Army Seeks To Buy Foods From Cannery

Asks Suspension of Law So Orders May Be Given Direct to Eliminate Speculative Effects.

Washington, June 4.—(P)—The War Department, saying there was necessity to eliminate the harmful effects of speculative activity in canned food stocks, made a formal request today for suspension temporarily or permanently of defense purposes.

Two influential senators, who asked to remain anonymous, said serious consideration was being given by administration leaders to suspension of the property contract law so that Army canned food orders might be placed directly with the cannery.

The exemption request was accompanied by a memorandum asserting the Army's belief that operations of speculators had affected the price as much as 40 percent on the type of canned foods which the Army heretofore has been purchasing from dealers and wholesalers.

In another move to stop rising food prices, the government's Anti-Trust Division of the Justice Department started action against five major branches of the California food industry when indictments charging price fixing and monopoly were returned at San Francisco.

The president made it plain at his press conference yesterday that one of the prime objectives of the bill was to make it possible for the government to deal directly with strikes or lockouts in defense industries by taking over the affected plants.

Such action would not recalculate the labor which opposes any relaxation of laws prescribing labor standards.

Britain Strengthens Hand in Middle East; Sea War Loss Heavy

Destruction of British Merchant Ship, Damage to Two Others, Air Torpedo Hits on Warship Reported by German High Command Today; Assert Britain Is 'Bleeding to Death'.

Berlin, June 4.—(P)—Destruction of a 4,000-ton British merchant ship near the Orkney Islands by bombs last night, damage to two others off northern Scotland, and two air torpedo hits on a large British warship were reported by the high command today as German sources declared Britain already had lost more than half the merchant fleet with which she began the war. Britain is "bleeding to death" from these blows to her shipping, Germans asserted.

The high command said last night's air attacks were directed mainly against the harbor of Hull, England, and port facilities of the south and east coast.

Flare Losses Double British planes did not enter German territory during the night, it said, but the British have lost 20 planes in the period from May 29 to June 3, compared with 10 German losses.

Another British shipping loss claimed by the German high command was a transport reported in a sudden raid on an Italian ship which brought members of his family to his bedside last week.

Egyptian Cabinet Resigns Cairo, June 4.—(P)—The Egyptian cabinet resigned tonight, it was understood that Premier Hussein Sirry Pasha would be designated to form a new cabinet tomorrow.

The shakeup was declared by authoritative quarters as occasioned by the "present grave circumstances" involving fear of a German thrust into the rich valley of the Nile.

Transferred to Navy Washington, June 4.—(P)—President Roosevelt issued an executive order today directing that an unspecified number of Coast Guard officers and enlisted men be transferred to help operate certain Naval vessels.

It was essential to make such transfers for the "strengthening of our national defense within the limits of peace time authorization."

World Ban Photographs Washington, June 4.—(P)—Secretary Knox asked Congress today to prohibit all photographs or sketches of national defense centers or objects anywhere, and said Japanese agents were taking such pictures.

The secretary of the Navy testified at a closed session of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee in favor of legislation that would impose penalties of \$500 and six months imprisonment for taking photographs of any Navy vessel, yard, aircraft, national defense center or object anywhere, specifically including the Philippines Islands.

Stale Bowers For Judgeship

Wilhelm II, Once Kaiser, Dies in Exile

82-Year-Old Former Emperor of Germany Succumbs in Sudden Relapse at Doorn.

Berlin, June 4.—(P)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm II of Imperial Germany died today at his exile estate of Doorn in the quiet backwash of a new German conquest almost 22 years after he fled from the crumbling failure of his own European war plan.

DNB, German official news agency, reported from Amsterdam that the 82-year-old, white-haired former emperor died at 11:30 a. m. (4:30 a. m. e. t. l.) in a sudden relapse of an illness which brought members of his family to his bedside last week.

Jury to Get Martin Case

Court Recesses After State and Defense Complete Summation.

Putnam, June 4.—(P)—The trial of George Martin, ex-convict charged with conspiring to rob the Cargill Trust Company here, recessed at noon today after state and defense each had completed an hour's summation of evidence heard in the fantastic case.

Coroner Louis A. Woodard, serving as assistant state's attorney, reviewed the testimony by which the prosecution sought to show that Martin, state police radio dispatcher at the Danvers barracks, had agreed, in return for a promised payment of \$2,000, to "keep state police out" of Putnam on the night of May 11-12 during which witnesses testified an attempt was to be made to rob the bank.

Defense Attorney Samuel S. Harvey of Willimantic, while he made no direct plea for an acquittal, stressed to jury Martin's testimony in which he admitted the state police robbery had been mentioned to him, but insisted he took it as only a joke and denied emphatically he ever had agreed to aid the attempt.

The state's principal witness in the trial which began May 27 was Ralph Brentley, a Putnam laborer and police commissioner, and Walter Krensen of Hartford, both of whom have pleaded guilty to conspiracy, and State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey.

Brentley swears that he formulated the abortive plot to rob the bank and that Martin's sidekick had agreed to misdirect police after the threat to a potential
