## Question of Loan For Reds Results In Opinions Clash

### Danaher Demands Full Details Be Given Congress Before Credits Placed at Soviet Disposal for Purchase of Military Supplies Here.

Washington, Aug. 22.—(P)—The question of a war loan for Russia produced a sharp division in legislative opinion today, and Senator Danaher (R., Conn.), demanded that Congress be given full details before any credits are placed at Soviet disposal for the purchase of military supplies here. Danaher called attention to the statement of Jesse Jones that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation would be ready to make a cash loan to Russia for war purposes, if and when they need it, assuming that the administration policy favored such assistance.

### Japan Hoping Planes Won't Stay in East

#### Desires American Assurances Bombers Sent to Russia Will Not Be Kept at Vladivostok.

Tokyo, Aug. 22.—(P)—Japan hopes for United States assurances that any American-made bombers which may be sent to Russia will not be kept at Vladivostok, Koh-i-hahi, the Foreign Office spokesman, said today. He said Japan is gravely concerned over United States carrying supplies to that port for Russia, but expressed the opinion she would not be concerned over any shipments via the Near East.

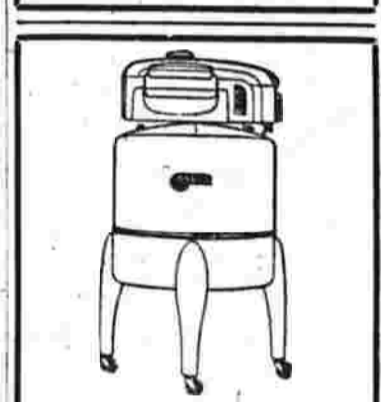
Zone Board to Investigate Conditions Further; Appeals Granted.
