City Living Effects Hit

'Subversive' Influence On Society as People Act Like Turtles.

Chicago—(AP)—The anti-social effects of city living is beginning to drive people farther and farther away from the big centers of population.

Dr. Ernest W. Burgess of the University of Chicago declared recently the effect of living too close together is a "subversive" influence on society because people act like turtles, draw their heads up in their shells, become anti-social and adopt a cynical attitude toward their neighbors and life in general.

Environment undermines spirit. "The more people there are, the more the individual's sense of responsibility is undermined," he said.

As a result of adopting such deadpan expressions the city leaves their "before of getting a husband and the man who adopt a more cheerful attitude toward life, thoughtfulness and equality unattractive to the girl."

Such cynicism and withdrawal from society, he asserted, are subversive because they undermine and destroy the fabric of social relations which make up society.
