So today, the farmer who survived the depression and drought that began in the '20s and ran through much of the '30s, is not getting rich on a few months of ising prices. Mark this, we are talking about the "D.D." farmerdepression, drought. Fifty per cent of the farms in Minnesota haven't mortgage on them; for those farmers, these are really nice times, but for the other 50 per cent and the figure is higher in North Dakota -it's a long, long road ahead to a good bank ac-A Quick Close-Up

Here is a quick closeup of where many stand: They owe the land bank; they probably have chattel mortgages on their equipment; a lot of them have open notes negotiated before they fled to the land bank for help. Besides, they are on farms seriousy in need of rehabilitation of land, equipment, buildings and livestoch -to say nothing of personal needs of clothing and the like. About this time, Peck will say
