## Panzer Units Chase Reds to Black Sea; Soviets Fight Hard

**Hard-Pressed on Both Flanks, Reds Battle Fiercely Against Two Nut-Cracker Movements Around Leningrad in North and Kiev in Ukraine; Still Hold Moscow Road.**

Moscow, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Hard-pressed on both flanks, the Red Army reported today fighting fiercely against two Nazi nut-cracker movements around Leningrad in the north and Kiev in the Ukraine. The daily war bulletin declared the Russians still held the Nazis stalemated on the central road to Moscow in the long-contested Smolensk salient.

"No major engagements took place on other directions and sectors of the front," the mid-day communication said.

**Centers of Fighting**  
The centers of fighting in the north were listed as Kokkoi, on the Karelian isthmus 75 miles north of Leningrad, and the Soit sector 120 miles south of Russia's second largest city.

Key battalions in the south still were given by the Russians as Krasnodar, 80 miles northwest of Kiev, and Uman, midway between the Ukrainian capital and the Black Sea port of Odessa.

The communiques credited the Red Air Force with hard blows at East infantry and motorized forces along the entire battlefield and at the Luftwaffe's nests deep behind the lines.

**Tank Columns Routed**  
The rout of a large German tank column in the Korosten area was reported in detail.

In one battle in the Korosten area a large German tank column was routed by Russian airplanes, tanks, artillerymen and infantrymen working together to annihilate the column. After the engagement wreckage of the German units was strewn along a road for eight miles, the Red Army reported.

More than 50 per cent of the German tanks were destroyed, including 15 heavy machines. Two anti-aircraft batteries were destroyed, the communiques said.

The Soviet Bureau of Information's midnight communique dealt principally with the stepped-up air war and increasing guerrilla operations behind the German lines, but cast little new light on the action on the battlefield.

**Push Still Checked Firmly**  
Fighting in the Smolensk salient toward Moscow went into its 25th day with the Nazi eastward push apparently still checked firmly.

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**Bold Attack Made Today On Cologne**

**Other Waves of British Warplanes Make Raids On Coast of German-Occupied France.**

London, Aug. 12.—(AP)—British bombers made a bold daylight attack on the big German Rhineland city of Cologne today, authorities said. The attack was the first since the city was captured by German forces in May.

The raid was described by the British press as the heaviest daylight attack made on Germany. Several large cargoes of bombs to blast the Rhineland industrial area were believed to have carried off by German fighters.

**Food Reserve Seen Needed**

Washington, Aug. 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt declared in a letter made public today by Secretary Dickel that the country needed food reserves to meet emergencies which can as yet be only dimly foreseen.

Addressed to the secretary, it was dated July 25.

Mr. Roosevelt said that in this time of crisis, "it is a weapon against Hitlerism just as much as munitions and food will continue to be a weapon."

He recalled that in the first World War, it became necessary to establish a food administration to deal with the situation.

He said agriculture was meeting the situation much more satisfactorily by increasing production in an orderly way "so that our own needs and the needs of our friends can be met without causing serious or unduly high prices."

"As you pointed out," the president wrote, "we need not only abundant production for ourselves but for a backstop for hungry nations."

He said that the United States was producing more than enough to meet its own needs and to supply the needs of its friends.

**Two British Aces Missing**

**Legless Veteran of Battle of Britain and Lock Are Unreported.**

London, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Wing Commander Douglas R. Bader, legless veteran of the Battle of Britain who had been credited with shooting down 15 German planes, and Acting Flight Lieutenant E. S. Lock, another ace credited with 30 victories, were reported missing today.

Bader, 30 years old, had won the Distinguished Service Order and Bar and Distinguished Flying Cross with Bar. He gained nine of his victories in one week last September and was decorated at Buckingham Palace after undergoing 14 operations for burns suffered in a battle.

Bader had participated in many of the offensive sweeps of the R.A.F. over the channel and France.

**Last Legs in 1918**  
He lost both legs in a flying accident while serving with the R.A.F. in 1918. After proving that he could fly with artificial limbs, he managed to reenter the service after the start of the war and participated in many daring raids.

