Reds Assert German Onset at Standstill; Nazis Report Drives

Simultaneous Counter-Offensives Reported in German War Dispatches for First Time; All Three Are Declared to Have Been Repulsed; Take 380,000 Prisoners in Kiev Area.

Berlin, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Simultaneous Russian counter-offensives in the north, central and southern sectors were reported in German war dispatches tonight for the first time, although all three were declared to have been repulsed, with 380,000 prisoners already taken in the encirclement area carved out by German east of Kiev. These captures, announced by high command in a special communique overhauled by the Soviet counter-thrusts as far as Germany was concerned.

According to information released elsewhere by health officials, the only way to combat the growth of the rat population is by frequent fumigation.

Asks Increase Of Park Funds
