Russians Crush German Reinforcements Yankies Lead in First Game by 3 to 1

Attempt to Fill Gap Left by Rumanians; Continue Offensive

Operations East of Dnieper River in Ukraine Continue Successfully; German Artillery Shells Important Industrial Facilities in Leningrad; Bombers In Raid on Moscow.

Berlin, Oct. 1.—(P)—The German high command announced today that offensive operations east of the Dnieper river in the Ukraine were continuing successfully. At the other end of the front, however, DNB said German artillery had shelled important industrial facilities in Leningrad yesterday with good effect. The high command said German bombers attacked military installations in Moscow last night.

Captures Russian Batteries In Ukraine, the high command said, an armored division east of Dnieperpetrovsk captured several Russian batteries in a surprise advance while the north another armored division destroyed 45 out of 80 Russian tanks and put the remainder to flight.

German military commentators stated that the Russian battleship October revolution, which has played a vital part in the defense of Leningrad and has been reported the target of German heavy artillery on several different days, again was severely hit yesterday. The Kronstadt Naval base and nearby port of Oranienbaum, west of Leningrad, were said to have borne the brunt of a heavy bombardment by German guns. In the latter port a Soviet cruiser was said to have been hit effectively while a heavy explosion in the port was followed by a big fire.

Demolish 33 Trains German fliers in heavy assaults upon the railway network around Kharkov, principal of the Donets basin, demolished 33 trains filled with Army freight, DNB reported today.

The air raids around Kharkov were renewed, indications that the Nazi airmen were preparing the way for ground troops in that sector, it was said.

The DNB dispatch that told of the raids did not say, however, just where the fighting infantrymen or armored units stood. DNB also reported bayonet fighting along the southern sector.

North German Ports Blasted During Raid

British Bombers Attack Hamburg and Stettin; Leave Many Fires at Docks, Business Areas.

London, Oct. 1.—(P)—British bombers for the second night in succession blasted at the north German ports of Hamburg and Stettin and left many large fires burning among docks and industrial quarters of both cities, the Air Ministry stated today.

The R.A.F. struck also at several strategic points in German-occupied France, and then by daylight today roared out again toward the French Channel ports of Dunkerque and Calais.

Fierce Red Counter-Attacks on Southern Front Result in Loss Of 2,300 Germans; Battles Developing on West and Northwest; 260,000 Axis Soldiers Killed in Long Battles.

Moscow, Oct. 1.—(P)—The Red Army reported today it had crushed two battalions of German reinforcements rushed to a sector of the southern front to replace two shattered Rumanian infantry brigades. In two days, the report said, the Germans lost 2,300 men killed in fierce Red Army counter-attacks on the southern front while battles were developing also in the west and northwest.


The reported German losses were in addition to 260,000 Axis soldiers reported killed in the prolonged battles for Leningrad and Odessa—100,000 Germans at Leningrad and 160,000 Rumanians at Odessa.

Keeps Up Attacks The Army report said Russian infantry which destroyed two Rumanian brigades Sept. 28 kept up its attacks against Germans hurried into the breach and crushed two battalions of the first German Alpine division and destroyed several other units.

The Germans left 1,400 dead near the village of "U" alone, it said, and the Russians seized important war booty. Another instance where the Germanists reformed divisions back into battle against the Red Army was reported by Tass from the central front where, it said, the Germans launched an offensive five days ago in the River "Sv" zone.

Resume Work At Big Auto Plant Today

Workers Return Following Agreement at Dodge Factory; Others Out at Two Plants.

By The Associated Press Production was resumed today at one of three big Detroit motor car plants closed by strikes of a few hundred men.

The Dodge Division of Chrysler Corporation, employing 15,000, resumed production following an agreement between company and officials of the CIO United Automobile workers.

Some 20,000 other auto workers continued idle in the Mack avenue plant of the Briggs Body Company and at Chrysler's Plymouth Division, because of a labor dispute in Briggs frame department.

The Briggs plant was shut down after employees in the frame department refused to work with four men transferred from the door assembly department. A CIO spokesman said the Dodge plant dispute concerned methods of ventilating paint spray booths and drying ovens.

Dodge officials declared about 300 men struck in protest against the laying off of fellow workers.

More than 600 AFL workers at the Plum Brook Army Ordnance Works, near Sandusky, Ohio, went on strike to enforce demands which included pay adjustments.

Capt. H. H. Lewis, of the constructing quartermaster's office at Plum Brook, said that 275 office workers, 250 truck drivers and 105 iron workers were idle.

Piecemeal Neutrality Act Revision Is Seen

Expect Roosevelt Will Ask Only Authority To Arm Ships and Send Them to Canada.

Washington, Oct. 1.—(P)—Indications increased today that President Roosevelt will seek to minimize threatened congressional controversy over his foreign policy program by requesting only piecemeal revision of the neutrality act at this time.

Reliable sources said the president probably would ask only authority to arm American merchant ships and to send them to Canada, ports from which the law now bans them.

Advocate Outright Repeal Several congressional leaders have advocated outright repeal of the act, as suggested by Chairman Connally (D., Tex.), of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee—modifications which would permit not only the arming of the ships but their entry into European belligerent ports to deliver war supplies.