Hope was abandoned for the legless veteran's return to active service last September when his leg was amputated. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Order for

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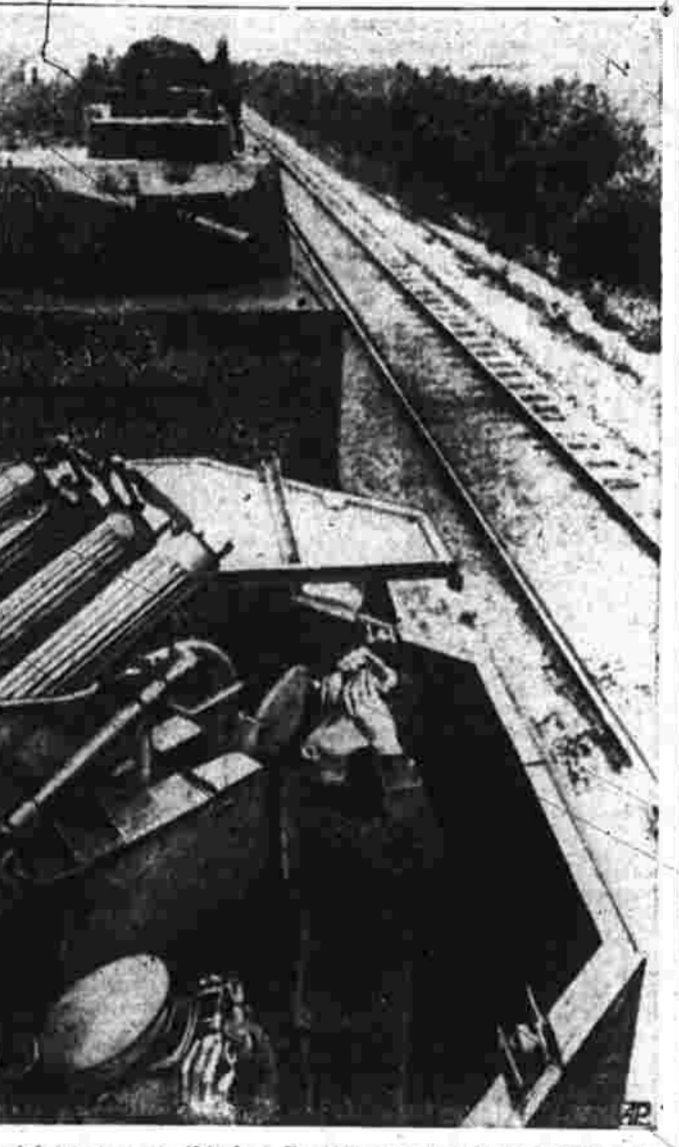
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## Heading for War Front

Washington, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Navy Secretary Knox and L. H. Korndorff, president of the Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock Company, conferred for more than an hour today on the company's offer to turn over its strike-bound Kearny, N. J., yard to the Navy, then adjourned their discussions to a later hour.

Other than a brief announcement by Korndorff that the conference would be resumed at 2 p. m. (e.s.t.), there was no disclosure regarding the meeting.

**Easy Payment Plans Are Hit By New Order**

Washington, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Easy payment plans felt the impact of defense requirements today, as the administration acted to curb the nation's \$10,000,000,000 installment credit business.

The announced purpose of the such was twofold.

**Valley of 10,000 Smokes Has Only Eight Jets Left**

Juneau, Alaska, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes, relic of America's most fearsome natural phenomena, is losing its punch.

In fact, there are only eight smokes left.

This surprising information was relayed here today by J. C. Roehm, a mining engineer, after a trip across the Alutian peninsula.

Roehm, offering no explanation for disappearance of thousands of steam jets which made the valley like something out of a Dante-Dreard inferno, radioed that the remaining jets are small, mild and apparently growing smaller. Roehm predicted that the smokes would soon stop entirely, allowing the valley to return to its peaceful character of before 1912.

