War Against Germany and Italy Voted; Jap Battleship Sunk by Army Bombers

Both Germany, Italy Declare War Against United States Today

Duce Pledges His People Victory in Announcing Decision of Germany and Italy; Says Roosevelt 'Wanted War and Had Prepared for It Day by Day with Diabolical Obstinacy.'

Rome, Dec. 11.—(Official Radio Received by AP)—Germany and Italy declared war today on the United States, arraying the Axis might with Japan's and joining the wars in the east and west into one titanic struggle. This historic decision was announced by Premier Mussolini to tumultuous crowds in a five-minute speech from the balcony of Palazzo Venezia. The Fascist leader pledged his people victory and told them that President Roosevelt, "through a series of infinite provocations, betraying with a supreme fraud the population of his country, wanted the war and had prepared for it day by day with diabolical obstinacy."

Informed of War Fifty minutes earlier, Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano had summoned the United States charge d'affaires to the Chigi palace and informed him that King Emperor Vittorio Emanuele had declared Italy at war with the United States as from the moment the Axis powers had declared war on the United States.

"This is another day of solemn decision in Italy's history and of memorable events destined to give a new course to the history of continents. Congress Accepts Challenge of Hitler and Mussolini; Vote of Present Cast by Jeannette Rankin; More Seals Ballot on Declaration Against Italy Than Against Germany

Washington, Dec. 11.—(AP)—Congress voted war against Nazi Germany and Italy today in a swift response to President Roosevelt's appeal for a "rapid and united effort" for the cause of victory "over the forces of savagery and barbarism." As fast as roll calls could be tallied, the Senate unanimously, and the House without a single "no" vote, accepted the challenge of Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini, Axis partners of Japan with whom the nation went to war Monday.

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Hurley Views State Guards

Governor to Inspect Soldiers in All Portions of the State.

Hartford, Dec. 11.—Governor Robert A. Hurley disclosed today, as he departed for his first inspection of the State Guard active service, that while retaining his command of the organization he had made its actual operation subject to direction of the commanding general of the First Corps Area.

His action, the governor said, was taken to insure more complete collaboration between the Regular Army and the Connecticut Guard. Earlier in the week, the governor revealed, a high officer from the headquarters of the First Corps Area had conferred with him on ways and means of making liaison between the two commands effective.

Twelve hundred officers and men of the Guard were called to active duty Tuesday and since have been deployed to points of vantage about the state.

Before leaving, the chief executive officer of the organization, Brigadier General DeLoach, the adjutant general, and other equipment had been received for the 1,200 men who are to be fully equipped.

He said that those now on duty all had their rifles and have been assigned to guard water sheds, bridges, defense plants and the like.

The 1,200 will be on duty three weeks, Governor Hurley added, when they will be relieved by others now being equipped. There are now 3,000 men available and the governor said that he has no more at present for expanding that total.

Some Ar Replied

He declared that he had received requests from defense manufacturers that men in the State Guard who were engaged in vital defense work be released and added that a number of them have been replaced by new recruits.

The State Guard, the governor continued, has been "broadened" with enlistment applications.

The state has offered the Federal authorities, he asserted, several similar to those created by the Reserve and Coast Guard officers—some of great advantage over that under which we lack the experience of war service.

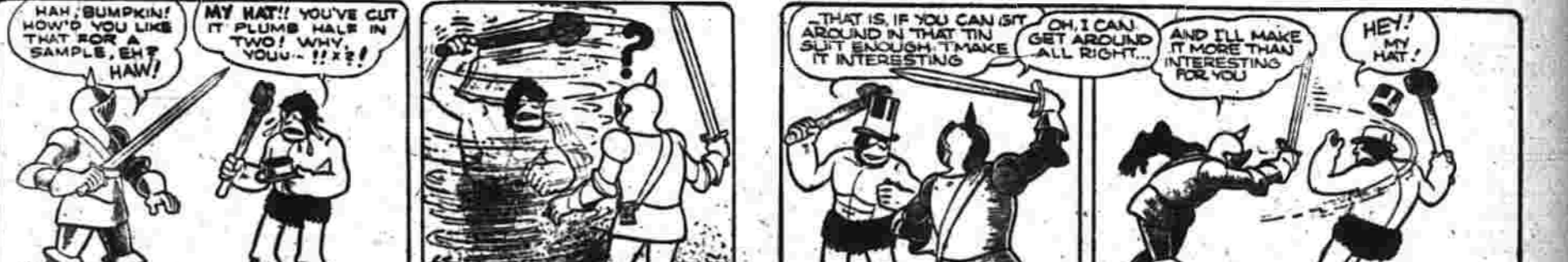

FHA Valuations On Sound Basis
Good reasons usually exist in cases where the Federal Housing Administration withholds insurance on a mortgage. Home buyers should accept the decision to grant or withhold insurance as a real service rather than an inconvenience.
Failure of the construction or the location of the property to meet FHA requirements, failure to provide a sufficient degree of livability, light, and air or failure of the purchase price to be nearly in line with the FHA's valuation are a few of the reasons why the Federal Housing Administration may deny insurance. FHA officials point out. It is usually a real service to the home buyer to deny insurance for any of these reasons.
In many instances borrowers apply for a larger mortgage than is actually needed on the assumption that the FHA arbitrarily will reduce the amount of the application. No such policy is practiced by FHA. Value is based on a number of established factors. These factors, together, establish the actual valuation, and when the application for mortgage insurance is for the proper amount there is no disposition on the part of the FHA to reduce it.
When the purchase of a home appears to be an economically unsound venture for the family, the FHA very likely will withhold insurance of the mortgage. A case in point would be the family of modest means purchasing an expensive home with perhaps more room than is needed. Or the family whose schedule of fixed charges, obligations such as car payments, etc. do not warrant added financial burdens.
