## Foes Plan Waging Fight on Changes In Neutrality Act

### Opponents of Revision Decide to Wage Fight on Request for Authority to Arm Shipping; Big Objective to Retain Combat Zone Ban.

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Congressional opponents of neutrality law revision decided today they would have to wage an all-out fight against President Roosevelt's request for authority to arm shipping, even though some in their ranks were not dead set against the idea of putting guns on merchantmen. The big objective was to preserve the law's existing provisions prohibiting American-flag merchantmen from operating in combat zones or voyaging to belligerent ports.

However, he said, many opposition legislators had come to the conclusion that unless a substantial vote could be mustered against the ship arming proposal in the House, administration forces in the Senate were likely to seek more sweeping changes which would end the curb on ship movements.

There are some who believe that the arming of ships might not be so bad in itself, Taft told reporters, "but when it is linked with the proposal to send these vessels to the war zone, the whole question must be considered."

May Reverse Position In the same vein, Representative Fah (R-N.Y.), ranking minority member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said he would reverse his previous decision to support the armed ship proposal if it became apparent that the House would act in a way which would be a part of an administration plot to get rid of the combat zone provisions in the neutrality law.

In that case, he declared, "I will be against the whole act."

President Roosevelt told Congress yesterday, in specifically requesting repeal of the ban on arming merchantmen, that the House would carry out the "true intent of the neutrality act by making it possible for the United States to deliver the articles to those who are in a position to use them."

"In other words," he went on, "I ask for congressional action to implement congressional policy."

Should Pander Other Changes This meant, the president said, that Congress ought to give "earnest and hearty attention" to other major revisions of the neutrality law so that this country would cease giving the definite assist-

ment which it has been giving to the Axis powers.

## Army Serious About System For Warnings

### Four 'Filter Centers' in Operations as Permanent as England's for Receipt of Reports.

New York, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Army is pretty serious about establishing an air raid warning system in the United States—so serious, in fact, that today it had in operation four "filter centers" as permanent as England's, for the receipt and evaluation of reports from observers.

Those centers, plus two temporary ones, were being employed in the week-long air raid warning network exercise, now in its second day in the northeastern states.

This was emphasized when Army officials announced that the test would continue today despite rain and low ceilings in some areas. From the information which accumulates gradually on the operations room, map decisions are made on the dispatch of intercepting fighters to meet invading bombers.

That, in essence, is the way the system works. The warning net is lightened up by radiolocator, automatic devices which report the presence of airplanes.

## Unions' Row Threatens Tank Output Stoppage

### Dispute Involves Toledo Company and Subsidiary; May Have to Halt Work in Week.

By The Associated Press Stoppage of the Army's tank production was said by War Department officials today to be threatened by a CIO-AFL jurisdictional dispute involving the Spicer Manufacturing Company at Toledo, Ohio, and its subsidiary, the Hilldale (Mich.) Steel Products Company.

The Spicer Company makes 70 per cent of the transmissions for all the Army's tanks and also for most of the half-tractor and "jeep" combat vehicles.

Officials at Washington said the trouble started at Hilldale with a jurisdictional dispute between the AFL and CIO automobile workers. The AFL union won the National Labor Relations Board bargaining election but owing to a court injunction, the plant was closed temporarily this week by request of local officials.

The matter reached a climax when CIO, United Automobile Workers who have a contract with Spicer, decreed that they would not handle parts from Hilldale the concern, where the AFL is the authorized bargaining agency.

## Sweep Through Gap Seen Like Torrent; Concede Nazi Gains

### Immense Forces in New Surge Toward Moscow From Vicinity of Bryansk; Advances Being Made Over Mountains Of German Corpses; Invaders Reported as Stalled North of Orel.

Moscow, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Red Army conceded today that the Germans are advancing at several places with immense forces in a new surge toward Moscow from the vicinity of Bryansk but declared the gains were being made "over mountains of German corpses."

North of Orel, however, the Army news said the invaders were stalled. A Nazi plan to encircle Marshal Semyon Timoshenko's armies on the central sector had collapsed.

Russians Heavily Outnumbered At Bryansk, it said, the Russians were heavily outnumbered by the Germans but through mighty reinforcements into the battle.

At one point, it said, one Soviet unit was facing two German Tank divisions and two motorized infantry divisions; at another, three German infantry divisions and 100 tanks were pitted against a single Red Army unit in a day-long battle.

Nevertheless, front line dispatches said, the new German thrust came only after a first onslaught had been routed.

The Red Air Force was said to be hitting hard to break up the German advance. Two squadrons of fighters and a bomber group were credited with destroying 100 German tanks, 100 trucks and 300 trucks—180 of them loaded with troops—in three days.

## British Fliers Attack Ships

### Weather Unfavorable Generally Confines Operations to Bombing Operations.

London, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Weather continued generally unfavorable for bombing operations, the government said today, but British bombers last night nevertheless attacked shipping and other objectives at Aachen, on the west coast of Norway.

Details were being sought by a single plane last night which dropped bombs on one place on the north-west coast of England.

A few hours were damaged and a very small number of people sustained slight injuries, it was announced.

The Air Ministry News Service said tanks, supply ships and armed trawlers in the North Sea were attacked during the night.

Bombing by bright moonlight, some of the attacking planes dived within 300 feet of the targets, the news service reported.

One Capture Costly Maj. Gen. B. C. Freyberg, commander of the Allied forces at Greece during the fighting on that island, declared today his capture cost the Germans 17,000 casualties out of an attacking force of 35,000.

He reported officially that the Germans lost 4,000 killed, 2,000 wounded and 1,000 captured.