Once Parly's Hunting Ground

Before 1912, the little valley was Parly's Hunting Ground. It was incorporated in a national monument.

But now, according to Roehm, grass grows on the sand, the vapors are vanishing, and the smokes have lost their punch.

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## Reports Japan Ready To Push Drive Ahead; Now Holds Peace Key

**Authoritative Quarters in London Say Japan Will Decide War or Peace in Pacific; Reiterates Attitude of Australia; No New Moves Made by Nipponese in Area in Last 24 Hours.**

London, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Authoritative quarters declared today "if Japan wants war, if she wants peace there will be peace." The statement, in effect, was a reiteration of the attitude of Australia, voiced Sunday by Navy Minister William Hughes. Authoritative quarters said the government of Thailand had not been in communication with the British government, and so far as knowledge goes here Japan has made no new moves within the last 24 hours in the South Pacific area.

The quarters strongly denied knowledge of reports published in some English newspapers, and already denied by Japanese spokesmen in Moscow that Japan had demanded demilitarization of the Russian side of the Manchukuo frontier.

Also denied were Japanese reports that the United States is negotiating for lease of naval bases in the Vladivostok area.

**Army Plans New Bases For Maine**

**Airports at Presque Isle and Houlton to Serve As Ferrying Points on Deliveries to Britain.**

Washington, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Army plans to erect 35,496,000 for two huge air bases at Presque Isle and Houlton, Me., to serve as ferrying points for the delivery of bombers and other warplanes to Great Britain were disclosed today.

Army officials notified Senator Brewster (R-Me.) their plans called for enlarging airports at both places which previously had served as ferrying points for the delivery of mail.

Menzies said the meetings had to do with "the security of the empire and the things it stands for."

**Exemption Cut Seen as Sure**

**George Believes Senate Committee Will Vote To Reduce Limits Set.**

Washington, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the Senate Finance Committee voiced the opinion today that the committee would vote to reduce personal income tax exemptions to \$700 for single persons and \$1,000 for married couples, as recommended by the Treasury.

Present exemptions allow \$100 for single persons and \$2,000 for those who are married.

George also said that it is expected "some readjustment of personal income tax rates" to be made by the committee before it finished its work on the new \$3,250,000,000 tax program already approved by the House. He did not particularly suggest any other changes.

**Suggests Super-tax**  
As the committee convened to hear a new group of witnesses testified on specific sections of the measure, Senator New (D-N.D.) suggested that the present 10 per cent defense tax be increased to 15 per cent lease-lease of British aid.

He proposed that an additional line be inserted in the Federal income tax return upon which the taxpayer would contribute \$100 to the war effort.

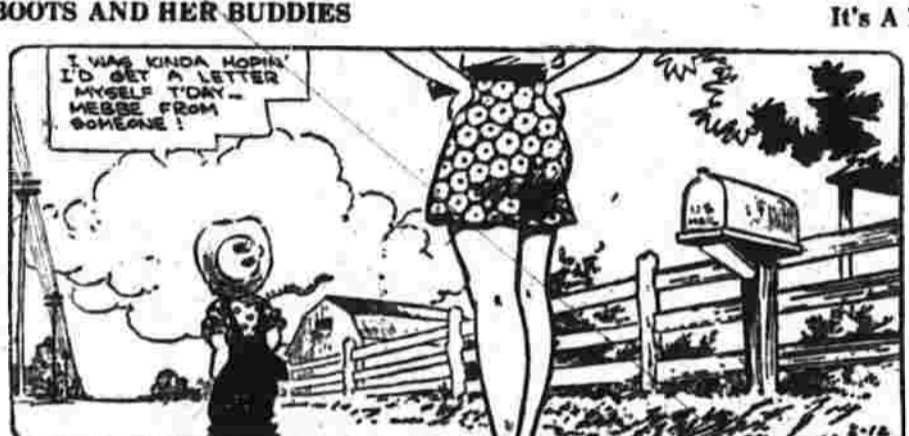
