Must Enter War to Aid Upset Nazis

Canadian Officer Says United States Must Act While Britain Is Still Strong Enough.

New York, Dec. 4.—(AP)—A Canadian officer and legislator said today the United States must enter the war "while Britain is still strong if the world is to be freed from the threat of Nazi domination."

Lieut. Col. George A. Drew, Ontario Conservative leader, said in an address prepared for a luncheon meeting of the Canadian club in New York.

"Not helping us much," he said, "is the fact that you in the United States are helping Britain resist as much as they are being out of the Axis forces, endeavoring to move toward the Soviet Union. They are engaged by British mobile columns."

The British, who now aim to whittle down the Axis armored power in North Africa tank by tank, were said to have concentrated their main strength on an offensive line from El Gola northward toward Benghazi, 100 miles beyond long-impregnable Tobruk.

This line, it was said, will be the base of future operations against the divisions of German Gen. Erwin Rommel and the British banished divisions of a quick victory.

No Longer Have Impetus

(Stefan, official Italian news agency, reported from Rome that the British no longer have the impetus of the initial operations of the battle and said it was evident that "after so many days of fighting, both the wearing down of large forces of men and the increased difficulties of replenishing supplies and munitions and other materials are making themselves felt."

month, or 50,000 planes a year, can be realized in five years, or by July, 1945.

Already surpasses Germany. In a report to the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, Charles H. Dolan, chief engineering officer and president of the Lafayette Aircraft Corporation, said that the nation's aircraft industry had already surpassed Germany's production of aircraft within one year if it would surpass the combined production of the rest of the world.

"No industry in this country has ever experienced such tremendous growth in an incredibly short time," he told the Aviation Division of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. "American industry has transformed a nickel investment into a \$3,000,000,000 industry in a year."

Second Fantastic Figure. "You will recall that when President Roosevelt in his State of the Union message of May 16, 1940, said that we were producing 10,000 aircraft a year, it seemed a fantastic figure at the time."

Now we have every reason to believe that an annual production rate of 50,000 planes will be reached in some time next year.

The industry in 1941 will reach 100,000 heavy, four-engine bombers or for 2,000 to 6,000 single-engine or multi-engine transport interceptors.

Employment Doubles. He indicated that present plant employment had risen from 103,000 a year ago to 200,000. "Factory employment is expected to rise in excess of 500,000 persons during the current expansion program completed."
