Adolf Hitler's field headquarters reported operations "continued according to plan" on the entire Soviet front of nearly 2,000 miles, but military commentators said German, Hungarian and Rumanian troops had entered Zaporozhe, Important Ukrainian rail junction east of the lower Dnieper river, and Luftwaffe bombers had interrupted traffic as far east as Slavyanks, 140 miles deeper into Russia. Five trains were said to have been damaged.

A communique from the Fueh-

A communique from the Fuehrer's headquarters said the Finns and cooperating Germans scored a great victory over two Red Army divisions east of Salla, which is about 80 miles above the Arctic Circle and an equal distance west of the Murmansk-Leningrad railroad.

By their victory at Velikie Luki, announced yesterday by the high command, German troops tore a big gap in the Soviet front defending Moscow, commentators said. The claimed elimination of the 22nd Russian Army in this battle relieved the Germans of Soviet preasure and gave them freedom of movement in the central sector, military sources believed.

The battle lasted for several days in ibad weather, the communique said, but ended with the remnants of the Russian units in flight and all their equipment lost.

The territory is a familiar one for the Finns, who handed the Russians two very similar beatings in that sector in January, 1940, only to cede Salla to the Sovieta after their war was lost.

It was not disclosed how far east of Salla they had pressed this time, but the Murmansk railroad was the obvious objective.




