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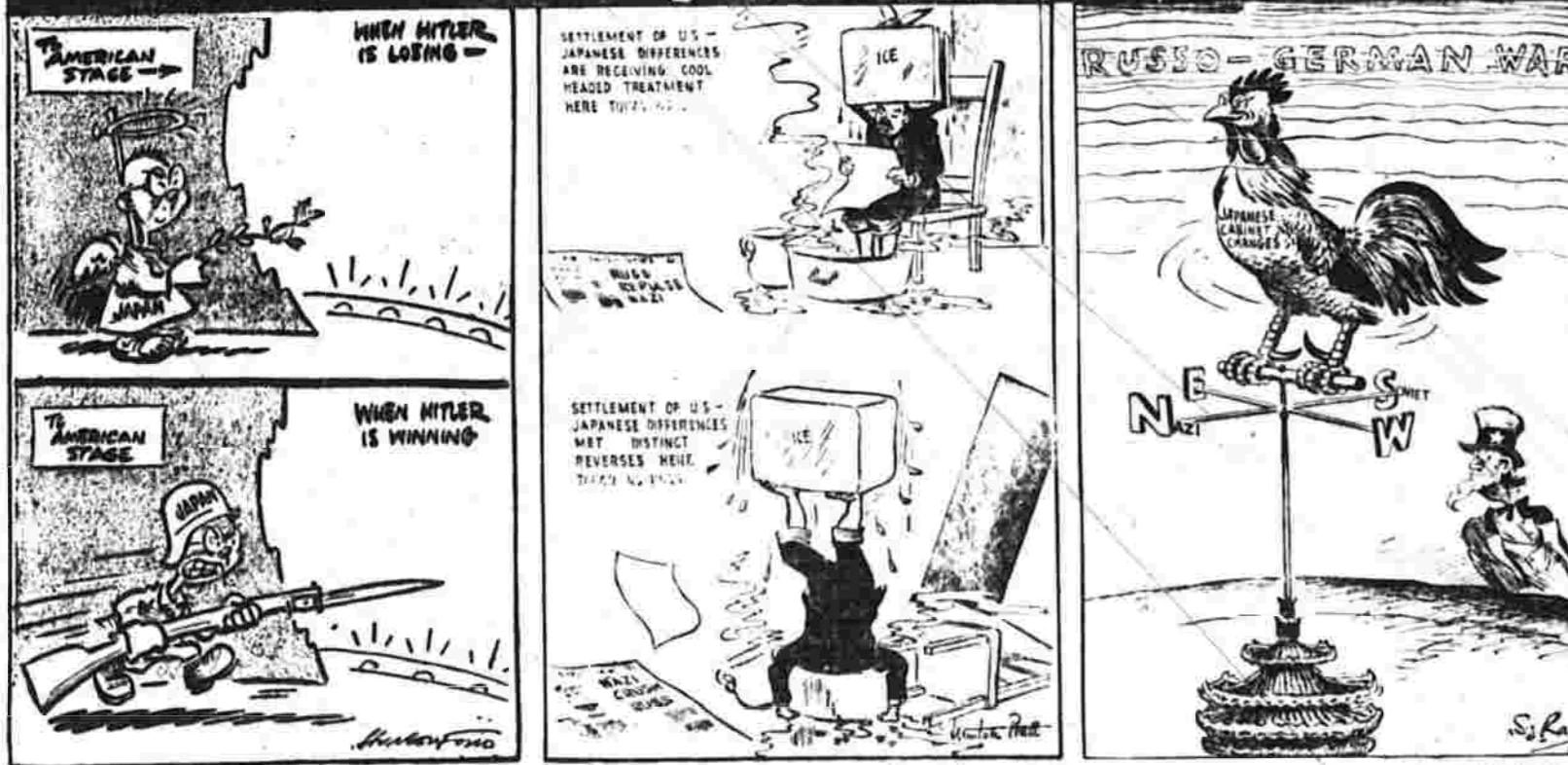

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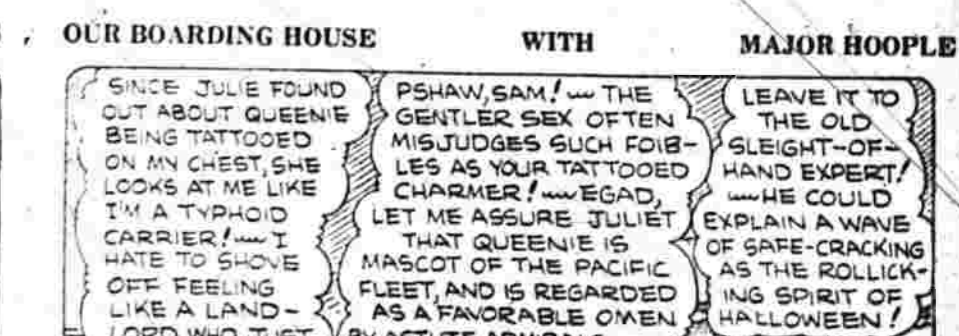

