

Damascus Not to Be Defended by French; Allies Nearing Beirut

British and Free French Forces, Rebuffed in Offer of Peace, Advancing Along Mediterranean Shores; Push to Point 20 Miles from Lebanese Capital; 10 Miles from Damascus.

London, June 13.—(P)—Rebuffed in a peace gesture, British and Free French forces were authoritatively reported today to be closing in on Beirut and broadening the base for perhaps the final assault on Damascus. A high source in London declared that forces advancing along the Mediterranean shore of the Bible lands had pushed north of Sidon to a point within 20 miles of Beirut, Lebanese capital, while Free French forces had taken two villages east of Kinsoue, facing Damascus 10 miles away.

The Middle East command at Cairo acknowledged that the Allies had been "temporarily delayed in certain sectors by resistance of Vichy troops," but "by yesterday evening made further progress in all sectors of their penetration."

Answering With Arms
The Vichy government was answering with the arms at its command a British overture through a messenger suggesting that the French blood it should instruct defense forces to offer no further resistance to measure taken by the Allies "to prevent the escape from Syria of a mass of 'determined' men."

The British discovered any territorial designs against French territory and declared again that they would not be deterred by the British imperial forces. Vichy's avowal notwithstanding was necessitated to counter German ambitions.

Exchange of Notes—A French protest at the outset of the fighting and the British reply were handled through Vichy and London ambassadors at Madrid. They were published today.

Practically Surrounded Damascus
Reuters, British news agency, said it was understood in Cairo that the Allies had practically surrounded Damascus and that parleys between the opposing forces with view to avoiding bloodshed had delayed entry into the capital of Syria.

Damascus, with a population of nearly 200,000, reputedly is the world's oldest inhabited city. Despite the British reports of the imminent threat to the city, an Associated Press representative was able at 1:10 p. m. local time to enter the city.

At home the R. A. F. fighter command was reported to have turned back a formation of Messerschmitts, retaliation for a five-minute battle 20,000 feet above the southern English coast this afternoon.

Syrian Capital Likely To Be Declared Open City When British and De Gaulle's Siege Forces Break Its Outlying Defenses; No Preparations for Fighting in Ancient City.

Damascus, Syria, June 13.—1:10 p. m. (6:10 a. m. e. t.)—(P)—This Syrian capital, believed to be the oldest inhabited city of the world, probably will not be defended when and if British and De Gaulle's siege forces break into its outlying defenses. Damascus, it appears, will be treated as an open, or unfortified city, such as Paris itself was declared just a year ago today when German forces were rolling on the center of the French Empire. There has been no preparation for fighting within this ancient city of slaughter. There has been no blackout, no evacuation of women and children to the suburbs. Damascus itself is a population close to 200,000. Damascus is Syria's largest city.

No Signs of Panic
The population is displaying excellent morale. There are no signs of panic. Five hundred and forty years ago most of the residents were slaughtered and Damascus pillaged and burned by the Mongol conqueror Tamerlane after his defeat of the Egyptians and leveled a large tribute on the city. The historic Citadel of Damascus, Public security is assured by native police.

Welles Says Nazis Violating Treaty

An international agreement entered into in 1930 under which submarines are bound to take proper precautions and state their presence, and passengers of their merchant ships must be treated humanely.

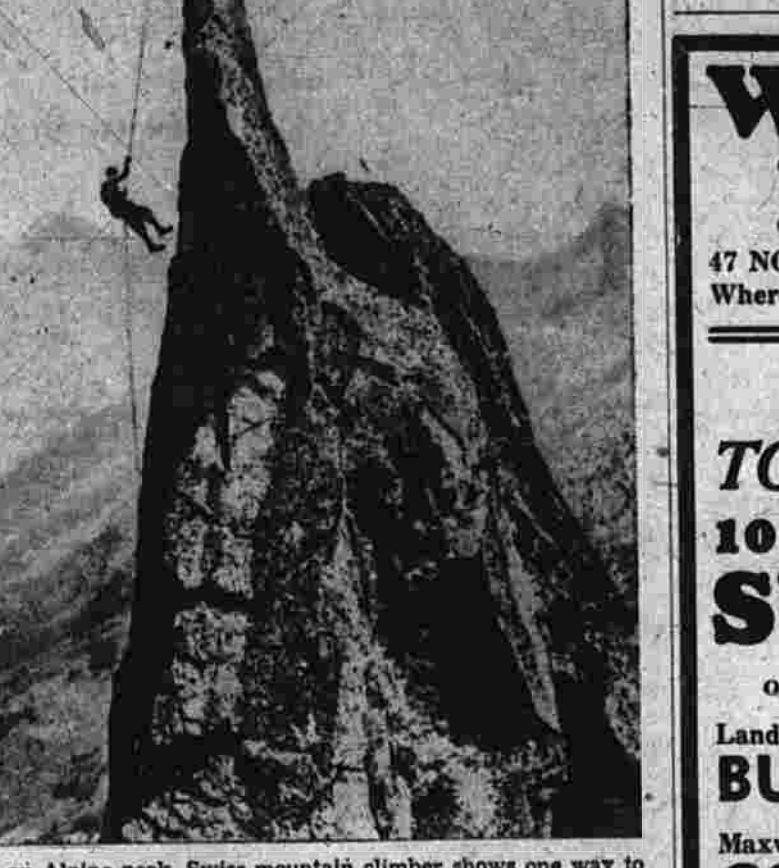
