

Pledge Is Sought Of 'Safe Conduct' For Ousted Nazis

United States Asks Britain to Assure Safety of All Consular Officials as First Move To Carry Out Order.

Washington, June 19.—(AP)—The United States has requested Great Britain to assure "safe conduct" through the blockade for all German consular officials in this country.

The obligations, as well as the interests, of the United States are explained, and it is not permitted to transfer their operations to Latin American republics where they exist.

Asked whether any action would be taken to prevent the ousted Nazi officials from going to other American republics, Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles explained that arrangements were being made for their direct return to their homeland.

The State Department's prompt action in undertaking the proposed "safe conduct" through the British blockade was described as a flat rejection of the German government's protest against the White House order.

Welles provided a broad hint yesterday that the German protest would be rejected when he said he had informed Hans Thomsen, the German envoy, it would be given consideration.

At the same time, however, the undersecretary disclosed that arrangements were being made for the departure of an estimated 125 consular officers and employees in 24 American cities on the ground they had engaged in "activities wholly outside the scope of their legitimate duties" and "of improper and unwarranted character."

Under the normal procedure, it was said, Great Britain would accord "safe conduct" to the consular officials, in the same manner that it had granted to Admiral Alberto Laia, Italian Naval attaché, to return to Italy after he had been charged with implications in the sabotage of Italian ships here, and was requested to leave.

Question on Employees A question was raised, however, whether the same manner of diplomatic courtesy would be extended to employees of the consulates, or to the estimated 50 employees of Transocean News Service, the German Library Information, and the German Radio.

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Buying Curbs Will Produce Habits Shift

Present National Emergency May Have Far-Reaching Effects on Standards of Living.

Allentown, Pa., June 19.—(AP)—The present national emergency will produce dramatic changes in consumer buying habits that may have far-reaching effects on living standards now and after the war, A. W. Zelenski, an economist, said today.

Buying patterns are determined not only by the level of income but the supply of merchandise available, Zelenski said in an address prepared for delivery at a meeting of The Pennsylvania Retailers' Association.

"With income rising to new high levels and especially with the cost of living still advancing only slowly, demand for durable goods items such as automobiles, refrigerators, radios, furniture, etc., would normally continue to expand at a rapid rate," he said.

Supplies to be curtailed "The difficulty at the moment, of these items will soon be curtailed as raw materials, skilled labor and plant capacity are diverted to the war effort," he said.

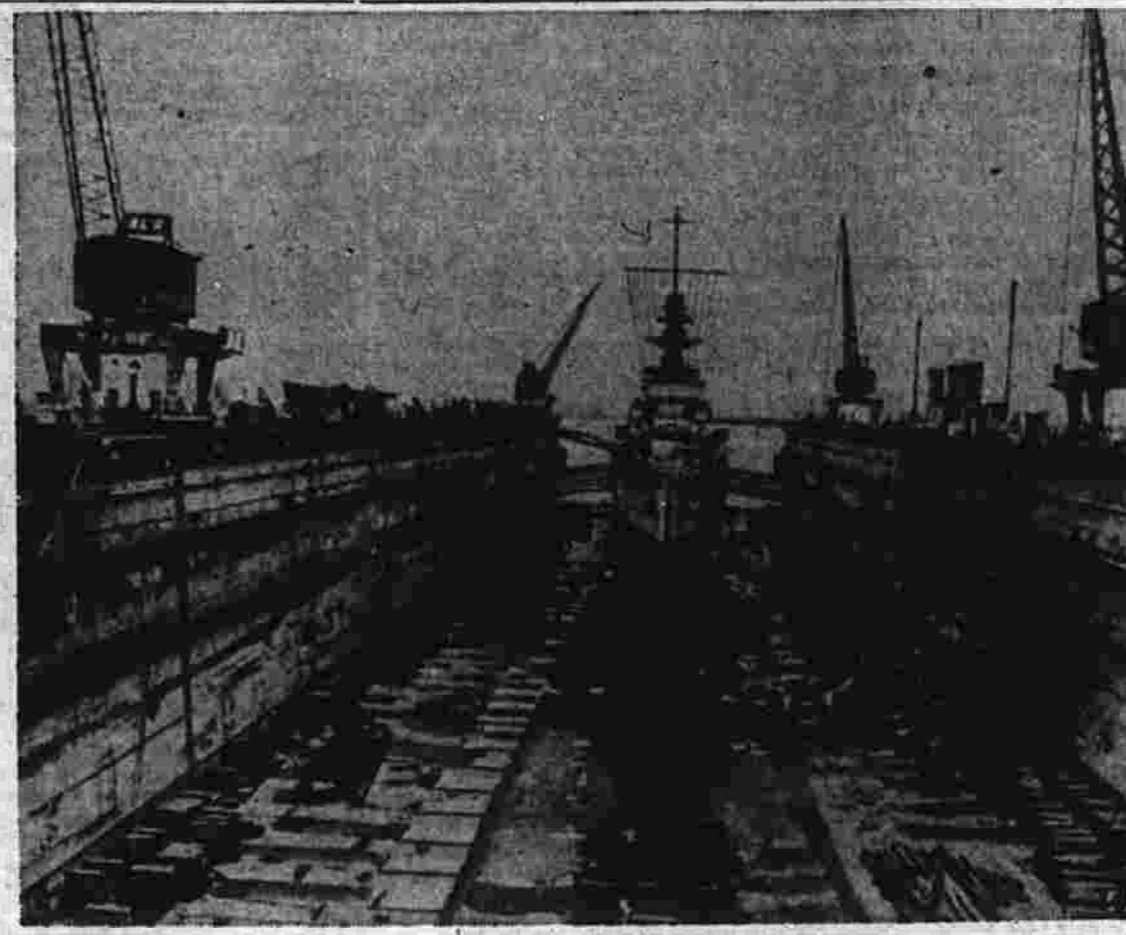
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British Warship in Dry Dock at Singapore

