

Repulse Attempt at Invasion of Luzon; Japs Sink Two Mighty British Warships

Japanese Jubilant After News Given Of War Successes

Declare 'British Far Eastern Fleet Obliterated' in Announcing Sinking of Battleship and Cruiser; Land in Philippines.

Tokyo, Dec. 10.—(Official Radio Picked Up by AP)—Loudspeakers shouted Japan's most tremendous news of war successes so far—the sinking of two of Britain's mightiest capital ships and the landing of Japanese forces in the Philippine islands—today through a burst of Japanese bombs. Imperial headquarters declared "the British Far Eastern fleet has been obliterated."

No indication of other losses was acknowledged by Britain but there was no indication of other losses to substantiate the Japanese claim that Britain's newly massed Naval strength in the Far East had been nullified.

Japan already had claimed naval supremacy of the Pacific after her Sunday air smash against the United States in Pearl Harbor. Today proclaimed her prepared to seize control of both the air and water of the Pacific, Indian and Antarctic oceans.

In a virtual broadcast of communications which kept crowds gathered in front of radio and newspaper bulletin boards, the Army and Navy sections of the Imperial headquarters.

Landing Parties Successful
Said Japanese landing parties had been set ashore successfully in the Philippines north of Manila in joint land-sea operations against Philippine resistance.

Declared that previously reported occupation of the United States Pacific island of Guam had been confirmed and that Japanese military and Naval forces now were securely established there.

Japanese Naval units were reported to have approached the mouth of Hong Kong bay and sunk an 820-ton British Naval tug. The announcement indicated that the vessel was doing patrol duty.

Berlin news and radio announcements quoted Japanese Naval authorities as saying they had reason to believe that the British battleship King George V, new 35,000-ton steamer of the Prince of Wales, also had been sunk in the air-sea battle.

(There was no confirmation of this from any other quarter, however, nor even any intimation that she is in that part of the world.)

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Japan Lands Troops In Northern Luzon

Manila, 1:15 p. m., Dec. 10.—(12:15 a. m., e.s.t.)—Japanese paratroopers were reported to have captured the northwestern Luzon port of Vigan today and sea-borne troops landed near the northern port of Aparri. An Army spokesman said the Japanese fought their way ashore at Aparri under the protective fire of their warships amid bombing by American planes.

Manila, Dec. 10.—(P)—Japanese troops landed in northern Luzon today, the first full fledged landing on American soil since the War of 1812, after American warplanes sank one transport and damaged at least two more, the spokesman said.

Roosevelt Says Navy Still Has Supremacy; Wales, Repulse Lost

Most Disastrous Blow To British Navy in Whole War; No Word Of How Ships Sunk Or Fate of Crews, Totalling 3,000 Men; Japs Claim Sinkings Result of Air Power.

London, Dec. 10.—(P)—Britain lost two of her mightiest capital ships today—the powerful new 35,000-ton battleship Prince of Wales and the 32,000-ton battle cruiser Repulse—both sunk by the Japanese off Malaya in the most disastrous single blow struck to the British Navy in the whole war.

This, it confirmed, would be the first known sinking of any warship of the sea either of the Prince of Wales or the Repulse by aerial bombardment.

Prime Minister Churchill made public the announcement in a terse statement before the shocked House of Commons.

He gave the news bluntly: "I have had news for the House which I thought I should impart to them at the earliest possible moment," he declared.

Washington, Dec. 10.—(P)—A substantial expansion of the naval construction program, already history's biggest, and President Roosevelt's announced policy of seven-day week in all munitions industries promised today to quicken the pace of America's war-time effort.

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the House Naval Committee disclosed that the Navy is preparing legislation to authorize the building of still more combat ships which will be started just as soon as new or existing ways are available.

To emphasize battleship production, Vinson said he would insist that the new program emphasize battleships, apparently to offset any similar construction which Japan might undertake.

At present, the United States has about 345 combat ships in the five major categories—battleships, cruisers, destroyers, destroyers and submarines—under construction and on last Navy Day, Oct. 27, the number in service totaled 347.

Asserting that all Naval building now is on a 24-hour-a-day basis, Vinson said the forthcoming expansion of the program would be completed in 1942.

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Hull Wants Meet Held On Menace

Proposes Conference of Foreign Ministers at Rio de Janeiro in January on War Peril.

Washington, Dec. 10.—(P)—Secretary of State Hull today proposed a conference of American foreign ministers to be held at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in the first week of January.

Hull's call for a conference to discuss the new war menace which confronts the western hemisphere was disclosed in the following Imperial headquarters declared "the British Far Eastern fleet has been obliterated."

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Britain Will Open Bases For Allies

All Facilities We Can Afford Will Be Available in Pacific; Japanese Called Pirates.

