

Using Tank Cars Will Solve East's Shortage of Gas

Pelley Asserts 20,000 Used for Transportation Would Offset Cut In Supply Within Two Weeks; Conference Set for Tomorrow.

Washington, Sept. 3.—(P)—A railroad executive told a special Senate investigating committee today that the gasoline and petroleum situation in the east could be solved within two weeks by the use of 20,000 railroad tank cars. J. J. Pelley, president of the Association of American Railroads, told senators that such a solution might be accomplished at a conference here tomorrow called by Ralph K. Davies, acting petroleum coordinator.

Pelley said Davies had asked representatives of oil companies, railroads, and tank car owners to meet with him tomorrow.

Rate Agreement Needed First

In reply to questions by Chairman Maloney (D. Conn.) of the investigating group, Pelley said an agreement on reduced railroad tank car rates was the first thing needed. He contended that the oil industry also lacked some facilities for loading and unloading petroleum products from rail cars because tanker ships normally were used.

Maloney, recalling testimony by Davies that the eastern shortage was 174,000 barrels a day, asked whether 20,000 tank cars could offset this.

"Within a week we could have solid trains of oil moving from Louisiana and Texas to the Atlantic seaboard," Pelley said, adding that these cars could bring 200,000 barrels daily.

Pelley appeared at the committee's request to discuss the possibility of using tank cars to help increase the flow of oil to the east, which has been receiving reduced supplies since water-roads deliveries were curtailed after the transfer of a number of sea-going tankers to Britain.

Surplus of Cars Available

The railroad man said that despite the general increase in the transportation of oil, the surplus of the use of rail tank cars for that purpose had declined in recent years, and hence a surplus was available.

Pelley said that information as to the number of tank cars available could have been procured earlier had anyone indicated that it was needed.

In this connection, he expressed surprise at the testimony of Ralph K. Davies, acting petroleum coordinator, who told the committee last week that "this is the sort of definite information I have com-

Labor Leader Hits New Milk Control Board

Sees Great Injustice in Failure to Name Representative of Union as Representative in Set-Up.

Bridgport, Sept. 3.—(P)—Thomas F. Murphy of Bridgport charged today at the Connecticut Federation of Labor convention that organized labor was given no representation in the new state milk control set-up and asserted "this is a great injustice and a slap in the face to labor which we must all regret."

"We must out on Lamb!" His organization, Murphy asserted, "went away out on the lamb in endorsing the Democratic ticket and in helping to elect its candidate in the hope of getting favorable legislation in our industry."

"When milk legislation was proposed," he said, "we turned to a request that labor should be given some recognition in the new set up of milk control. To our disappointment we were denied representation, despite the fact that we still should not seek by taxation to paralyze the driving force of individual effort and initiative."

Red Counter-Attacks Drive Germans Back; Resistance Is Fierce

Russian Forces Using Tanks in Great Numbers; One Nazi Corps Claims to Have Demolished 178 Since Saturday; Spearhead of German Drive Now Within 20 Miles of Leningrad.

Berlin, Sept. 3.—(P)—Soviet warships and shore batteries joined Russian troops in "trying to hold up a further German advance" in the Estonian coastal area yesterday, but Soviet resistance was broken, DNB reported today.

Berlin, Sept. 3.—(P)—Russian forces putting up a fierce resistance to the Germans on the middle sector of the eastern front are using tanks in great numbers, authorized sources reported today as the main command told of fighting along the entire battlefront. One German Army corps holding a middle front sector claimed to have demolished 178 tanks since Saturday.

Pierce Russian resistance, which blunted the spearhead of the Nazi drive on Leningrad, today to have hurled the German army and moving steadily forward, the German declared today.

Nazi Won't Feed People Under Heels

Say It Is Up to Britain To Permit Grain Vessels to Reach Black Sea.

Berlin, Sept. 3.—(P)—"Under no circumstances has Germany under international law any obligation to feed the population" of occupied Russian areas, authorized German sources declared today in response to a question on how such areas are being provisioned.

