## British Troops Destroy German 361st Africa Regiment Surround Gazala

### In Push 50 Miles West of Tobruk

#### Parts of Two Italian Divisions are Believed Cut Off; Advance Penetrates About 120 Miles into Libya; Nazis Lack Air Support

Cairo, Egypt, Dec. 12.—(AP)—British troops have destroyed the German 361st Africa Regiment numbering some 1,200 men and surrounded Gazala in a drive through a two-day sandstorm, an advance that swept 50 miles beyond Tobruk, war dispatches said today. Parts of two Italian divisions were believed to have been cut off in the advance, which penetrated about 120 miles into Libyan territory.

A communique disclosed that Gazala, which is 40 miles west of Tobruk, had been partly encircled. Subsequent advice from the front described the town as surrounded. Survivors of the German 361st Regiment disclosed they had had no air or tank support nor means of defending themselves against tanks and planes. They also had been very short of food since Nov. 21.

The regiment was composed of second line troops, mostly recruits between the ages of 30 and 40. Many had served in the French Foreign Legion and had not been admitted to the German Army until a special Berlin decree in 1940 authorized their enlistment for service in Africa.

#### Been Threat of Attack

The regiment was rushed to Africa early in November and bore the full brunt of a British tank attack on Nov. 23, suffering heavy casualties. After being captured by New Zealanders on Nov. 25, remnants of the division were subsequently released by German tank attacks on the New Zealanders' positions. They were said to have been compelled to participate in an attack on Dec. 2, inadequately armed and poorly equipped. The regiment suffered heavy casualties and finally the remnants surrendered. The hard-driven bid for a decisive United States victory over Japan will take six months and will come at a greater cost than most Americans realize, in the opinion of Hallett Abernethy, chief of the New York Times' Far East Bureau for 15 years.

Abernethy, who has just established a home here, said in an interview that the only thing to do was to "show the Japanese back onto their own islands, to disarm them and to keep them disarmed."

"In the mood that Japan is in now," he continued, "it is impossible to live with her as a neighbor. Once she is quarantined onto her own island, let her live, yes, but she must not be allowed to maintain a single soldier or gun on the Asiatic mainland."

To leave Manchuria in the hands of the Japs would be a disaster. Recent fighting had centered, and now the seeds of future wars are sown.

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The latest war developments in an at-a-glance fashion are: (1) Singapore, where men rescued from the British ships Prince of Wales and Repulse were landed, and near the island of Penang (A) which the Japanese bombed; (2) the coast near Hong Kong, where bomb hits on British gunboats were claimed by the Japanese; (3) the Philippines, where United States forces appeared to have virtually smashed all efforts of the Japanese in land; (4) the approximate location of the island of Pohna, where Australian bombers raided a Japanese air base; (5) Guam, where the United States Navy said four separate attacks on the island had been repulsed in the last 48 hours and Japanese ships were sunk.

#### British Sub's Torpedo Hits Axis Cruiser

Italian Warship Is Believed Sunk in Central Mediterranean Attack at End of Day

London, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The Admiralty announced today that a British submarine had torpedoed and "probably sank" an Italian cruiser in the central Mediterranean.

In an attack at dusk on three Italian cruisers heavily screened by destroyers the submarine made three hits, the communique said.

"Firing visibility and a rough sea made accurate observation difficult," it added "but it is considered that one of the enemy cruisers probably sank as a very visible plume of smoke was seen."

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#### Army Lists 35 More as Dead

All Names Given Today Enlisted Men; Total in Hawaii Now 155

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The names of 35 additional soldiers lost in the Japanese attack on Hawaii last Sunday were announced today by the War Department.

This brought to 155 the number of officers and enlisted men the department has announced as killed in action or dead of wounds in Hawaii.

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#### San Diego Has 3rd Blackout

Second Alert for Los Angeles; All Clear Signals Come in Hour

Los Angeles, Dec. 12.—(AP)—San Diego had its third blackout of the war and Los Angeles its second alert early this morning, but the all clear signals were given an hour.

