Expect Thailand Will Resist Japs; Control Is Part of Axis Plan

Pressure on Thailand Is Seen Part of Effort To Seize Control of Oceans and Dominate World; Latest Japanese Moves Seen Dovetailing with Nazi Demand for Vichy Bases.

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The United States government, it was learned today, believes that Japan's pressure bid for control of Thailand is part of a well-patterned Axis plan to seize control of the oceans and thereby dominate the world.

What—and if—Germany and Japan accomplish that ambitious objective, a ranking official said, "the Axis powers could join forces across the southern oceans and dominate the area, isolating the Americas from the Pacific and the Atlantic."

Since Japan represents one of the jaws in the gigantic pincer movement, an authoritative source stated, Japanese secretaries in Indo-China and Thailand cannot be considered in the category of isolated aggression, but must be treated as vital elements in the Axis grand strategy.

For this reason, it was explained, the United States has assumed a "forced" diplomatic policy designed both to stiffen French resistance to German demands and to warn Japan against further military adventures in the South Pacific before it is too late.

Secretary of State Hull emphasized the tremendous scope of the Axis plan, it was pointed out when he declared on Monday that the recent developments in Europe and Asia provided "the most striking demonstration of the world movement of conquest by force" in progress.

State Department officials also cited several previous formal pronouncements by the secretary which he considered would be questions for their collaboration in aggression and asserted that they "have as their chief objective the strengthening of Singapore through advance bases at the expense of Thailand's independence."

Much Ragweed Noticed Within Confines of Town

"Weed." The definition of this term as it appears in standard dictionaries is: "Any plant growing uncultivated or noxious to cultivated crops," another statement reads: "An obnoxious growth."
