





Will Surpass Auto Industry

Defense authorities say that mass production of war engines will start within 100 days. Some forecast that by 1942 aircraft production alone will surpass the phenomenaal \$4,000,000,000 automative industry.

It did national defense demands if Hormal requirements and United address use of critical materials outstrips all other countries. For peacetime manufacture this country takes 60 per cent of the world production of raw rubber, tin 40 per cent, chromium 45, silk 56, nickel 40, Vanadium 40, manganese 36, and antimony 33 per cent.

That is why the Defense Commission is digging whatever supplies there are from domestic mines, financing factories heretofore unprofitable, subsidizing new supply sources close at home, trying substitutes and salvaging and reclaiming waste materials. Production of synthetic rubber, still insignificant, has doubled in the last year; officials are trying to substitute molybdenum for tungsten, and they say 12,000 tons of metal could be procured annually from used lin cans.

They have been instrumental in reopening closed-down coke evens and zine smelters, building a tin amelter, and arranging for new facilities wherever shortages threaten. The government has acquired \$306,845,000 of 11 strategic materials from all sources.



> Record-breaking figures on FHA home-financing surance operations in April were announced recently by the Federal Housing Administration. During the month, 32,488 small-home mortgage insur ance applications totaling \$150,884,295 were received, exceeding the previous high established in March at 30,040 applications in the amount of \$138,231,180.

Gains Total 15, 19 Per Cent
Of this total, 25,506 mortgages amounting to \$120,428,970 covered new homes to be built under FHA inspection, which are being financed with mortgages in-sured under Title II. This compared with 23,773 new-home applications in the amount of \$110,721,190 in March, and 22,092 such applications in the amount of \$100,901,774 in April, 1940. The increase over a year ago was 15 per cent in number and 19 per cent in amount April also was the most active month ever recorded under the FHA program for the commencement of construction of new homes. A weekly average of approxi-mately 4,550 new small homes were started under FHA inspection last month, compared with 3,290 in March, and 3,870 in April, 1940.



of Franz Joseph II, who became Liechtenstein's first prince-ruler in 1718.

At that time, the principality formed part of the Holy Roman Empire. It became part of the Rhine Confederation in 1806, and from 1815 to 1866 it was a member of the German Confederation.

Although most of its people are German, the tiny state was closely tied up with Austria until 1919. In 1921 it adopted Swiss currency and later Switzerland assumed administration of Liechtenstein's customs and postal system, although the principality still issues is own stamps.


