## Connally Asserts U. S. Must Claim Rights on Oceans

**Says American Merchant Vessels Being Sunk by Brutal and Murderous Doctrine of Unrestricted Sub Warfare in Urging Neutrality Shift**

Washington, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Saying that American merchant vessels "are being sunk by the brutal and murderous doctrine of unrestricted submarine warfare," Senator Connally (D., Tex.), told the Senate today that "as a proud nation, the United States must claim its rights on the seas."

Before crowded galleries, the chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee opened debate on legislation granting American merchant vessels the right to carry arms and to sail to any port in the world ship arising now is forbidden by the neutrality law, which also prevents American merchantmen from entering belligerent ports or combat areas.

Democratic leaders who accused the neutrality measure with President Roosevelt this morning repeated they have held the conviction that the bill probably would be passed in less than two weeks.

"This resolution is a defense measure, not a war measure," Connally told his colleagues. "The stronger we are, the less chance there will be for a successful attack being made against us. We will increase our strength by protecting our shipping from attack on the high seas and by delivering defense material to those countries now fighting aggression."

"When America's earnest endeavors to contribute to general peace among nations have been rejected by the aggressor nations, the United States, with its great traditions and its historic devotion to the principles of freedom and constitutional government, should reassert and restore its rights as a sovereign nation."

Refuse Undeniable Rights

Connally's bill no longer submit to the dictates of Hitler and the Axis powers retaining their unassailable rights under international law.

"We should no longer submit to the exercise of these rights by the course which treats that our ships will be sunk."

"They are already being sunk. They are being sunk beyond compensation. They are being sunk by the brutal and murderous doctrine of unrestricted submarine warfare. It represents the sublimated murder, the sublimated doctrine of force against law—human, divine, national and international."

## Navy Day Talk By Roosevelt Set Tonight

**Speech Expected to Be Of Paramount Importance in Foreign Affairs, National Defense**

Washington, Oct. 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt made no engagements except the usual Monday conference with legislative leaders today so he could finish his speech for tonight's Navy Day dinner—a speech expected to be of paramount importance in the field of international affairs and national defense.

The entire nation joined the Navy today in observance of the day set aside to honor the ships and men of the fleet. Vessels in port donned the full dress of signal pennants but for those churning the Atlantic and Pacific swells it was battle dress as usual.

Points to Be Stressed

Mr. Roosevelt, in his first talk on international affairs in six weeks, is expected to stress not only how the war in Europe currently affects America but also such defense strikes. It also will mention domestic problems specifically the strike in coal mines and companies turning out defense articles.

The speech also may discuss the progress of the Navy in keeping Atlantic sea lanes clear of danger. It will be delivered shortly after 10 p. m. and will be broadcast over all major radio stations.

Mr. Roosevelt's last major speech was on Sept. 11, when, after relating a series of searair incidents including the attack on the destroyer Greer, he called Nazi U-boats and raiders "rattlesnakes."

## Kidnap Couple Held for Trial

**Plead Innocent in Bay State Court; Infant Found with Them.**

Fitchburg, Mass., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Arraigned on charges of kidnaping an eight-week-old baby from his carriage, a Lumburg couple today pleaded innocent in District Court, and were held in bail of \$20,000 each for a formal hearing next Monday.

The pair, Richard Wolowicz, 36, and Ruth Warren, 37, faced the court separately and were ordered committed to the county jail at Worcester, pending hearing, in lieu of bail.

More than 200 persons overflowed the courtroom when Wolowicz was led into the prisoner's lock. In less than five minutes the court action was completed and he was taken back to the lockup.

In Given Charge

Hatless and wearing the same black coat in which she was garbed upon her arrest Saturday, Miss Warren replied "not guilty" when the legal charge of kidnaping was read to her. When Judge A. Z. Goodfellow asked if she had a lawyer, Miss Warren shook her head and the court assigned Paul J. Geenan, who appeared for Wolowicz, to represent her.

Miss Warren was visibly perturbed when a baby, seated in his mother's lap in the audience, began to cry during the arraignment. The defendant calmed down immediately after police searched the mother and child from the courtroom.

Had Lived Together

Judge Chief Thomas J. Godley told the court that although Wolowicz and Warren were not married, they had been living together as man and wife for several months in nearby Lumburg. They pleaded guilty to a moral charge filed against them today.

## To Determine Overtime Pay Rate Dispute

**Supreme Court Agrees To Review Far-Reaching Litigation on Proper Method Under Law.**

Washington, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The Supreme court agreed today to review far-reaching litigation to determine the proper method of computing overtime pay under the wage-hour act.