These sources said it was up to Britain and "a power having a certain influence upon England" to permit grain ships for occupied Russian areas to reach a Black Sea port.

Must Merely Keep Order

The German occupying force must merely keep order and has no duty to release supplies of its own to an enemy population, they declared. In fact, it even has the right to requisition supplies.

Moscow, Sept. 3.—(P)—The Germans have been hurled back with heavy losses by Russian counter-offensives on the fronts before Moscow and Leningrad and stopped at the Godes of Odessa, Russian war dispatches reported today.

The Nazis' war-long losses were put at close to 3,000,000 men. Yemelyan Yaroslavsky, a member of the Central party and a leading Communist publicist, declared in Pravda, that the Germans had lost 2,500,000 men—dead, wounded, prisoners—since the war began, including more than 2,000,000 on the eastern front alone.

Moscow, Sept. 3.—(P)—Two Red Army counter-offensives, one commanded personally by Marshal Klement Voroshilov before the gates of Leningrad, were reported today to have hurled the Germans back with heavy losses in the northern and central areas of the eastern front. On the center of the front, in the sector entrusted to Marshal Semion Timoshenko, Pravda, the Communist party organ, said advancing Red Army troops have retaken 22 villages in 10 days of battle.

Units commanded by Colonel Boykov, it was stated, threw the German back more than 30 miles after a tank attack by Russian mechanized forces had stripped off a German salient at its base.

Infantry Division Destroyed

A German 28—Elite Blackshirt Infantry Division was destroyed and a Nazi-poled height commanding the coastline in one central front area was recaptured, its dispatch said.

Konoye Says Japan Facing Grave Crisis

Total Mobilization Seen Necessary to Overcome Emergency; Sea Supply Zone Plan Is Backed.

Tokyo, Sept. 3.—(P)—Premier Prince Fumimaro Konoye told government and war industries representatives today that Japan was facing the gravest crisis in her history. Konoye said that total mobilization was necessary to overcome the emergency.

It was Konoye's first public statement since July 30 and came in the wake of a report from the United States war supplies to Soviet Russia through water routes, which Konoye said was a subject for discussion in Tokyo, Washington and Moscow.

The premier spoke before a round table conference of government executives and leaders of Japanese business concerns, organized by the National Service Association to develop Japan's economic power.

Threat Support to Proposals

Leaders of Tohoku, extreme nationalist political group headed by Seigo Nakano, threw their support to proposals for establishment of an ocean safety zone around Japan, a plan which Konoye said yesterday to have under consideration.

Nazi Warship Plane Target

Pocket Battleship Luetzow Hit by Torpedo Launched by Aircraft.

London, Sept. 3.—(P)—A British torpedo plane hit the 10,000-ton pocket battleship Luetzow a few weeks ago, Sir Archibald Sinclair, the air minister, told a national defense luncheon meeting today.

He announced no details of the engagement.

King George VI, responding to an expression of loyalty from the National Defense Committee, sent a message that "the two hard years that lie behind us have left all unshaken in our determination to see justice and freedom established throughout the world."

Battle Not Too Bad

Sinclair told the gathering that the battle of the Atlantic is not going too badly for us, but warned that it would probably require some time "an immense concentration of attention and effort."

"Thinkings of British ships in the month of July," he said, "were the lowest for any month for the last ten years. . . . During the latter part of the month, the average weight of merchandise arriving from overseas exceeded 600,000 tons. The British fleet was at its highest."

He declared the "spirit of Great Britain" which paralyzed half the world a year ago has now been finally broken. "The British fleet is now a more powerful force than it has been for many years."

He reported coastal command planes had attacked 138 U-Boats in the past year and "shot down more than 30 German aircraft" in protecting convoys.