San Diego was ordered blacked out at 11:30 a. m. (D-15) a. m., and 12 minutes later Los Angeles was put on the alert.

"There's something out there (off San Diego) and we thought it better put out an alert," a spokesman for the Army Information Service said. He did not identify the something.

Radio Silence

Radio sets were silenced from 3:10 to 3:40 a. m.

Los Angeles' first alert, last night, intended only for police and sheriff's deputies but misdirected into a blackout warning, confused Angelenos far more last night than the city's blackout the previous evening.

Col. H. R. Fuller of the Army's Information Service said the alert was intended only for civil officials in vital defense centers.

However, "signals were mixed up" and all clear signals were given an hour later.

#### Urges Allied War Council

Parliament Member Favors Creation; Lack of Coordination Is Hit

London, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Eugene Forster, Liberal National member of Parliament, said today he would raise in Commons again the question of an Allied War Council to include Britain, Soviet Russia and the United States.

It also was announced that he would raise in Commons again the proposal for a British Empire war cabinet, a suggestion turned down previously by Prime Minister Churchill.

Peace Terms

Washington Accord Is Also Listed Among Prerequisites for Truce

Kuliyshiev, Russia, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Ousting of the "Hitler gang" and a joint Moscow-London-Washington accord are listed here as prerequisites of any peace between the Soviet Union and Germany, for which feelers have been reported from Berlin.

David Zaslavsky of Pravda, the official Communist party newspaper, cited these conditions in an editorial saying:

"The Hitler gang is ready any day to sign a peace with Russia if only our government would talk with them."

At the same time, the Soviet government received from United States and Japanese diplomats formal notification that the United States and Japan are at war.

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#### Admiral Waesche Expects Epidemic of Fires, Blasts

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Admiral Waesche, testifying just before Germany and Italy declared war on the United States yesterday, said there was no doubt that, until that time, those nations and Japan had "subversive activities in this country which they have not yet given the green light to go ahead."

Admiral Waesche said sabotage in the last war "ran up into hundreds of millions of dollars of damage and he recalled the Black Tom munitions disaster in New Jersey which alone cost more than \$14,000,000 "not counting the loss of life and the tremendous delay through the destruction of the terminals and the facilities for shipping munitions."

The Coast Guard, which as part of the Navy is responsible for the safety of harbors, docks and terminals, has items totaling more than \$18,000,000 in the big expenditure bill.

#### Hold Parley On Tax Rate

George and Doughton Discuss New Bill Today with Morgenthau

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Faced with the problem of financing what Roosevelt tonight called the most expensive war in history, Treasury and congressional fiscal experts conferred today to determine just how high a tax rate the nation's pocketbook can stand.

Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the Senate Finance Committee and Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) of the House Ways and Means Committee were called into a conference with Secretary Morgenthau to discuss a new tax bill, to be introduced next month.

George said the goal of the legislation would be to increase taxes as high as they could safely go without interfering with the flow of war supplies and the production of essential civilian items.

Most Increase Production

George said there must be a "doubling and redoubling" of defense production, he added that the tremendous increase in "expenditures must be financed as much as possible through additional tax revenue, with reduction in routine government outlays and rigid control of prices coming along simultaneously.

George said that "business as usual" must give way to the supreme war effort, but that this could only be done efficiently by preserving the private enterprise system and could not be accomplished by nationalization.

#### Labor Group Is Told Midway, Guam Lost; Philippines Hit Again

Darkness Halts American Surface Ships From Renewing Action in First Encounter; Hurl Fresh Land and Air Attacks; Score Heavily in Cavite Raid.

Manila, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Japanese warships fled from American surface ships in the first encounter of the two fleets since the war began and darkness prevented the Americans from renewing the action, it was reported today as Japan hurled fresh land and air attacks on the Philippines. Admiral Thomas C. Hart, commander-in-chief of the U. S. Asiatic fleet, said ships from his command had only one encounter with the Japanese fleet but that ended without result. The use of the fleet involved was not stated.

"Considerable Loss of Life"

However, he acknowledged that the Japanese Air Force had scored heavily in the "unconventional" raid Wednesday on the Cavite Naval Yard off Manila and that the raids caused a "considerable loss of life."

