British Withdraw Troops at Canea And Halfaya Pass

Severe Fighting Continues in Crete; Retreat at Egyptian-Libyan Frontier Made in Face of 'Numerically Superior Forces' of Axis Units.

Cairo, Egypt, May 28.—(AP)—British troops who had held Canea have been "obliged to make a further withdrawal to a more favorable position in the rear," but "severe fighting continues," the Middle East command announced today.

The R. A. F. still was pounding the Germans on Crete as they were driven from bases on the African mainland and into the East R. A. F. communicate today reported "a number of successful attacks" Monday night and Tuesday on the German occupied airbase of Mikieli, 10 miles southwest of Canea.

Retreating defenders of the island, both British and Greek, suffered heavy losses in a bitter struggle with German mountain troops and unrelenting air bombardment, the communique said.

Other R. A. F. bombers, it was announced, directly hit two Axis merchantmen, of between 8,000 and 10,000 tons each off the African coast. Additional forces raiding the island were reported.

Rome, May 28.—(AP)—The Italian high command announced today that German and Italian planes had damaged a British aircraft carrier, two cruisers, a destroyer and four merchantmen in an attack on a convoy off the North African coast May 26.

A violent explosion occurred on a cruiser which was hit by a bomb the day war bulletin reported.

The attack was said to have occurred about 100 miles east of the Libyan port of Derna—directly south of the embattled island of Crete.

Early Says President Will Clear Confusion; Patrol to Be Better

United States Is Committed Unreservedly to Policy of Active Resistance to All German Efforts to Gain Control of Seas in Radio Speech; Naval Escorts Not Mentioned

Washington, May 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt will hold a special press conference late this afternoon at which he is expected to clear up the question of convoys, Stephen Early, presidential secretary, was advised by reporters that the chief executive's speech last night, in which he committed the United States unreservedly to a policy of active resistance to all German efforts to gain control of the seas left some confusion around the convoy issue.

Early replied: "I think he will clear that up this afternoon and I would rather he would do it."

In his momentous radio address to the world last night, the chief executive did not speak specifically of American naval escorts for British-bound ships. But he did say that the American patrol system was expanding and that all necessary additional steps would be taken to guarantee the arrival of American-made war supplies in England.

Early later explained that he thought Mr. Roosevelt meant that the patrol would be made better and more efficient and more ships would be added to it.

Probably, he indicated, Mr. Roosevelt will feel inclined to drop some doubt about what may be done.

Both Axis partners were grimly silent upon speech. Propaganda sources in Rome and Berlin hinted that the American invitation to war.

Other Fascist circles in Rome said the speech, committing the United States to a policy of active resistance to all German efforts to gain control of the seas, was a "decisive rejection" of the German position.

Hurley Will Withhold Judges' Nominations

Will Not Act on Common Pleas Appointments While Reorganization Is Pending.

State Capital, Hartford, May 28.—(AP)—Gov. Robert A. Hurley today said that pending action on a bill reorganizing the courts of common pleas he would withhold further judgeship nominations for those tribunals.

The bill, creating three new judges and placing the courts of common pleas under a new circuit, was approved by the Senate early this week and now awaits House action.

A recently enacted law gave the governor until today to complete his Common Pleas nominations. He is expected to complete them today.

British Hunt Cruiser Aide Of Bismarck

50 to 100 Warships And Swarm of Planes Are Searching Atlantic For Prinz Eugen.

London, May 28.—(AP)—Fifty to 100 British warships and a swarm of planes are searching the Atlantic for the German cruiser Prinz Eugen, in hope of a clean sweep of the Bismarck squadron.



And it is by the knowledge revealed to it by President Roosevelt that the Axis must govern its course. It has a choice. It can so govern its actions that not one American shot will be fired against its men, its ships or its planes. Or it can so proceed that it will experience the utmost offensive action of which American military power is capable.

We are going to deliver instructions of war, munitions, supplies—whatever we choose to send—to Britain, to China, to whomsoever we regard as our friends and whose position we regard as being in the line of the defenders of the democratic philosophy.

We are going to see to it that the security of this hemisphere is not endangered by Axis occupation of strategic points that did not belong to its members at the beginning of the war.

We are going to see to it that the lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

The cards are on the table. Now, Hitler, it's up to you. And don't try to bluff because we'll put your hand as sure as death.