Four Infected As India

New York, Sept. 3.—(P)—Three men and an 18-year-old girl were indicted today on charges of conspiracy to violate the Espionage Act, as the government moved to break up what Federal agents described as an international ring of spies operating here and in Spain, Portugal and Germany. The government charged that the defendants, all in custody, had gathered and transmitted to Axis forces in Europe information on the movements and disposition of American forces together with pictures and sketches of strategic points along the eastern seaboard.

Mexico To Buy Planes

Mexico City, Sept. 3.—(P)—An official announcement said today that the United States would grant a special credit to allow Mexico to buy 100 American warplanes. The announcement said the credit would be granted as soon as the questions between the countries were settled. The credit would be used to purchase the planes and other equipment which would be used as part of the Mexican Air Force at the end of 1941.

Indian Army Units Fully Motorized, Bring All of Equipment.

Singapore, Sept. 3.—(P)—British Imperial Army in Malaya received new, strong reinforcements today with arrival of Indian Army units, fully motorized and bearing all their fighting equipment with them.

The contingents included seasoned Indian infantrymen, veterans of recent campaigns in the northwest frontier, Indian signalmen, and a British artillery company equipped with the very latest tractor-drawn guns.

Met by Commander-in-Chief

Brooke-Popham, Imperial commander-in-chief in Far Eastern forces, met the transport.

British forces in Malaya have been repeatedly strengthened recently. British Bombers Make Offensive Continuous

Wave After Wave Shuttles Across Channel During Night, Early Today; Berlin Target.

London, Sept. 3.—(P)—British bombers which blasted Berlin last night caused enormous explosions in the capital and started a very large fire near one of the main Berlin railway stations, the Air Ministry News Service said tonight. The service said that the attacking planes bombed the capital with "some of the heaviest bombs."

London, Sept. 3.—(P)—Wave after wave of British bombers shuttled across the English Channel last night and early today to continue a round-the-clock offensive by blasting at Berlin, southwestern Germany and Nazi-occupied France. The two main objectives of the R.A.F. during the night were Berlin and Frankfurt.

Sir Archibald Sinclair, the air minister, said at a luncheon that the British bombers "hit the city of Berlin hard."

At Frankfurt, British reports said, a heavy attack was made on railway communications and industrial targets.

The force which bombed Berlin was not so large, they said, but included a high proportion of the heaviest bombers. Large fires were left burning in the city and bombs were seen to burst on industrial buildings, returning pilot reports.

The British also attacked other towns in western Germany, including Mannheim, and the German-occupied channel ports of Ostend and Dunkerque, the Air Ministry announced.

A total of nine British planes were lost during the night operations, the ministry said.

The first wave of R. A. F. night raiders crossed eastward a short time after darkness had descended on Dover Strait, and violent anti-aircraft fire lighting the sky over Boulogne and Calais indicated that the French coast was being hammered all day yesterday, "was taking another pounding."

Chief Gordon's Blooming Cereus Plant

Night Blooming Cereus Has Coming Out Party

There was considerable activity last night in the vicinity of Chief Samuel Gordon's house on Holl street. There was no wedding, no anniversary—nor even a social hour with friends of the Chief and wife gathered in. But curiosity was aroused a bit by residents when folks kept trooping into the Gordon yard late last night.

Coming Out Party. The reason: The Chief's 7-year-old night blooming cereus had a coming-out party! And how it was a coming out party, in fact it was but a continuation of the night before and in the 48 hour period the big plant gave birth to 17 blooms. Small wonder, then, that so many people dropped in to see this remarkable plant, in fact they kept coming long after daylight this morning, for the Chief's plant, different than many others, kept its blooms open long after the light from the east had shown full upon them.

Many Pictures Taken. Many also took photos of this remarkable plant of the cactus family and which is known to display its blooms only after the daylight has waned, more often about midnight than earlier.

The plant is seven years old and has already had 42 blooms and there are five more buds jutting out from the leaves, as peculiar to the cactus family, which will no doubt open up soon. This will make a total of 47 blooms—an unusual feat for one plant.

Horticultural experts from the University of Connecticut have seen the Gordon plant and place it and its accomplishment in a class by itself.
