

Lease-Lend Goods Will Not Compete With U. S. Trade

Britain Promises to Prevent Such Misuse and To Restrict Exports; 'Propaganda Value to Germany' of Charges Is Cause of Concern.

London, Sept. 10.—(AP)—British officials concerned over charges that materials obtained from the United States under the lease-lend act were being used in direct competition with American industry in export markets, promised today to prevent such misuse and to restrict British exports.

The agreement with the United States was announced in a White Paper and was said by a reliable source to be one of a series of steps planned to prevent grumbling as the thin edge of a wedge to pry Britain and the United States apart and hamper the Allied war effort.

Expected Campaign Soon Britain, this informant said, expects such a German propaganda campaign to come to a head soon and wants to be able to meet it.

He asserted the campaign is now under way in Britain as well as in the United States, that by word of mouth seeds of dissension were being sown in British "pubs" and factories.

The charges he heard here, the source said, was that the United States is trying to use the lease-lend program to bar Britain from exporting anything so that the United States can steal all British foreign markets, thus throwing British labor out of jobs after the war.

On the other hand in the United States, it was said, charges are made that Britain was accepting lease-lend goods and then sending them to South America.

Expected Drop Off 'Actually, the source said, "our exports to South America, have fallen off considerably, but the service departments won't let us give figures because they might give too much information to German sea raiders."

One example of the kind of thing being used to strike at Anglo-American friendship, the source said, "is good will advertisements in British air-line companies."

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Boost in Price Seen Solution Of Shortage

Maloney Suggests Small Increase Would Cover Additional Cost of Using Railroad Cars.

Washington, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Chairman Maloney (D., Conn.) of the special Senate committee investigating the eastern gasoline and petroleum situation suggested today that a price increase of less than one cent a gallon would remedy all threats of shortage.

Senator Maloney said such an increase would cover the additional cost of moving a large supply of petroleum oil by railroad tank cars to more than offset shortages resulting from diversion of American tanker ships to British service.

A few hours earlier the Supply Priorities and Allocations Board had adopted a plan for immediate construction of an \$80,000,000 pipeline from Texas to the east coast.

Refuses To Grant Priorities The board simply refused to grant priorities, at the present time, for the steel needed to build the line, Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the Maritime Commission, has contended repeatedly that the steel was needed more for ships.

While the SPAAB did not pass on ultimate construction of the pipeline, the decision apparently blocked any chance that the line might be completed by next spring, originally proposed.

Ralph K. Davies, acting petroleum controller, told the Senate investigating committee yesterday that the line should be built "as a matter of national defense just as vital as warships and planes."

Maloney urged Davies to work out some plan so that additional cost of railroad movement of petroleum products could be shared by the entire industry.

The witness said such a move was under consideration but believed that the oil industry should actually demonstrate increased costs before asking price increases.

"You may be right," Maloney said. "I am not sure."

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Storming Leningrad Seen as Too Costly; Nazi Division Routed

Thousands of Casualties Inflicted in Powerful Attack in Gomel Sector of Eastern Front; Nazi Division Routed

Moscow, Sept. 10.—(AP)—The Red Army reported today that it had routed the 29th German Infantry Division in a powerful attack in the Gomel sector of the eastern front, inflicting thousands of casualties. Gomel is about 100 miles from Kiev and the Kirovsk sector where the Russians said bloody expulsion of 100-square-mile zone had dealt heavy blow to Adolf Hitler's legions.

Red Army counter-attacks in both sectors were understood to be continuing full blast.

Smash Repeated Attacks Red Star, the Army newspaper, said the sweeping counter-offensive "after a five-day smash repeated German attacks on Red Army positions."

At an undesignated sector, apparently in the same general area, Red Star said the Russian troops forced a German retreat across the river "after a five-day tank battle."

The Red Air Force cooperated with ground forces in striking at a wedge-shaped German tank and motorized division, the paper said, the Germans finally lost 120 tanks, 30 planes, 450 armoured cars and 86 other equipment.

Almost 4,000 German soldiers and 1,200,000 rounds of ammunition were accounted for, the German Seventh Division alone, it was already "considerably battered," lost 8 tanks, 30 guns and 1,800 men, Red Star added.

Infantry Division Routed Referring specifically to the fighting around Gomel, it said the 29th German Infantry Division was routed, leaving thousands of corpses on the battlefield.

