





Declaring that present price trends were favoring the farmers of New England, President Hugh P. Baker of Massachusetts State College said today that steps must be taken to insure adequate feed supplies and to plan further ahead in purchase of farm equipment. In a brief address as chairman of the committee of agriculture and forestry at a meeting of the New England Council, Baker said farmers now had enough information to begin to chart their future course in relation to the rational defense program.
