Start Picking Tobacco Soon Plantations Advertising For Women; College Students Being Hired.

Within a week work will start picking the leaves of shade grown tobacco. This will give work to many local women who will string the leaves onto lathes. Last year the women were paid at the rate of 33-1/2 cents a bundle of 50 lathes. They were able to make about \$2.50 a day. Today advertisements are appearing offering 40 cents a bundle, or six and two third cents more.

More Pay For All Help Boys between the ages of 16 and 18 years who are now working on shade grown tobacco, who will do the picking, are being paid 12 1/2 cents a day. Men and those boys over 18 years of age are being paid at least \$3 a day and several more than that amount.

College Students Here Because of the shortage of labor on tobacco, 20 college students from Georgia, have been brought to Manchester to work on the Hartman Tobacco plantation. They are provided houses in which to live and in addition to working they are required to study a certain number of hours each day. For this reason few are men on the streets unless it is a Saturday or Sunday night when they go to the movies.

To Paper Factory Knolls Brothers today started a gang of men pouring cement for a foundation for the addition to be built to the Lyell and Pease Paper mill in Lyellville. They are also raising the roof of the boiler room two and a half feet. The new roof will be built over the present roof before the roof now in use is removed. The wall to be built for the addition will be a protection for the present boiler room wall and will save heat used for the operation of the mill.

This mill has been provided with oil burners for both heat and power. Both the Lyell and Pease and the Columbia Board Company are working on orders which include a busy season ahead.

Capt. Schendel In Legal Suit

Action Brought Because Of Incidents Growing Out of Man's Arrest.

Russell street property of Police Captain Herman Schendel has been attached to a \$2,500 action brought against him by William Lewis, of this town, as the result of incidents growing out of Lewis' arrest, last February, it has been revealed through a series of papers made by Constable James Duffy. Lewis claims that during his confinement overnight in a headquarters cell he was maltreated, causing him physical harm. He is represented by Attorney William M. Harney of Hartford.

Sealed Cell Furnishings Lewis was brought to headquarters at the time of his arrest and held for court the following day. During testimony in court it was revealed the prisoners had smashed some of the cell furnishings and had to be forcibly restrained from doing further damage. Captain Schendel was in charge of headquarters at the time. Lewis claims he was handcuffed to cell bars for a long period, the method of handcuffing forcing him to be placed in an unnatural and painful position. It is the time, he said in court he had suffered physical harm from his treatment.

In Official Capacity Since Schendel was acting in an official capacity at the time of the incident, it was intimated today that the town council may be called on to defend the police officer's action in the restraining of the plaintiff Lewis.
