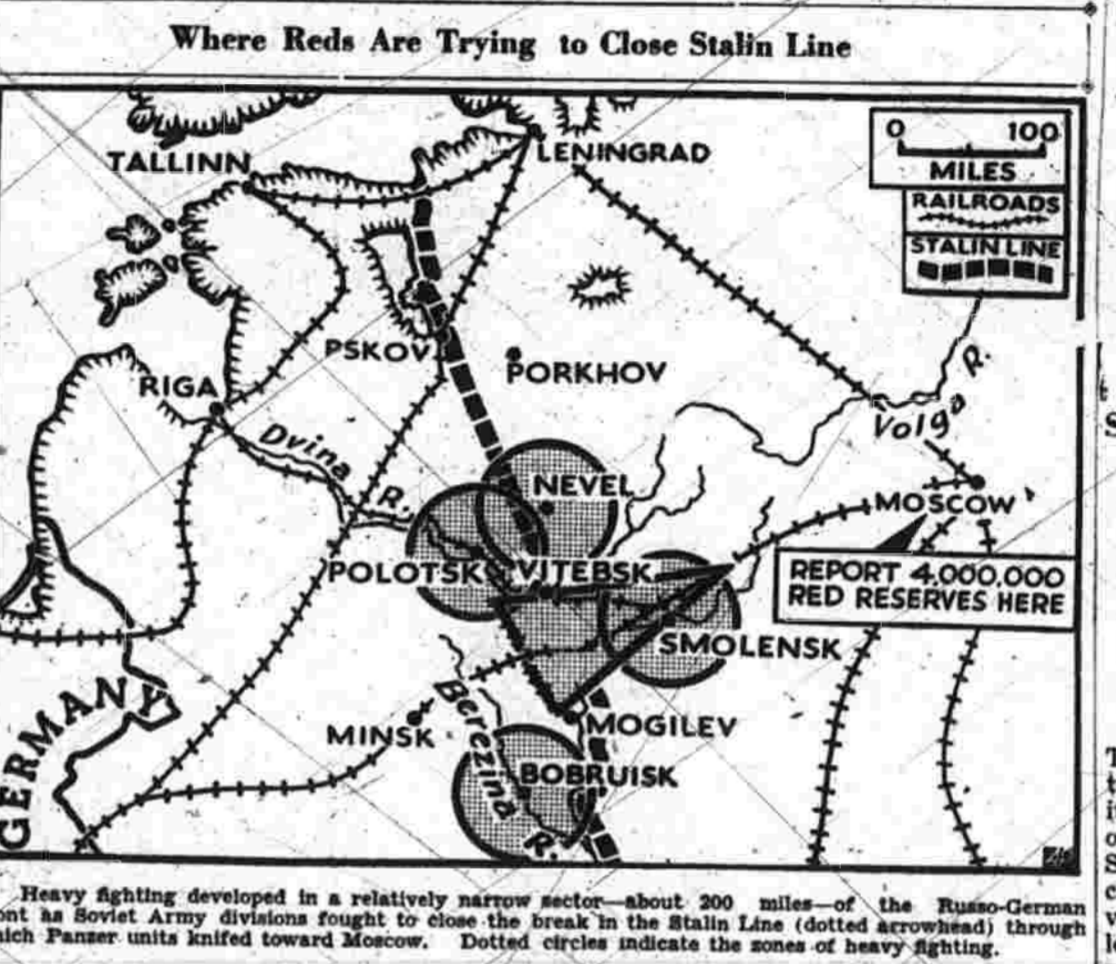

The American First Poll

The actual figures of the war poll made by the Samuel E. Gill organization, with funds supplied by the American First Committee, and representing the views of 6,000 scientifically questioned individuals, are a great deal more interesting than the First Poll.

They take from the poll the conclusion that "American public opinion is overwhelmingly in favor of participation in the European war."

They cite one statistic provided by the poll, and which they believe that the United States should enter the war as an active belligerent at this time."

But the poll itself was fairer than its users, and perhaps fairer than its financial backers intended it to be.

Their secondary tabulations could be used to prove the exact opposite of what the American First Committee claim.

The Gill organization, after it had obtained the figures American First Committee is interested in, was apparently itself interested in ascertaining the truth.

In addition to the 13.1 per cent declaring for active entry into the war now, the poll discovers that another 2.9 per cent would favor such a step as soon as they consider the United States militarily prepared.

Now if Germany defeats Russia, proceeds to the coast of Alaska, and renews bickering in Britain, so that Britain seems about to be defeated, and if it is admitted that the Robin Moor was an American ship, and a foreign submarine turns up to help Peru fight Ecuador, this poll would be suddenly up to date, and it would have to be 58 per cent for war.

It is a fund, sensible, patriotic campaign, without a flaw in it that we can see. It deserves our support.