He said a single direct bomb hit smashed a Navy dispensary in Cavite, killing all nurses, doctors and patients in the building. Their number is not yet known.

Admiral Hart said the Japanese had not been bombing hospitals, but that the damage was in the midst of a legitimate military objective.

#### Small Force Lands

At the same time, the Far Eastern Army command announced that Japanese planes had raided widespread sections of the Philippines and an Army spokesman said a small Japanese force apparently had landed at Legaspi, 250 miles southeast of Manila.

The Japanese attacked Olongapo, 50 miles west of Manila, one of the islands.

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#### Men, 18-65, To Register For Service

Speaker Rayburn Says Legislation to Be Introduced; 19 to 45 Group 'Responsible'

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Speaker Rayburn announced today that legislation would be introduced immediately calling for all men from 18 to 65 to register for service.

The speaker, making the announcement immediately after a conference at the Capitol with Secretary of War Stimson and Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service chief, said the legislation would make men from 19 to 45 "responsible for service."

"That is on the assumption that a boy of 19 would be trained a year and then be full grown and ready for service," Rayburn said. "Of course, a boy 19 would not be sent into combat service."

"This registration is necessary for the defense of our country."

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#### Japan Claims Landing Made Before Dawn

**Valor Shown By Defenders**

**Sudden Stab at Oahu Island Leaves Them Fighting Mad**

By Eugene Burns

Honolulu, Dec. 12.—Oahu island's defenders rose to magnificence today in the face of six vicious raids on this Pacific outpost by Japanese warplanes and bombers.

The sudden stab has left them fighting mad. Fifty to 100 enemy planes participated in the savage thrust. At Pearl Harbor Naval Base and the Hickam Field Army Base and the Kaneohe Naval Air Base.

The first wave came over at 7:30 a. m. local time, followed by other waves at 11:29 a. m., 11:39 a. m., 12:22 p. m., 7:15 p. m., and 9:10 p. m.

A night relaxation of censorship yesterday permitted additional details of the raids which killed 49 civilians and injuried more than 100.

In Washington, the White House announced Army, Navy and civilian casualties probably would total 3,000, about equally divided in killed and wounded.

Marine losses were proclaimed at the raids and the civilian population, calm and determined in the military authorities.

"Suddenly we were in the thick of a black-painted mass of planes," Martin said. "They roared from the sky everywhere and I saw on the wings the Rising Sun of Japan. When the first bomb hit, my head almost went out on me. Then I lay flat on the ground."

He said he saw three enemy planes shot down.

Honolulu, accustomed to Army and Navy maneuvers, thought it was just another defense practice when they were awakened by the explosion.

New York, Dec. 12.—If a Georgia high school football player should suffer a broken arm in the field of glory, he will collect insurance promptly. But if the same athlete suffers a brain concussion, that is his misfortune. There's got to be no money under the terms of the policy.

Tulane University carries no accident or death insurance on its athletes. But Tulane pays for a blanket policy that protects all athletes who play on the campus or the customary visits of the school.

The Utah youth must pay \$150 a year for injury insurance. The indigent in football or wrestling, however, are blanketed at a bargain rate of 75 cents. A half-nelson, presumably, is as dangerous as a tackle, ever so safe a few bruises.

The University of Washington carries insurance on every fan who buys tickets into its football stadium. That had been placed for a long time, but it was a cross-section of the football insurance situation as disclosed in a nation-wide survey.

**Movement Gains Rapidly**

A kale of correspondence built down to the impression that protection for the warrior in football is still in no more than a hazy infancy, though some sections of the country have made surprising strides in recent years.

Colleges and Universities as a whole do not feel the need of injury or death insurance for their players. They have their own physicians and their own infirmaries to take care of all normal football injuries, they point out, and in the rare event of a permanent injury or death they have money in their treasuries to the right thing.

That was the tenor of most replies from university officials. One, however, said this:

"Football is a played here to make money. If it were, there might be some justification for going to it that the boys who bring in the money get some kind of financial return, in insurance or otherwise.
