TUST after the World War farmers were in clover. Farming had fallen off terrifically in Europe, and the U.S. had to fill the world crop shortage. Wheat zoomed to an average farm price of \$2.34 a bushel, cotton to 36c a pound, eef cattle to \$8.99 a 100 pounds, hogs to \$13.36.

In the early '20s, with Europe back in production, there was no more need for supercharged American farming. Prices flopped. They recovered somewhat during the roaring late '20s, then collapsed en-tirely with the depression. Wheat skidded to 32c a bushel, cotton to

skidded to 32c a bushel, cotton to 5.5c a pound, cattle to \$3.28 per 100 pounds, hogs to \$2.68. But the things the farmer had to buy didn't go down so fast or so far as crops. If they had, the farmer wouldn't have-been so bad off. As it was, he was much worse off. The Asriculture Department.
