

## Dutch and Australian Ministers Consulted; Diet Member Resigns

Speech Banned for Publication But Declared 'Improper' for This Session' Leads to Resignation and Creates Sensation in Extraordinary Session of Japanese Parliament.

Tokyo, Nov. 19.—(AP)—A Diet member's speech which was banned for publication but declared "improper" for this session led today to the member's resignation and created a sensation in the extraordinary session of Japan's Parliament. No hint of the speech's contents was permitted to reach the public. The member, named Miyazawa, was turned over to the disciplinary committee of the House of Representatives and his resignation shortly thereafter was accepted by a unanimous vote of the House.

However, 19 other members resigned from the "throne rule assistance group" of the House, apparently in sympathy with Miyazawa.

Parts of this dispatch apparently were delayed or deleted. Perhaps by censor, leaving the meaning of the incident obscure. It was left to conjecture whether Miyazawa had criticized the government's foreign policy or violated some points of the accepted code of parliamentary conduct. All published speeches in the current Diet session have been approved by the government's ministerial stand against the United States, Great Britain and the Axis.

The Washington question of Special Envoy Saburo Kurusu continues to overshadow other world developments in Japanese eyes, with the press giving great prominence to detailed accounts of yesterday's meeting of nearly three hours between Kurusu and Ambassador Nomura and Secretary Hull.

May Make Further Statement

The possibility was discussed that Premier Gen. Hideki Tojo or Foreign Minister Shigenori Togo might make a further statement to the Diet. If Washington developments are justified before the session's end, now set for tomorrow.

Informed observers said the legislative program, largely devoted to voting new war funds, should be concluded early tomorrow, leaving time for ministerial statement if it was found desirable.

## Admits Posing During Holdup

Quint Reiterates He and Two Others Planned New Haven Robbery.

New Haven, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Alfred Quint, 30, reiterated under cross-examination today that he planned a \$2,017 robbery with two men on trial in Superior court and posed as a victim during the hold-up.

Giving testimony much the same as when he took the stand for the state yesterday, Quint asserted that he told the men that the Case Clothes Company where he was employed was a natural for a holdup.

The trial of Steven Marcenivich, 31, alias Steve Mercer, and Edward Donnelly, Jr., 30, charged with conspiracy, started before Judge John H. King yesterday afternoon with Quint the state's principal witness.

Quint, who has pleaded guilty to conspiracy, was one of three employees of the Case Clothes Company who were held up on Saturday night, Oct. 25, as they walked toward a bank with the day's receipts.

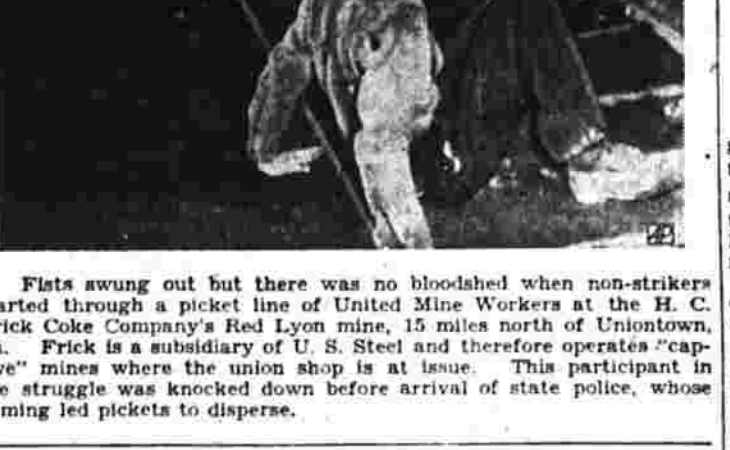
Drove Past In Auto

Quint swore that he met Donnelly and Mercer on Oct. 1 when he told them the Case job was a "good setup" and on two occasions later, the last only a few hours before the holdup when the three drove past the Case plant in an automobile and he pointed out the door which he said the employees would use as they left the building on their way to the bank.

Between Oct. 1 and the night of the holdup, Quint testified, he got a job at the Case company, where he was worked on previous occasions, and he accompanied Frederick Francis and Herbert Leach, fellow employees on their way to the bank, but ran away when Mercer and Donnelly accosted them. The gunman who held up the trio were made known to Quint said Donnelly and Mercer gave him \$350 for his part in the robbery.

## Trapped Nazi Troops Suffer Heavy Defeat

Unit Caught in Pocket Loses Thousands of Men, 13 Tanks, 237 Lorries and Many Guns

London, Nov. 19.—(AP)—A Tass dispatch from Moscow today said German troops trapped in a pocket near Novocherkassk suffered a heavy defeat and the loss of thousands of men, 13 tanks and many guns.

Novocherkassk is 25 miles northeast of Rostov in the southern front and one of the key points in the defense of the Caucasus.

## Calls Upon Steel Company and Union Executives to Maintain Status Quo on Issue of 'Closed Shop' for Period of Emergency Or Submit Differences to Arbitration.

Washington, Nov. 19.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, declaring that work in captive coal mines must recommence, called upon steel company and union executives today to maintain a status quo on the issue of a "closed shop" for the period of the national emergency or to submit their differences to arbitration, agreeing to accept in advance any decision rendered.

The chief executive laid his alternatives before John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers; Benjamin Patison, president of United States Steel; Eugene Grace, president of Bethlehem Steel, and Frank Furness, president of Youngstown Sheet and Tube, in identical letters.

"For the common good, for the maintenance of the national production," Mr. Roosevelt wrote, "it is imperative that one of these two alternatives be chosen and fully performed."

The president wrote an explanatory plan of price control instead of the selective system advocated by the administration.
