

U. S. Destroyer Attacked More Than Once; To Hunt and Eliminate Marauding Sub

Pipe Line Building Seen as Solution For Gas Problem

Construction Urged by Henderson as Seaboard States Look to Rail Transportation as Solution to Oil and Gasoline Shortage.

Washington, Sept. 5.—(P)—Heavy construction of pipe lines to carry petroleum products to the east was advocated today by Leon Henderson, as the seaboard states looked to rail transportation for a quick, if temporary, solution of their oil and gasoline problems.

"You can't sink a pipe line," said the chief of price administration in testimony before a Senate Committee that if this country ever should be attacked, pipe lines would be "hole cards" lacking up the customary transportation by tankers.

Hope Based on Pledge

The hope that the eastern emergency might soon be alleviated was based on a pledge by oil industry representatives last night to use every available railroad tank car at once to move the west. Spokesmen for the railroad industry said this could eliminate shortages within two weeks.
