Resolution to Repeal Neutrality Offered; Food Nazis' Problem

Hull Advises Senate Foreign Relations Committee Germany Has 'Direct Responsibility' For Feeding People in Nations Armies Have Conquered; Views Given on Sending Food.

Washington, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull advised the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in a letter made public today that Germany has a "direct responsibility" for feeding the people in nations which her armies have conquered. The secretary's views were given in an address prepared for delivery to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in cooperation with Great Britain, for sending American food to "the small democratic countries of Belgium, Norway, Poland, and the Netherlands." The proposal has the active backing of former President Herbert Hoover.

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West Side Landmark Soon to Disappear

Harford Road Building Played Important Part in Business Life of the Town.

The decision of the Rogers Paper Manufacturing Company to demolish the three story brick building on Harford road which they classify as an apartment house, is to remove from Manchester an old landmark that played an important part in the business life of the West Side for over 50 years.

It was in this building that a general store known as Skinner's Store was conducted by A. H. Skinner, who occupied the entire ground floor. The east side of the building was used for the sale of dry goods, groceries, shoes and notions, candy, tobacco as well as glassware, hardware and crockery. On the west side of the ground floor were the storerooms in which were to be found kerosene, molasses and vinegar barrels. In this back room baskets were filled which the seven teams delivered each morning to all parts of the town. In later years bicycles were sold there.

Boys Sold Chestnuts

It was to this store that boys carried their chestnuts in cloth bags to sell. These chestnuts were later taken to Harford. The price paid varied with the weather. Wet days brought down the price as the rain blew down the chestnuts. The clerk who checked the chestnuts always seemed to pile the chestnuts too high in the measure and when a boy said he would not buy about 10 chestnuts it would amount to about 16. He would object, but it made no difference. The boys found a way to overcome this. 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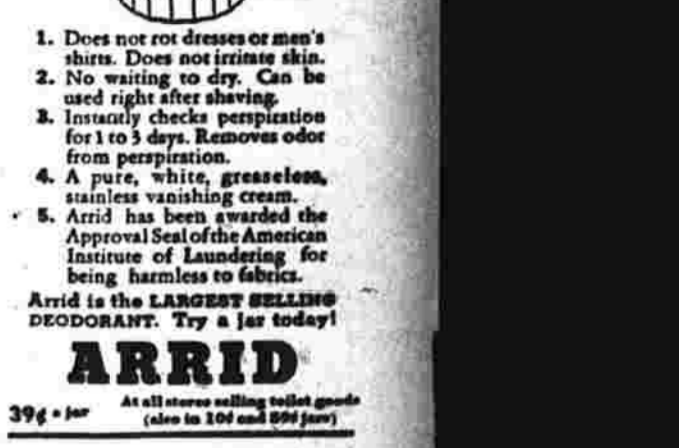

Policy Debate Brings New Pamphlets Era

Thin, Cheap Books Furnish Ammunition for Pros and Cons in Dispute Over Stand.

(Editor's Note: Gen. Charles De Gaulle, leader of the Free French forces, has declared: "The world was made out of ideas—we will remake it from the same material." In this hat of a serious, not a polemic, foreign policy, William Fisher of the Associated Press and The Herald tell how ideas have fired the battle in a revival of old-fashioned pamphleteering.)

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The same still go on—in bookstores, cigar stores, drug stores, and by mail—at prices ranging from 25 cents to a dollar or \$1.50. The books have been argued back and forth in lunchrooms, living rooms and lounges. More important, the arguments have been heard into the thinking of millions of Americans who never have seen the thin volumes.

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For the 60,000 who bought the book, the post-war wife of the "Lone Eagle" portrayed the new signs of an emerging movement caused perhaps by our great material advance at the expense of our moral and spiritual one.

The wave of the future is coming and there is no fighting it, she declared.

By staying out of Europe's war she argued, we should be able to change an old life for a new one without such terrible bloodshed as we see today in the process in Europe.

McLevy Nominated For His Fifth Term

Mayor Jasper McLevy

Bridgeport, Sept. 25.—Mayor Jasper McLevy, Bridgeport's Socialist chief executive for the past eight years, will again be a candidate at the city election on Nov. 5.

McLevy was nominated for his fifth term last night at the Socialist party convention at which the other incumbent city officials were also re-elected. The nominations will be ratified at a primary election next Wednesday night.

The state of candidates: Mayor, Jasper McLevy; city clerk, Fred O. Schwarzkofer; town clerk, Everett N. Perry; city treasurer, John Shumaker; Board of Education, Benjamin A. Tordoff.