London, Dec. 10.—(P)—A British authority declared today that "all bases and facilities we can afford will be available for our allies" in the Pacific.

Instead of going to the conference table, the Wilhelmstrasse spokesman stood at the entrance of the United States embassy and announced: "Contrary to international practice, German correspondents have been arrested in the United States."

Russians Blast Nazi Troops from Tikhvin

10-Day Battle Costs 7,000 Dead; Suffer New Reverses in Sector Close to Moscow.

Moscow, Dec. 10.—(P)—New gains for the Red Army, particularly in the southern sector, were announced by the Russian communiqué tonight after earlier reports that German troops had been blasted from Tikhvin. The communiqué, without specifying the precise locale, said only "a number of sectors of the western and southwestern front our units advanced and occupied a number of populated centers."

Moscow, Dec. 10.—(P)—German troops have been blasted from Tikhvin, 110 miles east of Leningrad, in a 10-day battle which cost them 7,000 dead, and have suffered new reverses before Moscow, the Russians claimed officially today. The Soviet government said that Red Army detachments killed 1,000 invaders and took seven villages in the Kholm sector, 16 miles north-west of the capital, and wiped out more than 600 men in winning

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Raid Warnings In New York Sound Again

'Enemy Bombing Imminent' Police Report; Later Found to Be Naval Patrol Planes.

New York, Dec. 10.—(P)—Air raid warnings were sounded in New York at 8:41 a. m. (e.s.t.) today after similar warnings had flashed over Long Island. The clear was heard at 9:01.

Police headquarters reported that "enemy bombing was imminent" but First Air Force headquarters at Mitchel Field disclaimed any knowledge of hostile aircraft being in the vicinity.

Patrol Planes Taken
It later was learned that U. S. Navy patrol planes had been mistaken for enemy craft. The police bulletin Bureau said it sounded the alarm after receiving a warning by wire signal from the New York Information Center on Defense.

The first alarm was sounded at 8:41 a. m. in Suffolk county, on the eastern tip of Long Island. An "all clear" signal came at 7:22 a. m.

The alarm spread inward to Nassau county, also on Long Island at 6:42 a. m., and ended at 9:05.

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Army Communique Reports Japs Attacking 'In Force' at Northern End; President Dismisses as 'Fantastic'

Japanese Claims of Naval Supremacy a Result of Surprise.

Washington, Dec. 10.—(P)—The War Department's first official communique today announced the defeat of a Japanese invasion attempt on the west coast of Luzon Island as President Roosevelt claimed continued supremacy for the United States Navy in the Pacific. Luzon is the principal island of the Philippines. Manila is located on it, about 400 miles from where the Japanese landing was attempted. Earlier from Manila an Army communiqué revealed the Japanese were attacking "Luzon" at Luzon's northern end, between Vigan and Aparri.

The communiqué said that information received from the commanding general of the Far Eastern command "reveals the defeat of a hostile attack against the west coast of Luzon between San Fernando and Vigan. Our first bombing attacks on six transport ships at Vigan resulted in direct hits on three hostile ships and damage to the remaining three, one ship capturing and sinking immediately."

War Is Seen as Spark To Speed Up Defense

Gives Both Executive And Worker Personal, Patriotic Job Motive; A Great Help.

By Paul Genser and John Beckley
New York, Dec. 10.—(AP)—War with Japan was regarded with experience-hardened, defense-minded business executives here today as just the sort of rude awakening required to give the speed-up spark to armament building.

War has created national unity of thought and action, they say. The Japanese bombing attacks, handing every man in industry from top executive to factory worker a personal incentive to redouble efforts and expedite production of the war effort.

The defense picture here is the picture of the \$8,000,000,000 defense program of the War Relocation Authority. It is the production of tanks at the rate of 30 per cent per year and the production of 50 per cent per year of the expected peak of 50,000 planes a year.

How soon the great armament production will be attained now is up to government and industry. Federal buildings applied to Manchester executives and the millions of men manning the production machine.

The declaration of war, many business leaders thought, would bring these developments in the arms effort.

A speed-up in the handling out of defense contracts. A definite set-up in a unit production by plants turning out planes, tanks, guns, ammunition and other defense needs. Executives with 1917-18 experience recalled that marked increase in armament output occurred as soon as the United States entered World War Number One.

Lessening of labor troubles. Less grumbling about taxes. Tighter tightening of civilian goods output to free needed materials and workers for defense production.

A hard road for the chieftain who tries to take an exorbitant private profit from the government or capitalists on defense.

Closer unity with Great Britain, Canada, Latin America, the Dutch East Indies, China and Russia in exchange of strategic materials, farm products, armament