Sea Losses Kept Secret By Churchill

Resists Demands for Public Debate on Gravity of Ship Situation in Commons Today.

London, June 19.—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill resisted demands today in the House of Commons for public debate on the gravity of the shipping situation by insisting it was impossible to state the government's position "except under the protection of the secret session."

Announcing that the government will review the Battle of the Atlantic at an early date, he said: "It would be a great pity if we were forced to conduct discussions on these most grave matters with every word quickly reaching the enemy. No justice could be done to the argument in such circumstances."

Neither spokesman nor Reuters (British news agency) earlier had reported that Gen. Sir Henry Maitland Wilson, British commander for Palestine and Trans-Jordan, had broadcast from Jerusalem an ultimatum calling the French to surrender by 5:30 a. m. (10:30 p. m. e. s. t. Wednesday).

At noon today (5 a. m. e. s. t.), there was no indication here that the ultimatum had been complied with.

Threatened from Three Sides Dispatches from the Middle East previously had indicated that Damascus was threatened from three sides by British, Free French and Indian troops who pushed across the channel.

Demand for Surrender Of Damascus Rejected

Belief Expressed Allied Forces Have Begun Direct Attack Upon City; Surround Vichy Units.

London, June 19.—(AP)—An authoritative source said today the French defenders of Damascus apparently had rejected a British demand for surrender and expressed belief that Allied forces already had launched a direct attack upon the city. A British Middle East communique in Cairo claimed capture of "important positions" just south of Damascus and said British-Free French forces had established a strong Vichy force in Merdjayoun, both on the southern Syrian front.

Accord Seen Portent Of New Nazi Stroke; Turks to Be Neutral

Turkey Bound to Germany by 10-Year Non-Aggression and Mutual Consultation Pact; Effective on Unexpected Signing by Von Papen and Saragolcu in Ankara Last Night.

Berlin, June 19.—(AP)—Temporarily substituting lightning diplomacy for blitzkrieg, Adolf Hitler has neutralized Turkey in the present conflict by binding her with Germany in a 10-year non-aggression and mutual consultation pact, engineered by Nandim's smooth-talking, iron-shooting diplomat, Franz Von Papen, German ambassador to Turkey, the friendship treaty became effective when signed unexpectedly last night in Ankara by Von Papen and Turkish Foreign Minister Sukru Saragolcu.

The ratification documents are to be exchanged between the two World War allies in Berlin as soon as possible.

To Respect Territories The pact bound the two countries to respect each other's territorial integrity, "not to undertake any measures aimed either directly or indirectly at the other treaty partner," and to settle any differences or problems affecting the two countries through friendly consultation.

Coupled with it were two protocols looking toward promotion of trade and improvement of press and radio relations. The press treaty was especially welcome in Berlin because Turkish newspapers have been a source of irritation to German officials.

The conclusion of the treaty had a bomb-shell effect comparable only to the German understanding with Russia which preceded the outbreak of the war and informed Turkish Minister Sukru Saragolcu before his signature and to have "pressed doubt" as to American reaction to the accord.

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Plans Bigger Plane Engine Output Soon

Increase by 35 Per Cent By End of Year Intend To Jump Present Peak.