The convention adopted a platform which said the Socialist party "stands squarely and proudly" in its support of the city government.

Special Master Named
The press of claims became so great in 1938 a special master and two examiners were named to determine the heirs, their fees and expenses reaching \$85,000 a year. The state appropriates \$20,000 a year for two attorneys to disprove claims and protect interest of the commonwealth which hopes eventually to claim the fortune by escheat.

In the 56 months that would-be heirs have been presenting their claims, only 1,600 have been heard. At the initial price, hearings might go on for 11 years more.

Attorneys say some of the most likely claimants have come from "contaminated" Germany with possibility hearings might have to be held in that country before the money is awarded to anyone.

New Yorkers Will Not Be Affected
Hartford, Sept. 25.—Connecticut's drive to license 20,000 automobiles here now registered in other states will not affect New Yorkers who drive to work in this state.

John T. McCarthy, state motor vehicles commissioner, said yesterday that "until further notice, persons with a bona fide legal residence in New York state, who commute daily from home to work, will not be required to register their cars in Connecticut, provided they have valid New York registrations."

His statement was in reply to Herbert G. New, New York state County (N. Y.) executive, who charged recently that McCarthy apparently was "endeavoring to force residents of New York state, and particularly residents of Westchester County, to license their cars in the state of Connecticut, although they continue to be residents of New York state."

Resume Fight Over Estate

1,100 Descendants of German Called to Present Claims.

Philadelphia, Sept. 25.—One of the largest biggest—if odd—industries headed into its fifth year today with resumption of the fight for the \$20,000,000 Garrett estate.

Summoned to present their claims were 1,100 descendants of Martin Schaefer, a German immigrant who landed on these shores in 1760 and reared nine children.

Since Widow Henrietta Edwards Schaefer Garrett died in obscurity in 1920, leaving \$15,648,642.38 in gilt-edged securities, the scramble for her estate has developed into the largest case of its kind.

More than 500 Philadelphia lawyers and 2,400 others throughout the rest of the world are engaged in representing the interests of the 26,000 claimants who assert, or have been told, they are heirs to the fortune.

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Fire Destroys Railroad Pier

New London Has Worst Blaze Since 1938 Hurricane Conflagration.

New London, Sept. 25.—One of the busiest New London harbor's piers, the New Haven & Hartford Railroad's steamship pier and freight terminal, had disappeared today, reduced to half-submerged wreckage by the city's worst fire since the business district conflagration which raged at the height of the 1938 hurricane.

Sixteen firemen were injured fighting the four-hour blaze, which started late yesterday afternoon and destroyed the pier's structure and timber freight cars, a small freight boat.

The loss was estimated unofficially at \$200,000, and the cause was listed as undetermined, although Chief Thomas H. Shipman attributed it to probable "charismatic" power.

A railroad employe discovered the plank flooring abase near the harbor and at the pier.

The pier was situated in the heart of the commercial waterfront where the marine tempo has been greatly accelerated since the beginning of the defense program.

Submarines glided noiselessly past in the harbor, and from the base and shipyards the Thames river, and destroyers were anchored off shore.

It was feared at first that the fire might extend to the adjacent pier of the War Department, but the absence of strong winds prevented its spread.

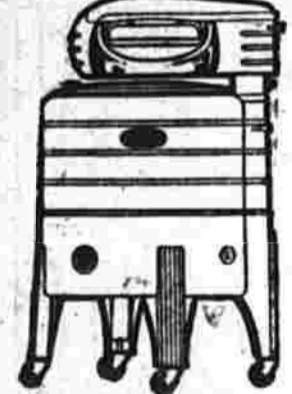

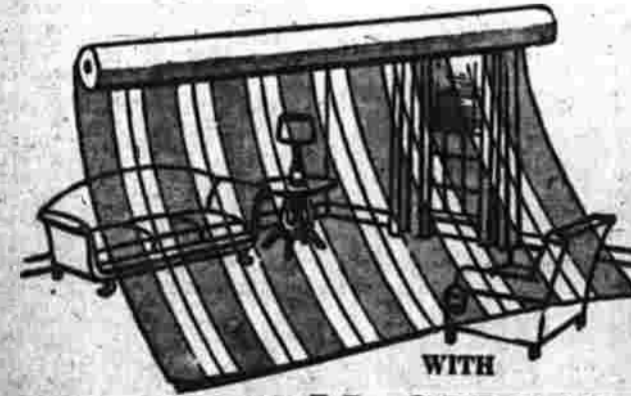