The latter proposal might be expected to provoke lengthy, bitter debate and one administration senator, who asked that he not be quoted by name, said he had advised against it. He felt, he said, that a rising tide of support for the steps the president had taken thus far to aid nations fighting Hitler might be retarded by a full dress controversy in Congress.

There were indications that Senate opposition to the arming of American merchantmen would be much less formidable, so long as that proposal was not linked with a plan to send the ships into embattled European ports.

Way to Handle Insane Felons Will Be Urged

Change in Method to Be Proposed; Creation of New Department for Care to Be Suggested.

Hartford, Oct. 1.—(P)—A revolutionary change in the state's method of handling its 350 or more insane criminals now housed in three hospitals for mental defectives will be proposed at a meeting of institutional heads with Governor Hurley next month.

Creation of a new state department for the insane criminals to be connected with a penal institution, most likely the state prison at Wethersfield, will be suggested at this meeting to be called by Warden Ralph R. Walker of the prison.

Strong backing for the plan came today from Superintendent William A. Bryan of the Norwich State hospital, where about 35 insane criminals are housed, and Roy L. Leck of the Connecticut State hospital at Middletown, where about 300 of these inmates live in a separate, heavily-guarded building.

Berlin, Oct. 1.—(P)—German retaliation for Czech attempts to throw off Nazi rule has cost 88 lives in three days, 58 of them yesterday, the third anniversary of the Munich agreement which began the partition of Czechoslovakia, it was reported today.

Six persons were reported executed Sunday and 24 were shot by firing squads Monday.

It was announced that the 58 persons executed yesterday included Karl Capek, a retired colonel of the German Army. Among others were said to have been Prof. Wladimir Grech, of the Czech University, and a physician, Dr. Jozef Yillik.

There were indications that the withdrawal already had begun, for Clark Lee, Associated Press reporter who flew over Changsha in a Japanese Army plane yesterday, saw Japanese columns moving northward from the city, which the Japanese said they captured last Saturday.

Previously the Japanese had announced their withdrawal from Chuchow, strategic railway junction 30 miles south of Changsha, asserting their thrust there had accomplished its purpose.

Commons Votes Credit To Pay Costs of War

Running to \$44,000,000 Daily; 50 Per Cent Higher Than Last War

London, Oct. 1.—(P)—The House of Commons today voted a new war credit of \$1,000,000,000—about \$4,000,000,000—asked by Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir Kingsley Wood to meet the rising costs of the war. British war expenditures now are running to \$11,000,000,000 (\$44,000,000,000) per day, the chancellor said.

The current expenditures are more than 50 per cent higher than during the peak of the World War, when they ran only \$7,000,000,000 per day.

855,000,000 Daily Cost With two billions already authorized for war purposes alone, in this fiscal year beginning April 1, Wood said the total government expenditures now were \$18,000,000,000 (\$72,000,000,000) daily compared with \$8,000,000,000 at the peak of the World War.

Subs Torpedo Two Vessels

Italians Report Attack On British Ships on Way Back to Gibraltar.

Rome, Oct. 1.—(P)—Italian submarines torpedoed at least two ships in an attack on British vessels on their way to Gibraltar after battling with Italian torpedo planes last week-end, the Italian high command said today.

Five Italian submarines with certainly scored torpedo hits on two enemy units, a communiqué declared.

(Italians said three British merchant ships were sunk and a number of warships including the battleship Nelson were damaged in an attack on the east-bound convoy Saturday. The British acknowledged a torpedo hit on the Nelson and sinking of one merchant ship in an otherwise successful passage through the Mediterranean from Gibraltar.)

Safety Record Is Claimed For Fast Super-Highway

For Fast Super-Highway

Harrisburg, Pa., Oct. 1.—(P)—Pennsylvania's \$70,000,000 super-highway piercing the hazardous Alleghenies between Harrisburg and Pittsburgh earned nearly \$3,000,000 in its first year of operation and set up what an administrative commission claims as a safety record comparing favorably with that of any highway in the country.

Since the four-lane express route opened a year ago today, five million motorists traversed all or part of its 164 miles of gently-graded, divided concrete. A total of 2,550,000 vehicles traveled 300,000,000 miles on the toll road which passes through seven tunnels and has a maximum grade of three per cent.

Eleven stations located at the only exits and entrances collect a penny a mile from passenger cars making less than the whole trip or \$1.50 from the driver going the full distance. Trucks pay \$3.50 to \$10, depending on weight.

Because of Brazil's strategically important proximity to Dakar on the African coast, the agreement was deemed the most important signed so far with any Latin-American country.

Churchill conceded that, even while involved in Russia, Hitler has the power to strike toward the Nile, or through Spain to northwest Africa, or even to attempt invasion of England. From building the British army up to the point where it is equipped for offensive action on a large scale, the present production effort of both Britain and the United States must be regarded as insufficient for the task of keeping Russia in the field, provided some supply line to Russia remains open. Putting it bluntly, Mr. Churchill states that "sacrifices of a most serious kind and a most extreme effort will have to be made by the British people, and enormous new installations of conversions from the existing plant will have to be set up in the United States."

In other words, if Britain and the United States are going to assume responsibility for equipping the Russian army, they must be prepared to do date merely child's play. Mr. Churchill might have added other arguments to his rejection of the suggestion for British invasion of the continent. He might have said, for instance, that while the Nazis were planning their own crossing of the Channel a year ago, their great effort was the construction of a bridge over the English Channel, against any future British attack.