In South America, Equally important with the occupation of Iceland, or the potential future occupation of strategic points in the South Atlantic, is the forestalling of any growth of Axis influence in South America.

It is essential to the security of this hemisphere that all the "Good Neighbors" remain that.

The United States must not only take pointed and drastic action at the time, but must keep the good sense and loyalty of the American people.

Should any nation have its policy on such an "if-then" basis, it is not only unwise, but it is also un-American.

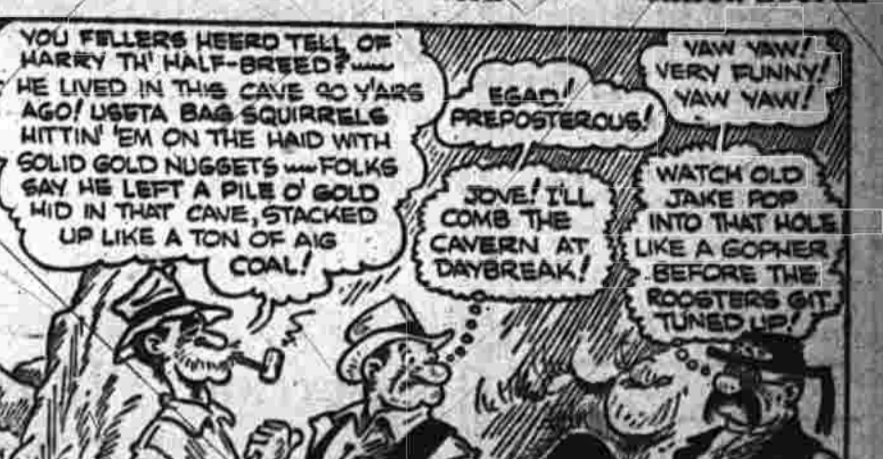
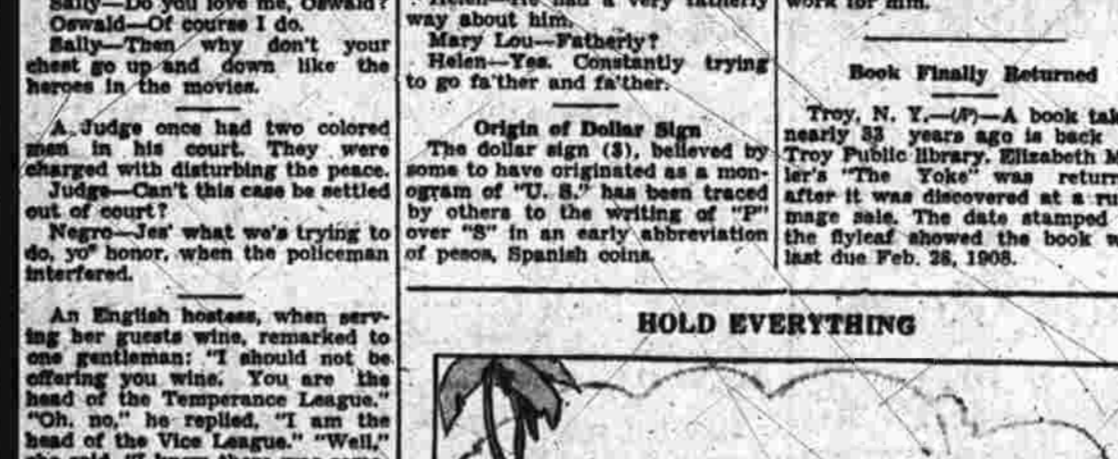
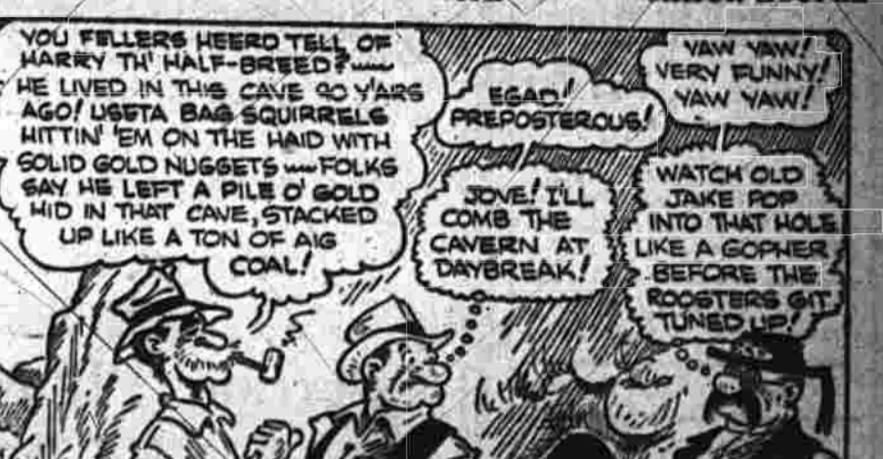
