## Soviets Recapture Karelian Isthmus Railroad Junction

City Described as One of Decisive Sectors on Leningrad Front; 600 Finns Killed; Artillery and Tanks Play Important Role in Fight.

Berlin, Oct. 4.—(AP)—German scouts reported from the southern front today that the Russians were hastily organizing their last ounce of reserve strength in that area. Authorized sources said the intensive Red Army activity discovered by air reconnaissance and ground patrols presumably was a Russian counter-measure to the large-scale German operations announced yesterday by Adolf Hitler and repeated in the high command communiqué today.

Moscow, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Front line Russian dispatches said today that the Red Army had recaptured the city and railroad junction of "B" on the Karelian isthmus, described as one of the decisive sectors of the Leningrad front. The report, published in the government newspaper Izvestia, said more than 600 Finns were killed in the battle in which Red Army artillery and tanks were credited with an important role. The identity of the city was not given.

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Oct. 4.—(AP)—With national defense requiring 30 per cent of the paper production, Norbert A. McKenna, OPM official, said today that the paper industry would have 21 1/2 million tons of paper in the next year to do the job which previously only the prodigal use of 2 1/2 million tons could accomplish.

McKenna, chief of the Pulp, Paper, Printing and Publishing Branch of the Office of Production Management, said in an address prepared for a meeting of the Printers National Association, that his office was dedicated to the maintenance of the 800,000 jobs and 60,000 proprietors of the industry "depending on the efficient production and conservative use of paper so long as it is possible to do so consistent with meeting defense needs."

British Planes Cause Damage At Rotterdam  
Large Formation Bombs Dutch Port City During Night; 60 Persons Killed, 300 Wounded.

Berlin, Oct. 4.—(AP)—A large formation of British warplanes bombed Rotterdam in the German-occupied Netherlands during the night, killing more than 60 persons and wounding approximately 300, DNB declared today.

The news agency said the raiders did considerable damage to residential buildings of the city, destroyed several apartment houses and two churches. A Dutch hospital ship in the harbor was reported sunk.

Berlin, Oct. 4.—(AP)—German sources reported today that a number of new executions of persons convicted of plotting against Germany had taken place while the British radio said that in nearby Poland 180 persons, including 12 women, had been executed openly in the past three months, but "vervetheles, sabotage continues."

The secretary made the unusual gesture of permitting correspondents to quote him in declaring that sinking of the oil tanker "seems to be another act of lawlessness, piracy, and attempted frightfulness in connection with the general movement to drive people off the Atlantic ocean, which is part of the world movement of conquest."

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
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

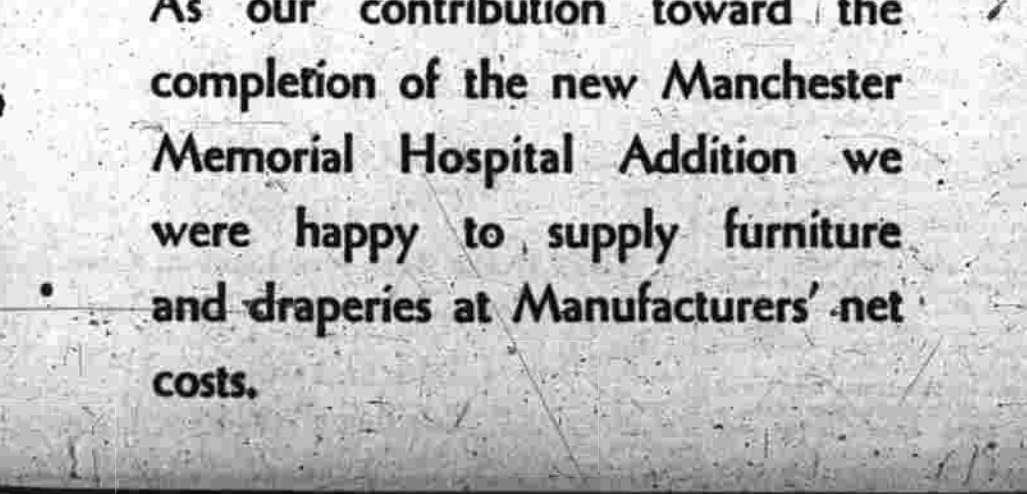

And on Some of Manchester's Side Streets, Too

Parking meters are mentioned in many a conversation along Main street these days. A group of business men were discussing the meters a few days ago and they were talking about the remarks made at the Selectmen's meeting Monday night relative to "high pressure" salesmen.

It seems that when Mac-puts on one of these drives he gets real tough from the sponsoring agency. We've heard figures mentioned as his salary for this one job of from \$800 to \$700.

We haven't heard how Norwich is taking to the re-organization, but from last reports there was a good opportunity to overhaul the Chamber in that city. There were only 90 members in the C. of C. and it was said to be doing a dive. Upon Mac's return to his local desk he might look into a criticism we heard on Main street this past week. It has been said in some circles that the Wednesday afternoon stores schedule bogey could have been avoided this year if the Chamber had acted at times.

Only one organization in this vicinity objected to the decision on a group of stores opening Wednesday afternoons. That was the Rockville Civic Association. Copies of the correspondence between the store's main office and the Rockville merchant group were forwarded to the local Chamber for whatever use it could be put to, but it seems the matter was not acted upon until too late.

He couldn't very well have two different designs of paper in the principal room in his house. So he tried to get matching wallpaper to finish his job. But he couldn't get it. It was an odd design and all out of print. He spent as much on gasoline traveling to different wallpaper stores in the state as he could have possibly saved on doing the job himself. Instead of having himself something on the job, he finds himself well "in the red."

Regardless of the results of the vote Monday night on whether or not we shall have parking meters in certain Manchester streets, it is certain Manchester will still have a parking problem. We don't think the townspeople will take to parking meters if they are voted, and judging from reaction in Hartford the meters won't attract business from neighboring communities.

Parking in Manchester, most people we've talked to agree, calls for more space for storing automobiles, whether for a half hour, three hours or all day.

Ed Holl, who established himself in Manchester by "cutting the curb to suit your taste," has been making a personal survey. He says that in order to get the proper perspective visualize how much space 200 automobiles parked along the length of Main street on one side will just about accommodate 200 automobiles. That's not much area to provide for customers, prospective customers and store owners and clerks who insist upon keeping their cars on the street.

Ed Holl's suggestion is that the town make use of the area above the so-called dry brook. He believes that by utilizing this space 200 automobiles can be accommodated. It's something to think about, and certainly, some other attempt should be made to solve the parking problem before those pesky meters are installed.