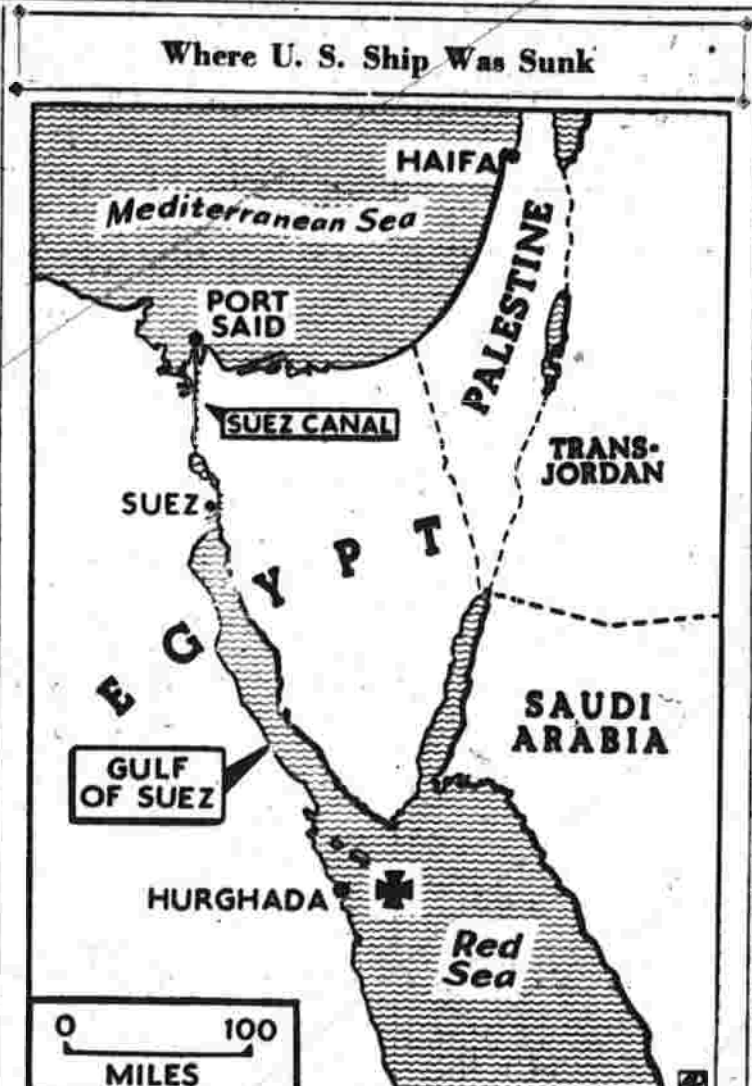
"Our land forces alone destroyed 47 German tanks, 11 field guns, 150 armoured cars and 86 other equipment," it said.

Berlin, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Two more merchantmen have been damaged in the Suez Canal zone by German air assaults, the high command reported today.

A bomb hit, it said, was scored on a freighter in Great Bitter Lake, part of the canal system, and another merchant ship damaged in the Gulf of Suez below the canal.

Clark took the stand as an interested party in the hearing on the alleged dissemination of war propaganda.

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Jap Papers Cut Clamor

General Slackening In Noted After Crew Confronted With Toyoda.

Tokyo, Sept. 10.—(AP)—A general slackening of newspaper clamor against American foreign policy was noted today concurrently with the disclosure that U. S. Ambassador Joseph C. Grew has conferred with the Japanese foreign minister about 12 miles within a week.

As Japanese concern over the Russian-German war became more noticeable, the press criticism of the United States subsided from a shout to a murmur.

The main theme was that Germany's war in Russia would be long one, in contrast with previous optimism expressed by the papers at the start of the conflict.

Subject Not Disclosed The subject of Ambassador Grew's frequent talks with Foreign Minister Togo Toyoda was not disclosed, but it occurred while the first American tankers carrying oil to Soviet Russia were passing near Japanese waters and Koyasu.

Premier Prince Fumimaro made a pronouncement of a safety zone around the Japanese islands.

Another possibility significant in Japanese-American relations was the evident lack of U. S. embassy moves toward recovery of the situation.

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Irish Sea Moss Gathering On Coast Revived by War

Settlers, Mass. Sept. 10.—(AP)—The modern moss hunters use the same equipment that grandfathers did—a 12 or 15-foot dory, a pair of oars, a long-handled lobster trap, a jug of fish oil to clear the water, and a crew to carry the water used as a base in moss collection.

A generation ago, Settlers was the rancher moss gathering center of the United States, but owing to cheaper foreign markets, the gathering and the gathering of moss in recent years.

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Try to Settle Tax Changes

Joint Conference Committee Works to Adjust Differences in Bill

Washington, Sept. 10.—(AP)—With "roxy prospects for a speedy agreement," a joint conference committee works to work today to adjust the differences in the House and Senate versions of the budget and defense tax bill.

Although the Senate bill called for \$2,538,000,000 in new revenue—\$287,500,000 more than provided for by the House, leaders in both chambers expressed optimism that the conference would be able to agree on a compromise version by the end of the week.

If the conference needed any additional incentive for quick work there was the fact that the Treasury theoretically is losing an estimated \$2,000,000 a day pending the effectiveness of the new excise laws provided for by the measure.

Only Short Time Needed Chairman George (D., Cal.), of the Senate Finance Committee, who guides the history-making legislation through the Senate, agreed with Chairman Douglas (D., N.C.), of the House Ways and Means Committee that only two or three days would be needed to adjust differences between the two bills.

Douglas sought to help the compromise work along with a statement that he had "partially agreed" to a Senate amendment reducing personal income tax exemptions from \$2,000.

That amendment, however, conceivably might produce considerable discussion for there was talk that some House conferees preferred to have the exemption referred to in the bill set at \$1,750.

Nazis Given False Data

Wireless Reports on Weather Sent to Prevent Plane Flights.

London, Sept. 10.—(AP)—The Canadian-Norwegian-British expedition to Spitzbergen kept up a constant wireless communication with German forces in the Arctic, sending false weather reports and information, and the German forces never discovered the deception today.

Several days after the radio station was destroyed, frantic messages from the Nazis at Tromsø were picked up by wireless men on the expedition's returning warships. The Nazis were trying to find out what had happened yesterday.