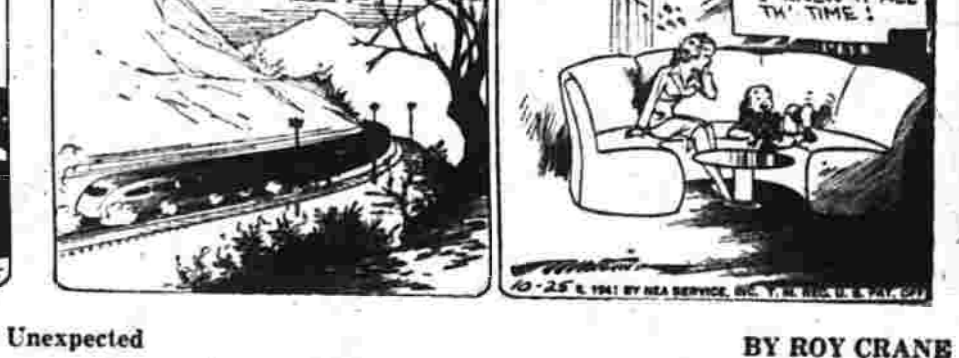

We heard a remark on the other day about how rapidly times and conditions have changed. Lending an ear to the interesting story. The gist was in the effect that just a couple of years ago the young lads and lasses of town had to be content with a pretty bum-drum type of amusement. The girls had their dates, but the boys didn't have cars, and worse, the boys friends had few if any checks to spend. A movie now and then, maybe a dance a stroll when weather allowed and home. That constituted what the average young couple could afford.

But from the story we overheard times have changed and seemingly overnight. Two couples who have been keeping company together the last year or so really went in for entertainment two weeks ago today. The boy friends are making good money in a defense industry and they decided to see what they could do in a day. A third couple joined them when their plans became known.

They took in the Yale-Penn football game, went to dinner at the Hotel, and then to a real good musical show that was Broadway bound and they had good seats, too, and then to top it off they enjoyed a midnight cruise on the Sound. They returned New Haven for home at 3 a. m. party was telling the story, or overheard and he remarked that the afternoon and evening had cost him \$34 not counting his share of the operation of the car.

Imagine how the spooning couples of 1922-1937 would have enjoyed that party!

Discussing the abandonment of the two paper mills on Charter street and Hartford road we heard an old timer remark that except for a reversal of circumstances and an unwillingness on the part of some Manchester people to put up necessary cash that might have been a real big industry. Not that such a condition is preferable to the "City of Village Charm," but it makes interesting conjecture.

The present Bus Ami plant on Hilliard street was the site of the first manufacture in this country of electric motors for industrial purposes. The Mather Electric Company manufactured Professor Anthony's development of the motor, and since electric power was in its infancy the north end of the town might well have been the present Schenectady. But time reverses, and as aptly if local moneyed men had been willing to back the venture the plant would have remained in town.

We heard a somewhat belated but nevertheless good story that came out of that four-and-a-half hour town meeting held three weeks ago Monday. Seems that a local clergyman attended the session. Being a dutiful clergyman he had told his wife where he "planned to be the party part of the evening. He hadn't expected a midnight session of course.

As the clock started into the new hours the pastor's wife began to worry. Surely, she thought, no town meeting could be lasting so long. She worried so much that she called the police station, and reported that her husband had not yet arrived home, and he was only going to a town meeting.

The policeman on the desk received her version when she told her that the town meeting had just concluded and that her husband ought to be home shortly. If the clergyman had been a stout poker player just think all the worry he would have saved his wife!

He wouldn't have been expected home until midnight. The Herald's management has often wondered if it really paid to devote two-and-a-half to four columns a month to printing the list of town bills ordered paid by the Selectmen. These bills are printed at no charge to the town—merely as a service to the taxpayers.

Our doubts as to the value of publication of the bills were somewhat dispelled when a prominent resident hailed us the other day and asked what we thought of some of the expenditures of the list of bills disclosed. His particular peeve was over the amounts paid some workers at the local Primaries and Election.

That list of bills is worth examining. Look at some of the amounts paid to some of the workers at the polls and then you can realize why it costs about a dollar a vote for the town to stage an election. There are many other interesting items among the bills. They were printed in this last Tuesday's Herald.

After listening to the reader who queried us about the election items we rubbed right back to the office to plead that publication of the town bills each month be continued. We were informed they would be.

There's money in them that parking spaces. If you can believe what a former manager of one told us the other day. Why some of the town's business men want parking meters when they could turn their back yards into profit is more than we can understand. Last week the lot at the corner

Returned Missionary To Describe His Experiences in China.

Rev. Geoffrey W. Royall of Toronto, Canada, who has recently returned from the interior of Occupied China, will be the guest speaker at the local church of the Nazarene on Sunday at 7:30 p. m. During his address the Rev. Mr.

Royall will show among other things a splinter of the incendiary incendiary bomb which destroyed his church at the outbreak of the current hostilities in the Far East.

Rev. Mr. Royall is one of the few occidentals to compose Chinese poetry and pen Chinese scrolls. During the last term of service in North China, he has been in more than one hundred towns and contacts with the Japanese, Chinese and Red Communist armies.

He is the author of "Missionary in the Middle Kingdom" and "Thinking Yellow." Included in Rev. Royall's repertoire is a record of whistling. He has whistled in six countries, more than fifty times over the radio and in over two hundred towns and cities in Alberta.