New York, June 19.—(AP)—Plans to increase by 35 per cent the airplane engine horsepower output of the Wright Aeronautical Corp. plant at Paterson, N. J., were disclosed today.

The increase, to be effected by the end of this year, would boost capacity of the plant to 2,400,000 horsepower a month from its present projected peak of 1,750,000 horsepower, according to estimates of The Wall Street Journal. These figures compare with the 250,000 horsepower production

of the plant in 1939.

By the conquest of Crete, occupation of the Aegean Islands and domination of the frontier of Turkish Thrace, Hitler has been in a position to enforce the original heavy demands he made on the Turks, informed sources said.

But Turkey would have chosen to fight instead and, despite the country's lack of equipment, that would have been a bitter campaign. Evidently Hitler was impatient to get any kind of an understanding so he could proceed to quick action elsewhere, evidently believing he would be free at some later date really to make Turkey come to terms.

These sources declared that "perhaps the greatest potential menace" was Turkey's agreement to confer her gross and ready, both of which have been friendly to British and hostile toward the Axis.

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Question Still Whether Military Move to Be Aimed at Soviet Russia or Suez Canal; Fits Well into Fabric of German Plan For Isolating Next Victim of Blitzkrieg.

London, June 19.—(AP)—The German-Turkish accord was interpreted by informed quarters today as virtually an infallible portent of a tremendous new Nazi military stroke. But the question remained whether it was aimed at Soviet Russia or Suez. These sources asserted that the pact fits well into the new familiar German practice of isolating intended blitzkrieg victims by cajolery or threats against their neighbors.

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Oxford Honor Degree Given To Roosevelt

Ascerts in Response, by Proxy, 'We Would Rather Die on Our Feet Than Live on Knees.'

Cambridge, Mass., June 19.—(AP)—Responding by proxy to a precedent-shattering award of an honorary degree by Oxford University in Harvard University's ancient yard, President Roosevelt asserted today that "we would rather die on our feet than live on our knees."

Believing in freedom, he was willing to fight to maintain freedom, the chief executive said in a message of response to a citation read by Lord Halifax, the British ambassador and chancellor of Oxford.

The honorary doctorate of civil laws was awarded to Mr. Roosevelt at a dramatic ceremony held only a few minutes after Harvard, the United States oldest university, had awarded an honorary degree to Lord Halifax as a representative of a "whispering nation" yielding before the views of tyranny. Eleven other honorary degrees also were bestowed at the ceremony.

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Ship Workers Fail to Yield Local Officials Decline To Follow Suggestion Of International Head.

By The Associated Press AFL machinists on strike at 11 San Francisco bay shipyards failed to yield today to a suggestion from the president of the international union that they return to work and mediate their differences with the management.

Harvey W. Brown, the machinists' president, addressed several hundred strikers during a four-hour closed meeting which ended at midnight. Before the session, Brown had expressed belief that the men would end their walkout after the issues were explained and when the strikers filed out, local officials of the union were non-committal, declining to say when the matter would be settled.

The 11 shipyards hold \$500,000 worth of work orders. Both AFL and CIO machinists walked out of their yards yesterday. A master stabilization contract, signed by all shipyards in the area except Bethlehem, provides for \$113 an hour for skilled mechanics, time and a half for overtime on Saturday and Sunday. In addition, workers on the second shift would receive a 10 per cent premium and those on the third shift 15 per cent.

The National Defense Mediation Board acted yesterday that Bethlehem accepted the master contract too.

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Planes Start Large Fires At Bremen

London, June 19.—(AP)—The Royal Air Force started large fires at Bremen and exploded heavy bombs across the docks of the German-occupied port of Brest in vigorous overnight raids. The Air Ministry news service announced today. Four British planes were reported to be in the air tonight (5 a. m. e. s. t.).

Ikkes Says System in East May Be Necessary in Expected Shortage.

Washington, June 19.—(AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes, defense petroleum coordinator, said today a ration card system for use of gasoline in the east was "one of the things under consideration" if rigid restrictions on petroleum were made necessary by the expected oil shortage.

The coordinator declared also "I don't think a drop of oil should be shipped to any place, anywhere" from the Atlantic seaboard. He recently put an embargo on such exports, without prior government approval of each cargo.

Youthful Berry Pickers Try to Boost Wage Scale

It's tough on the berry growers—but Young America has their own way of maintaining the picking wage scale.

Trucks from the outside berry farms roll into Manchester shortly after daylight now to the picking crews.

As each truck passes the assembled youngsters, and they demand four cents in union (incidentally waking up the whole neighborhood) the driver goes on without a load.
