant to citizens of the United States."

Dr. Rieth, German minister to Rio de Janeiro on a special mission to Latin America last March, was especially strongly guarded by the United States and Canadian boards which will survey the two nations' resources and guide their co-operative economic, industrial and financial policies.

Dr. Leary's testimony was interrupted by adjournment yesterday, but Judge Vincent Braga decided to speed the case by holding the Saturday session.

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Urges Congress Members Take Walks and Play Golf

Washington, May 24.—(P)—The continuous grind of Congress and physician who watches the health of the members of Congress urged all senators and representatives today to "walk for at least an hour every day, and get in nine holes of golf if possible."

Dr. George W. Calver, congressional physician, pointed out in an interview that the lawmakers had been in almost constant session for nearly three years and declared that "overwork" and "overstrain" were responsible for the current absence of several members.

Calver urged that the members of Congress should take walks and play golf to keep their health in good shape.

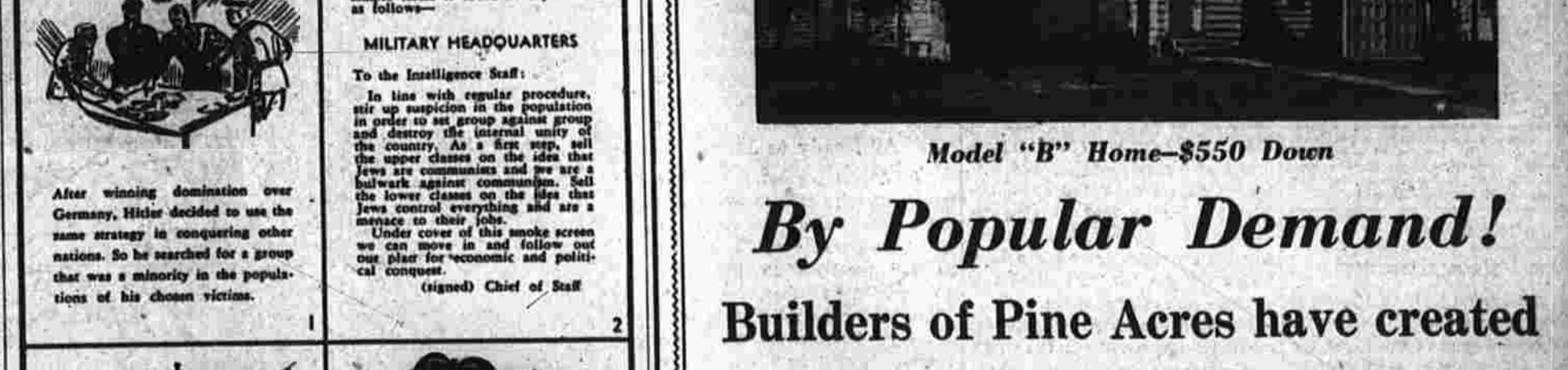
