Cheneys and Union Hail New Contract As Aiding Relations

Both Parties Believe It Will Be Helpful in Future Understandings And Parleys; Agreement Seen Bringing Increased Business Here.

A new contract between Cheney Brothers and Local 43, of the Textile Workers Union of America, proposed by the National Defense Mediation Board, and ratified by the membership of the Union last night, was signed by representatives of Cheney Brothers and the Union in Cheney Brothers main office just before noon today. Included in the contract is provision that the Union be the sole agency for collective bargaining at the plant, a 5-cent an hour increase in wages, a week's vacation or its equivalent in vacation pay, perfection of seniority procedure, and voluntary contributions by employees of deduction of Union dues from their wages.

Summary of Contract. A summary of the contract, authorized for publication in the press by President Ward Cheney, of Cheney Brothers, and Francis M. Riley and Michael Chiswick, of the Union, follows: "The new contract between Cheney Brothers and Local 43 of the Textile Workers Union of America, the provisions of which were

worked out last week in Washington under the auspices of the National Defense Mediation Board, was tonight ratified by the membership of the Union.

The contract provides that the Union, however, made no announcement of a strike and Dr. W. H. Kinsaid, SWOC organizer, said the management had agreed to sign a contract at 2 p. m. tomorrow but that the workers refused to wait for contract.

Axis Consuls Leave Today On Navy Ship

Farewell Parties Banned On Vessel That Will Sail With Nearly 500 Passengers to Lisbon.

New York, July 15.—The pride of the American merchant marine leaves tonight on a maiden transatlantic voyage as strange as any in history. Farewell parties are banned on the great dark-gray vessel that will sail for Lisbon with nearly 500 passengers straight into war-torn waters.

Aboard will be German and Italian consular officials and other agents of Axis governments and their families who are quitting the United States by order of the state department.

The ship is the 27,000-ton former liner America—largest merchant vessel ever built in this country—which has been converted into a Navy transport and renamed the West Point.

At 10 p. m. today, the ship will be scheduled for 8 p. m. (a. t. l.), but the mass departure of Axis nations will be delayed pending the arrival of German consular representatives flying here from San Francisco.

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Russian Pact Seen Alliance By Churchill

Implies British Relations with French Also Favorable; Cordial Spirit in Truce Seen.

London, July 15.—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill declared today in the House of Commons that the new British-Russian agreement for joint war action against Germany was "an alliance" and that the Russian and British peoples now were allies.

Implying that British relations with the French also were favorable, the prime minister said the armistice which gave British and French forces control of the Rhine, 15 miles to the south, and

That, Churchill said, "is a proof of the deep comprehension of the French people of the true issues at stake in the world."

"We seek no British advantage in Syria. Our only object had been to beat the Germans and to help win the war."

The British-Russian alliance does not mean, Churchill declared, that Britain is identifying herself with the Communist creed.

Britain Gains Planes, Ships

Certain War Materials Also Yielded Under Terms of Armistice.

Vichy, Unoccupied France, July 15.—(AP)—All French planes in Syria and Lebanon, all ships in territorial waters of the mandate and certain war materials are yielded to British under terms of the armistice of Acre announced here today.

French soldiers, who fought five weeks in a vain attempt to block the British invasion, and French civilians were given a free choice as to whether to join the Allied cause (whom units include the Free French forces of Gen. Charles de Gaulle).

The force of the explosion sent the boiler and locomotive hurtling several hundred feet through the air.

The victims, all occupants of the cab, were identified as Charles E. Smith, engineer; Robert J. Price, fireman; and James M. Cleary, conductor.