The Wage-Hour Administration was granted a review of a Circuit court decision holding that the Dallas News was within its rights in computing overtime paid its employees on the basis of an agreed wage which was above the required minimum pay.

Pose in Conference Room

## Fifteen Dead As Bus Burns

**Seven Others Burned, Two Seriously Injured—Car Strikes Railroad.**

Clanton, Ala., Oct. 27.—(AP)—A gasoline explosion which sent flames spraying over a crowded Montgomery-Birmingham passenger bus was blamed today for the deaths of at least 15 persons, most of them burned beyond recognition.

Seven others are in a Clanton hospital, two with critical burns. Parrish Auttman, Birmingham, the driver, died of his burns early today.

Coroner J. Mel Martin said three other dead have been tentatively identified as William D. Davis, Troy, Altona Renfro, Banks and Alton B. Yates, Union Springs. All were youths from South Alabama enroute to a Civilian Conservation Corp camp here.

Was Made Of Flames

The bus struck the concrete railing of a bridge four miles south of Clanton, Ala., where it was carrying a mass of flames, the blaze being visible for three miles or more.

Hardie Jones, carpenter who lives 100 yards from the scene, ran out to see Auttman, the driver, who was dragged a short distance from the bus, dragging a man by the arm.

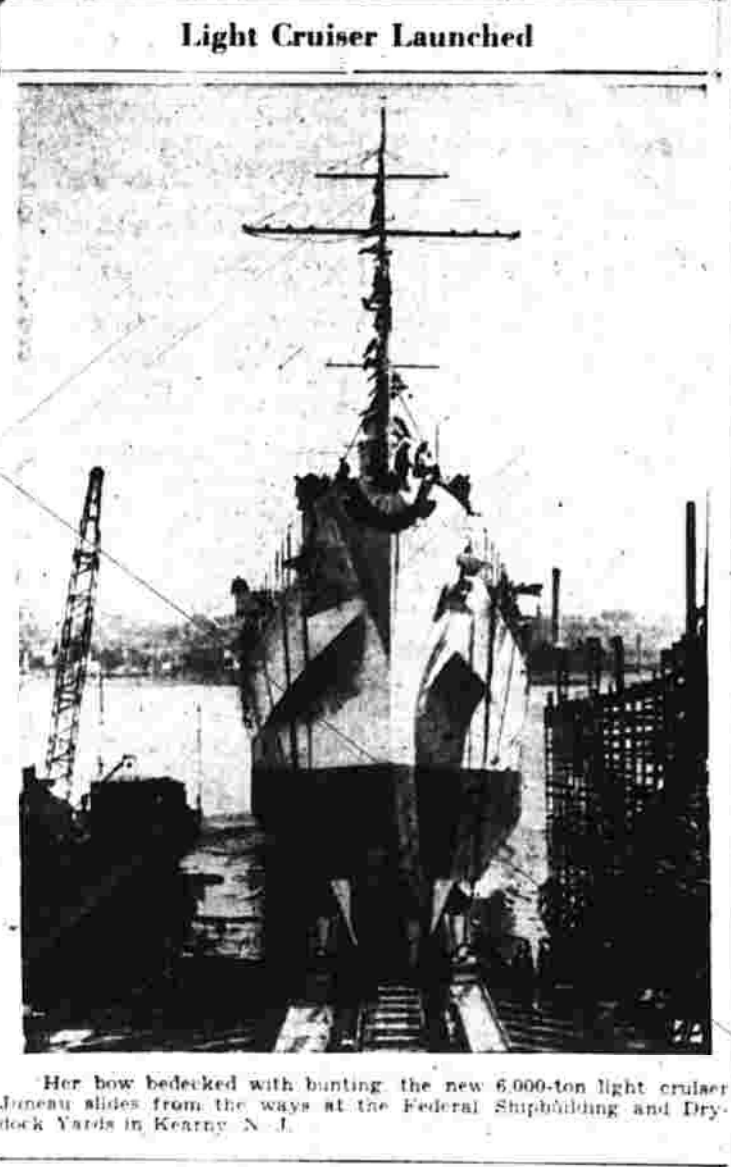

## Reds Retake Village In Counter-Attack; Give Italians Credit

Berlin, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The Germans credited their Italian allies with "frustrating heavy Russian counter-attacks on the German advance in the Donets basin today, and it appeared that Rostov, Black Sea port on the Don river was the next immediate objective of the German Army. While the stage of Leningrad and the drive to encircle Moscow continued, foreign correspondents were handed press material on Rostov just as last week they were handed news about Kharkov, which the Germans announced taking a few days later.
